BY AUTHORITY.

To extend the power of granting writs of injunctions to the judges of the district courts

of the United States. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representation of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That from and after the passing of this act, the judges of the dilli ict courts of the United States thall have as full power to grant writs of injunctions to operate within their respective districts in all cases which may come before the circuit courts within their respective districts as is now exercised ly any of the judges of the supreme court of the United States, under the same rules, regulations and restrictions as are prescribed by the several acts of Congress establishing the judiciary of the United States, any law to the conmary notwithstanding. Provided, that the same shall not, unless so ordered by the circuit court, confinue longer than to the circuit court next ensuing, nor shall an injunction be issued by a district judge in any case where a party has had a reasonable time to apply to the circuit court for the writ.
