

shall have applied to the city commissioners, to mark out the true line of such street, lane or alley; (unless the corners of the square on which such improvements are to be made, have been fully established) and every commissioner so applied to, is hereby authorized and required, to see that such foundation, building, house or wall, do not in fact encroach upon the same, and said commissioners, shall have a right to employ, if they deem it necessary, on every such occasion, a surveyor at the cost of such owner or owners, and every person or persons neglecting to do as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay five dollars for each and every offence, and five dollars for each and every day while such delinquency aforesaid are not complied with, (in case such wall, house or building, shall encroach upon the street.)

**V. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners shall have full power and authority, and they are hereby authorized and directed, when called on by any person requiring their attendance, to regulate all party walls and partition fences within the city, in such manner as may in their judgment be most likely to promote equal justice between the parties concerned, and shall immediately thereafter, make return of every such proceeding under their hands and seals to the register, to be recorded and kept with every paper and voucher relative thereto, in such manner as before directed, and when, and as often as the said city commissioners shall meet, to fix and establish any boundary of any lot within the said city, or to regulate any party wall or partition fence within the same, they shall, and they are hereby required to give at least four days notice, in at least two of the newspapers of the said city, of such intention, specifying the time when, and place where they are to meet together, with the intention of such meeting, and shall, before they fix and establish any such street, lane or alley, or any boundary of any of the lots within the city, or regulate any party wall or partition fence as aforesaid, obtain the best information on oath or affirmation, as the case shall admit of; which evidence, with every voucher and paper relating thereto, shall be returned with their certificate aforesaid, to be recorded as aforesaid. And all the power over the said streets, lanes and alleys, lines and boundaries of lots within the said city, heretofore granted to the commissioners of Baltimore to and a special commissioner shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in the said city commissioners; and each of the said commissioners shall receive for the use of the city, from the person or persons requiring their services, the sum of one dollar for each and every day they shall attend in virtue of this ordinance.

**VI. And be it enacted and ordained,** That if any person or persons shall think himself or herself, or themselves aggrieved by the determination of said commissioners, in fixing the lines of any street, lane or alley, or the boundary of any lot, and in fixing the grade of such streets, lanes and alleys, if the proprietors of the greater portion of ground fronting thereon shall think themselves aggrieved; in such case every such person or persons, or such persons, as the case may be, may within three days next after such determination, appeal from the same to the mayor, who shall have full power and authority to issue a warrant commanding the said delinquent person or persons, to appear before him, (the determination of whom, or a majority of them shall be final) to settle all matters in dispute within ten days next after, and return their award in writing, to the register, to be by him recorded. And before the persons appointed under said warrant shall proceed to the execution of their duties, they shall make each or affirmation, that they will impartially examine the proceedings of the said commissioners, from which an appeal is prayed, and confirm or alter the same, as in their opinion is just, without favor or partiality; and the said persons shall receive from the city commissioners all documents and information which influenced and directed them in said determination from which the appeal is made.

**VII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the said commissioners shall have full power and authority to enter upon the lots, grounds or possessions of any person or persons, bodies corporate and politic, through which the common sewers now or may hereafter run, or ought to run, to regulate, make or repair the same: *Provided* that no common sewer, or water course hereafter to be made and laid out, shall be regular to be made and laid out, of ground belonging to any private person or persons, body politic or corporate, unless the same shall be agreed to and approved of by a majority of the said city commissioners, and in every such case the damages sustained by reason thereof, by such owner or owners, body politic or corporate, shall be valued and ascertained by two persons indifferently chosen, one by the said city commissioners, and the other by the owner or owners thereof, with a power in the said arbitrators, or a majority of them, shall be final; and the damages so ascertained and ascertained, shall be paid to the owner or owners so aggrieved, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

**VIII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners be and they are hereby directed, when any of the bridges within the city stand in need of repairs, to amend and repair the same in such manner as they, with the approbation of the mayor, may think fit, and draw upon the register for the amount thereof.

**IX. And be it enacted and ordained,** That whenever it shall be decided on to pave any street, lane or alley in the said city, the commissioners shall make or cause to be made a correct list of the names of the persons who are liable to pay the paving tax, and the amount to be paid by each person, and shall assess and levy the same at the rate of nine cents on each square foot, except the part allotted by ordinance for footways; and they are hereby directed to deliver to the city collector, a duplicate of such amount, under their hands and seals, with directions for collecting the said tax; nevertheless correcting any mistake in the said list, as often as they may be satisfied of the same. And the said collector shall collect the same by distress or otherwise, giving thirty days notice agreeably to law, previous to such distress, and pay over the amount to the register. And the city commissioners are hereby authorized and directed, to draw on the register for such amount of the tax, and to apply the same to the paving of the street, lane or alley, where the tax may be collected, and should said tax raise more money than would be sufficient to pave the same, that the surplus shall remain in the treasury for the use of the city; but should the said tax not be sufficient to pave the same, that then the deficiency shall be made up out of the money appropriated to the city commissioners for that purpose.

**X. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners be, and they are authorized and empowered to erect, set up, or place a rope, chain or bar, in or across any of the streets, lanes or alleys of the city, which they may be about to pave, amend or repair, for such time as they may think necessary; and that if any person or persons shall throw down, remove or

obstruct such rope, chain or bar, every such person shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of ten dollars.

