

NEW-YORK, March 2.

We are happy in being able to state, from undoubted authority, that the four principal British merchants in Hamburg, who were arrested by the French on entering that city, have been set at liberty, the seals taken off their effects, and the guards withdrawn from their houses; and that all property not bona fide owned by persons residing in England, was released!—The embargo, however, continued in force on the 19th of December, on all vessels in that port; and no American vessel would be permitted to sail, notwithstanding the application of our Consul there, until the French Minister should receive an answer from the Emperor Napoleon, to a remonstrance from the Senate of Hamburg respecting neutrals.

On Saturday evening, between eight and nine o'clock, the soap and candle manufactory of Mr. George Munster, in the rear of St. John's Hall, was discovered to be on fire. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, the citizens assembled with great alacrity; and by the timely exertions of the firemen, the fire was extinguished without any more damage than the destruction of the building where it originated.

It is not known whether the fire was occasioned by accident or design; but we understand that there had been no fire in the manufactory during the whole of the day.

The inhabitants of the Island of Jamaica have been deprived of their usual supply of flour from the United States, in consequence of a letter from A. Cunningham, Esq. of Montego-Bay, to his correspondent in Boston, requesting him not to send on any quantity of codfish, as they expected a supply from Halifax and N. Brunswick. This letter was published in all the American newspapers.

PHILADELPHIA, March 3.

We are extremely happy in recording the following truly glorious and heroic action:

On the 2d ult., in the afternoon, while a negro man and his wife were crossing the river Susquehanna, on the ice—the ice parted and these unfortunate persons were carried down the river on separate pieces—When nearly opposite Havre de Grace, they called for assistance from persons who were on the bank of the river, and who bravely leaped at their danger, and left them to their fate.

The gentleman, who is post master at Havre de Grace, put off to their assistance—the man was got on board—but the woman, who was surrounded by accumulated cakes of ice, must necessarily have perished, as the night was falling in, and the boat, unable to approach her, had returned to town.

Cosmadoro RODGERS, with a spirit worthy of a teaman, and highly honourable to humanity, taking a piece of plank, padded from cake to cake, until he reached the woman, and brought her to land, when he was nearly perishing with cold, being himself benumbed in this noble attempt to rescue her.

The ship Western Trader, captain Whitedeck, has arrived at Liverpool in 30 days from this port. On the 5th of January, off Cork, was boarded by a French privateer of 18 guns, master of 22 men, who examined and dismissed her.

WASHINGTON CITY, March 4.

We understand that a copy of the Treaty between the United States and Great Britain was received last evening by Mr. Erie.

Letters are received in this city from Natchez, dated the 2nd of February. They state that Mr. Burr had on that day appeared before the district court for trial, and that the business had been deferred until the next day.

* The expression is vague; nor is anything stated that enables us to determine its precise meaning.

The House of Representatives were in session on Saturday from 7 o'clock in the evening to one o'clock the next morning. They were principally occupied in considering the bill for the repeal of the *act on salt*, and for the continuance of the *Mediterranean fund*. The bill finally passed the House by a large majority, and discloses the duty of eight cents on salt after the 30th of June, and the duty of twelve cents after the 30th of September; and continues the Mediterranean fund until the 1st day of December.

On Monday the House sat from 10 A. M. to half past 4 P. M. and from half past 6 to 10 in the evening.

On Tuesday the House sat from 10 A. M. to half past 3 o'clock, when they adjourned to half after 9 o'clock, from which time they continued in session until 11 o'clock, when the two Houses adjourned and died.

Our readers will see, in the following list, the acts which have passed.

The Bill has passed, as it passed the House of Representatives, with an amendment, taking out the duty of 12 cents after the 31st of Dec. instead of the 30th of September.

The House postponed indefinitely the bill from the Senate, for an increase of the military establishment.
