

Mr. Vincent Gray, late a merchant at Alexandria, (Col.) now residing at the Havana, and profiting an extensive business, lately received a large sum of money, which twelve Spaniards conspired to seize upon, after having murdered him and his family. After the plan of attack was fully arranged, one of the party relented, and gave such information to the Governor as enabled him to defeat the infamous design. The Governor immediately detached a guard to defend Mr. G. and his property, and about seven o'clock in the evening, one of the assassins, armed with a filetto, entered the store and enquired for Mr. Gray. The clerk, who appeared to be writing at the desk, replied that Mr. G. was not at home. The Spaniard then informed the clerk that he had something of importance to communicate, and as Mr. G. was not within, he (the clerk) would do as well to make the proposition towards the desk to make the proposed communication, and when near the desk, attempt to stab him, but was prevented by the appearance of a pistol, which the clerk instantly presented at him. In the mean time the soldiers rushed into the counting-house, and one of them, with a stroke of his cut-throat, killed the fellow, by severing his shoulder from the body and laying open the latter down to his heart. The plan of attack appears to have been well prepared, and would have completely succeeded, had not remorse struck one of the party. Too much praise cannot be bestowed upon the Governor for the promptitude with which he took his measures to preserve Mr. Gray and his family from destruction. It appears four of the party were to have employed themselves in carrying off the treasure, while the remainder were to have been engaged in dispatching Mr. Gray, with his family, clerks and servants. The preceding particulars have been communicated to the editors by several gentlemen who were in the Havana at the time it occurred—about three weeks since. Five of the party have been apprehended.

On the 28th of Feb. a very destructive gale was experienced at Bolton, which did much damage to the vessels in the harbor. Several had their sterns, bowsprits and quarters, damaged, crippled away, and stove in. A brig went ashore near the hospital in Charles-town. The brig-Lark, Hedgkins, from Savannah, went ashore below. Ship-Ethel, Gray, from Calcutta, stranded on Eastern Point. Brag-Ann, vessel and cargo totally lost—value 300,000 dollars. Captain, second mate, and two lieutenants lost their lives. Sch'r Little Sarah, left on Cat Island—capt. and two of the crew perished. A sch'r and a brig went ashore at Salem, where three sch'rs were bilged. A vessel went ashore at Manchester, not much damaged. A large fleet which sailed from the Vineyard on the 16th ult. it is feared has met with great disasters. Entered at Bolton, Mary, Woodbury, Baltimore; Vandyke, Wilmington, N. C. Rambler, Crosby, do. Traveler, Snow, Richmond. The barque Packet, Johnson, arrived at the Vineyard on Friday, in 54 days from Bordeaux for Marblehead. Vessels left have been reported. Capt. Johnson, was boarded in the Bay of Biscay by 2 English frigates, and in lat. 27, long. 27, by a French brig of 15 guns, by both

NOTICE is hereby given, that separate proposals will be received at the office of the Secretary for the department of war, until 12 o'clock at noon of the first Wednesday in June next, for the supply of all rations that may be required for the use of the United States from the first day of October, 1827, until the 30th day of September 1828, both days inclusive, at the following places, viz—
First, At Niagara, Detroit, Michilimackinac, Fort Wayne, Chicago, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of Ohio, and territory of Michigan, and at any place or places within the Indiana territory north of the 41st degree of north latitude.
Second, At the new military post opposite the mouth of the Hixawee, and within the Cherokee nation between Tennessee and Georgia, and on the Tennessee river, and on the road between said river and Nashville, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of Kentucky and Tennessee.
Third, At the garrison near Vincennes on the river Wabash, at Fort Mifflin, New Madrid, Chickasaw Bluffs, Arkansas, Natchez, and Fort Adams, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited in the Mississippi territory, except the county of Washington, and at any place or places in the Indiana territory south of the 41st degree of north latitude, and fifty miles east of the Mississippi river.
Fourth, At St. Louis, St. Charles, Kaskaskia, Cahokia, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the territory of Louisiana north of New Madrid, and at any place or places in the Indiana territory within fifty miles east of the Mississippi river, and south of the 41st degree of north latitude, Fort Mifflin excepted.
Fifth, At New-Orleans, Plaquemines, Point Coupee, Oachaera, Natchitoches, Apollousas, Attakapas, Fort Stoddard, St. Stephens, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the territory of Orleans, or in the county of Washington in the Mississippi territory, and at any place or places on the west side of the Mississippi river below Arkansas.
Separate proposals will also be received as aforesaid for the supply of all rations, which may be required for the use of the United States from the first day of January 1828 to the 31st day of December of the same year, both days inclusive, within the several States, herinafter mentioned, viz—
Sixth, At the Oakmulgee Old Field, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Georgia, and on the Indian boundary between Georgia and the Cherokee nation.
Seventh, At Charleston, Rocky Mount, on the head waters of the Santee, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the States of North and South Carolina.
Eighth, At Norfolk, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Virginia.
Ninth, At Fort M'Henry, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Maryland and the district of Columbia.
Tenth, At Fort Mifflin, Carlisle, and at any

