Four days since, on the inner edge of the Gulf, capt. Simpkin spoke sfr. Amelia, Brooks, 2 days from this port for Campeachy.

The sfr. Mary, Campbell, and sfr. Resolution, Peartree, have arrived at Havana from this port.

Sfr. Betsey, Edwards, 25 days from Salem, is arrived at Nassau.

The Last Mail.

NEW-YORK, March 6.

By a Gentleman who arrived yesterday from Rio Janeiro, in the ship Centurion v. a New-London, we learn that admiral Sterling in the ship Sampson, 64 guns, with seven transports under convoy, arrived there on the 27th of Nov. b. un. as w. these fr. &c. fr. the Cape F. G. Hope, but hearing of the capture of Buenos Ayres by the Spaniards, proceeded immediately for the River La Plata. The common report at Rio Janeiro was that Ad. Sterling had come out to supersede Sir Horatio Popham, and that there was a General on board the fleet to take the place of General Beresford—the Centurion left Rio Janeiro on 29th November, on which day the ship—Capt. Musson, arrived there from Buenos Ayres for provisions for Admiral Popham's fleet, the great want of which created a belief among the Spaniards, that the British would be compelled to raise the blockade. The crews of Admiral Sterling were very sickly, in consequence of which an indiscriminate punishment was made. All the sailors in the port—the Americans however, were on examination liberated.

PHILADELPHIA, March 7.

The N. Caribackets, Caroline, and Little-Carib, etc., arrived yesterday morning, had on board upwards of half a million of Spanish Dollars, intended for the China and India shipping.

Capt. Diane, of the sfr. Hannah, who arrived at Boston from Martinique, communicates the report received via N. York, viz. that in consequence of a petition from the French merchants no Americans were to be allowed after a certain date, to transact business at Mart. except through a French commission merchant.—The fact is their petition was rejected.

BALTIMORE, March 7.

Died, on Saturday last, Mr. ENGLISHARD YELTER, an old and much respected inhabitant of this city. His remains were yesterday interred with great solemnity.

From the Merchant's Coffee House Books.

Arrived, sfr. Edw. & Parrott, 27 days from Point Petre, (Gaud)—sugar, Wm. Patten & Sons. Left there, brig Betsey, Davis, for Baltimore in 14 days; Greenwich, Well, etc., 14 days; sfr. Rover, Carr, etc., 4 days, and a number of others, belonging to the inward and outward trade, a great many. Spoke nothing on the passage.

Ale, sfr. Mildred, Bay, 22 days from St. Thomas—coconuts, bread—High Tension. Left there 14th, sfr. James, E. of New-York, put in 14 days; Brig. Chancellor, Parker, Capt. of Philadelphia, the City of St. Domingo in 6 days; sfr. George, for Philadelphia, 15th; then Morning Star, Gale, for N. York. The S. Star, 21st, 3 days back, for Norfolk, brig Fidelity, 2nd. A ship belonging to Philadelphia from Marfet for St. Thomas, was sent to Tortola by the British ship Alexander, capt. King.

The ship Rich, from Baltimore to London, sprung a leak—was going into St. Thomas, to repair, but was taken on that place 26th Jan. and sent to Tortola.

A brig from Bordeaux to St. Thomas, with 26 passengers, was said to have been detained and sent into Tortola.

The brig Mildred, Spence, from Philadelphia bound to Spanish Main, has been condemned at Antigua, vessel and cargo.

In the bay, brig Eunice, Foster, from Salem; chr. Three Sisters, Rich, from Madera, and Dorothy, sixteen from New York; all, sfr. Merchant, Bigey, 13 days from Havanna. On the 21st, ship Little Mary, Waters, of Baltimore, discharging; Margaret, Clark, do, to sail in 6 days; brig Hesper, Riker, do, in 5 days; sfr. Good Intent, Ratcliffe, do, in 3 or 4 days. Paid in the bay, ship Lexington, Frost, from Liverpool.

Capt. Field of the Federal George, spoke on 23d Feb. in lat. 35° 24' lon. 69° 30', brig Hero, Thadord, 20 days from St. Thomas, bound to Portsmouth, N. H., in a leaky position; the day before in 2 gals of wind having dove 4 wear casks, supplied her with one cask—the captain intended to risk the first port in the U. States.

New-York, March 6.

Arrived, the brig Phoenix, Corning, from S. Petersburg.

The schooner Commerce, Stevenson, in 32 days from St. Peters, S. Lat. via Antigua in 24 days. The Commerce was sent into Antigua by the three masted privateer schooner St. Lucia, where she was detained two days and vessel and cargo liberated; the sfr. Isabella, of Philadelphia was waiting trial; the brig Baltic, from Guadaloupe for N. York, was waiting trial—

The sfr. Argus, from Martinique for Philadelphia, was sent in the day capt. S. failed; an eastern brig and two schooners names unknown. The brig Ulysses, Tripp, failed the day before for N. York. Capt. S. having been sent in there on her passage from Guadaloupe, and vessel and cargo, cleared, Feb. 16, in lat. 31° 35', spoke a schooner from St. Kitts for Newport. In lat. 32, spoke the barque Amelia, from Baltimore for the City of St. Domingo.

The sloop Maria, Hathaway, 12 days from Edenton.

The brig Pilgrim, Smith, from Savannah, via Newport.

The brig Federal, Sargeant, from Newburyport, Feb. 26, lat. 80, long 73° 28', spoke brig Hunter 50 days from Demerara for Bolton.

The schooner Richmond, Brown, of Somerset, from Georgetown, S. C. via R. Island. Two weeks since, 40 miles to the northward of C. Hatteras, saw the 1. wermuth, topmalt, and top-gallantail of a ship or brig.

The sloop Malinda, Segar, 12 days from Philadelphia.

The sloop Consolation, Rogers, 10 days from N. Carolina.

The sloop Lydia, Gardner, in 7 days from Wilmington, N. C.

Arrived here yesterday, in the sloop Lydia,

from Wilmington, Capt. Fanning, late of the ship Dart, of this port, which was upset and foundered in lat. 47° long. 34° 28' on the 26th Nov. last, on her passage from Amsterdam to this port. Capt. F. was taken from the wreck by the humanity of Capt. Michael Hopkins, of the ship Morning Star, from Amsterdam for Boston.—After beating on our coast till the 9th Jan., experiencing many severe gales, the Morning Star sprang a leak, and bore away for the Well-Islands; she arrived at St. Bartholomew on the 23d of Jan., where she was repairing and was to sail for Boston about the 8th Feb.

Captain Fanning arrived at Wilmington in the sfr. Tryall, Barker, in 14 days from St. Barts.—The whole of Capt. Fanning's crew were saved, and embarked at sea on board of different vessels. The cargo of the Morning Star was considerably damaged.

BELLOW, last night, the ship Alexander, of Bolton, from Jamaica, and the ship Charlotte from Matanzas—bore a gale and two small schooners from North-Carolina—the wind northerly.
