B. do solemnly swear (or affirm as the case may be) that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the United States of America, and that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against their enemies or opposers whomsoever, &c. L. U. S. Act of March 16, 1802. Besides, Gen. Wilkinson is bent upon to the president, whose oath obliges him to "preserve and defend, to the best of his ability, the constitution of the U. States." Gen. W. as the representative of the president, was bound by the responsibility of his superior, as well as by his own oath to adopt measures of precaution and defence.

(o) This is a point that ought to be properly discussed. It is very questionable whether the Supreme Court of the United States has not infringed the constitution more than Wilkinson.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman of undoubted veracity, dated Natchez, 7th Feb. to his friend in Washington, City.

"Col. Burr's arrival here has caused a great bustle, and almost stopped all business. He has been brought before a court here, who had no jurisdiction in his case; and a grand jury has been found, who have not only acquitted him, but presented the government for meddling with him. If this is conceived abroad to be the sentiment of the people of this territory, it will be very wrong, for it is quite the contrary. This was a jury packed by— He has since made his escape, and the executive have this morning issued a proclamation, offering 2,000 dollars to any one who will take him up again, it being a notched affair. I hope this presentment may not be misconceived by the general government; for I can confidently say, that there is no part of the union more averse to a separation in general, than this territory, although some things in the land law have given much umbrage."

Extract of a letter, dated New Orleans, Jan. 29th, for an answer entitled to the biggest credit, to a gentleman in Washington.

"Gen. Wilkinson's conduct is much censured here. I do not prove all his acts—but my impressions are, that he is faithful to his country, and is actuated by the best motives. I do not consider the danger as over. Burr has many partisans on the western waters, and I suspect many well-wishers in this, and perhaps your territory. But I nevertheless hope, that all will yet be well."

PALEMONA, (Am.) Dec. 24. To-morrow being Christmas Day, we have to state, that for several weeks past, several hundred and fifty negroes, given in by this Parish, there is not one head of dried salt fish at this market for sale—So much for an expectation of a supply from our Nova Scotia friends.

NASSAU, February 3. Extract of a letter, received at Kingston, dated London, November 4. "The trade to St. Domingo is in some degree opened from hence. Mr. Robert Sutherland goes out in a vessel of 1,000 tons, and a cargo of 100,000 sterling to Port-au-Prince: five other ships are to follow. The King's License to him is the most general thing ever issued, he may do what he pleases under it. The rage for speculation to Buenos Ayres also exceeds any thing ever known—nearly fifty valuable cargoes are going out from the different ports of the Union—from Belfast alone, five are about sailing. On board of one of the ships, Mr. Tyrrell, late Secretary to General Nugent, goes out as supercargo."

PHILADELPHIA, March 11. Mr. Munroe, Minister at London, means to return to this country in the ship London Packet, which was to fail in all January. The ship New Jersey, from London, which it is supposed the left about the 24th of January, is below.

By the sch'r Argus, capt. Crapo, from Martinique via Antigua, we learn, that little or no business is doing at Antigua, except what arises from the capture and detention of American vessels, which are daily sent in by his majesty's ships and privateers, on the most frivolous pretences.

The Eastern Mail of to-day brings no New York papers—we are therefore unable to give the promised details of foreign intelligence, received there by the Enterprise. Our papers by this vessel are only down to Sunday the 11th, and contain nothing new.

EXTRACT. London, Jan. 9.—An order of Council has been issued to His Majesty's ships of war and privateers, to detain and bring in all ships and vessels belonging to neutrals trading from one port of France to another, or any port under the sanction of the French government, where British vessels are not permitted to trade. This is a very excellent measure, and Ministers deserve the highest credit for it. It will at once bring the question to a large, whether France and the countries under her control, can do without foreign trade without receiving any supplies from three parts of the Globe, and without being able to export her or their produce to any part of the world? For as to the ships France can send out from her own ports to export or import articles, they are so few in number as scarcely to deserve being taken into our consideration.

The Americans of course will not be able to trade with France, Holland, Spain, Italy, and other parts, so that if the

treaty of navigation and commerce is concluded with them shall have, which we trust it has not, abandoned the rule of the war in 1756, and permitted belligerent produce to be carried under certain regulations to France, or to any power or port under her control, it will be of no advantage to them during the existence of this order of Council, which we hope will be rigidly executed.

The only powers with which neutrals have leave to trade are, this country, Russia, Sweden, Denmark, Portugal, Sicily, and Turkey. Austria has one or two ports, but they are in a state of blockade. [COURIER.]