place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Pennsylvania, east of the mountains, and within the State of New Jersey and Delaware.

Eleventh, At Pittsburg and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Pennsylvania west of the mountains.

Twelfth, At Fort Jay, West Point, Albany, Schenectady, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of New York, Niagara and its dependencies excepted.

Thirteenth, At Fort Trumbull, Fort Wolcott, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Vermont.

Fourteenth, At Fort Independence (Fort Harrison) and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited, within the State of Massachusetts—the town of Springfield, and the district of Maine excepted.

Fifteenth, At Portsmouth, Portland, and at any place or places, where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of New-Hampshire and the district of Maine.

Sixteenth, Proposals will also be received as aforesaid, for the supply of all rations which may be required by the United States, for the troops which are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the town of Springfield in the State of Massachusetts, and for the Quartermasters and other persons employed in the United States' army at that place, from the 1st day of January 1828 to the 31st day of December in the same year, both days inclusive.

A ration to consist of one pound and one quarter of the flour, one quart of apples and one quart of raisins, or one quart of bread, and one quart of flour, whiskey or brandy, and at the rate of two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar, four pounds of soap, and one pound and a half of candles to every hundred rations. The price of the several component parts of the ration shall be specified; but the United States reserve the right of making such alterations in the price of the component parts of the ration as result, as they may, from the price of each part thereof bear a just proportion to the price of the whole ration. The rations are to be furnished in such quantities, that there shall at all times, during the term of the proposed contract, be sufficient for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, Detroit and Chicago for six months in advance; and at each of the other posts on the western waters for at least three months in advance; and each of the other posts, at the time that the same shall be required. It is also to be permitted to all and every of the Commandants of detached places or posts, to call for, at seasons when the same can be transported, or at any time in case of urgency, such supplies of like provisions in advance, as in the discretion of the Commandant shall be deemed proper.

It is understood, that the contractor is to be at the expence and risk of affording the supplies to the troops, and that all loss sustained by the deprivations of an enemy, or by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid by the United States at the price of the rations captured or destroyed as aforesaid, on the deposit of two or more portions of creditable characters and the certificate of a commissioned officer, stating the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles for which compensation may be claimed.

The privilege is understood to be reserved to the United States of requiring that, none of the supplies, which may be furnished under any of the proposed contracts, shall be sold, until the supplies which have been or may be furnished under contracts in view to be, have been consumed; and that a supply in advance may be required at any of the advanced posts on the Missouri, or Indian frontier, not exceeding 1000 lbs.

David M. Meeben against the Mayor & City Council of Baltimore, Alex. Storey, 4th March, 1827, and others.

THE object of the complainant's bill is to obtain relief against a judgment obtained against him in the Western District of Maryland, as one of the securities of Thomas Yates, on a bond given by him for the faithful performance of said Yates's trust as auctioneer in the city of Baltimore.

The bill states that the said suit was instituted against the complainant in the name of the Mayor and City Council, for the use of the said Alexander Storey—that judgment was had thereon against him without his privity or consent; that the said bond given by him as a security for said Yates by the terms and condition thereof, did not make him responsible for the debt of the said Storey; and that the said judgment was had and entered up by direction and at the instance of said Yates for the purposes of making the complainant pay the same although not answerable therefor by reason of his securityship; and that the said Yates hath since become bankrupt; and that the said Storey does not reside in the State of Maryland.

It is thereupon on the application of the complainant, adjudged and ordered that the complainant cause a copy of this notice to be inserted in the American three Tuesdays or three Fridays successively before the 12th day of April next, to the end that the said Alexander Storey may appear in person or by his solicitor, in this court, before the 12th day of August next, to shew cause, if any he hath, why the prayer of the complainant, contained in his said bill, should not be granted.