**XI. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the owners or possessors of any house or lot, in front of which the street, lane or alley, has heretofore been paved, or hereafter may be directed to be paved, are required to pave, amend or repair the footway in such manner and in such time, as shall be directed by the city commissioners, provided ten days notice be given by the said commissioners in some newspaper of the city of Baltimore, to said owners or possessors, relating within said city or precincts, and in case such owner or possessor of such house or lot, do not pave, amend or repair the footway aforesaid, agreeable to the directions aforesaid, then the city commissioners are hereby authorized and directed to contract with any person or persons for paving, amending or repairing the same, for such sum or sums of money as shall be sufficient to pave, amend and repair the same; and to charge the same to such owner or possessor, who shall forfeit the said sum together with the one eighth of a dollar per foot in length as a fine for such neglect or refusal, provided always that the possessor of such house or lot shall, in the first instance be obliged to pay such sum or sums of money, directed as aforesaid; and the city commissioners are hereby directed to pave, amend and repair such footway, and the same arising to pay to the register of the city, and in case the paving, amending and repairing is done by the commissioners, under the authority and direction aforesaid, the said commissioners are hereby further authorized to draw on the register of the city, for any unappropriated money in his hands, to defray the expenses thereof, in anticipation of the sum or sums that are to be collected, from the owner or owners, in pursuance of the direction aforesaid.

**XII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners be, and they are hereby directed, when they contract for the paving of any street, lane or alley, that requires to be filled up, to give five days notice in writing to the owner or possessors of lots, on such street, lane or alley, in the city, or if not in the city, to publish the same in some one of the newspapers of the said city, or to give notice in writing to the owners or possessors of such lots, as they may think fit, to appear before the city commissioners, on the day and at the time that such street, lane or alley is filling up, and in case the owners or possessors aforesaid, shall neglect to fill up the footway, at the time aforesaid, then the said city commissioner shall, and they are hereby directed to have the same filled up to the extent, and in such manner as they may think fit, and in such manner as charge of such owner or possessor neglecting to be covered in the same manner as aforesaid, and expenses for neglecting to pay, amend and repair footways, are recoverable; and if it be found necessary, the city commissioners may draw on the register for the payment of any expenses incurred in anticipation of the recovery aforesaid.

**XIII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That if the commissioners of health, find at any time, in any street, lane or alley, in the city of Baltimore, any filth or other matter, which is dangerous to the health thereon, and the city commissioners, upon a full examination thereof, shall be of the opinion, and that the same cannot be effectually removed without paving such street, lane or alley, they are hereby authorized and required, to proceed to the paving of such street, lane or alley, and to fill up the same, and to collect the tax which may be imposed for the paving of the same, and when collected and received, to pay the same over in a certain manner as he is herein before directed. *Provided* nevertheless, that before the said warrant shall issue, it shall be approved of by the mayor, and the tax to be imposed in virtue of this ordinance, shall be the same as herein before established, and that the city commissioners shall have full power to pave the same by contract or otherwise.

**XIV. And be it enacted and ordained,** That whenever the owners of part of a street, fronting on any paved street, or part of a street, where the two ways are now guarded by posts, shall make application in writing to the city commissioners, to have the footway in front of such street or part of a street, widened and extended to the width now limited by this ordinance, the said commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized and directed, to proceed to the making of such alteration, and the owner of any house or lot, fronting on any street, or part of a street, where the footway is intended to be widened, is required and directed to pave, amend or repair the footway in front of his house or lot, after the kerbstones are set in such manner and in such time, as shall be directed by the said commissioners, who shall give ten days notice in some newspaper of the city of Baltimore, directing the paving, amending or repairing of such footway; and in case the owner of any such house or lot, do not pave, amend or repair the footway aforesaid, agreeable to the direction aforesaid, then and in that case the city commissioners are hereby authorized and directed to contract with any person or persons, for paving, amending or repairing the same, for such sum or sums of money as shall be sufficient to pave, amend or repair the same, and to charge the same to such owner, who shall forfeit the said sum, to be recovered with costs, and the collector's commission, in the same manner as taxes are directed to be recovered.

**XV. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the said city commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized and directed to regulate the pitch, and take up, lower and repave such part of the street pavement, as they in their judgment may find necessary, to lay the gutters, and to carry off the water from the footway, one half part of the expense of doing the same shall be apportioned among, and be paid for by the owners of the houses or lots fronting on the street or part of a street, where such pavement shall be so regulated and lowered, and the said one half of the expense when ascertained by the said city commissioners, shall be collected from the owners of houses or lots aforesaid, in the same manner as the tax for paving, amending or repairing the footway, is by this ordinance directed to be collected, and subject to the same commission for the collecting thereof.

**XVI. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the said city commissioners are hereby authorized and directed to procure kerbstones for the purposes aforesaid, and for all footways that shall be made hereafter, which shall not be less than four inches in thickness, and not less than sixteen inches in breadth or depth, and that the one edge thereof, which is to be fitted to the foot pavement shall be straight and levelled to the footways, and the two ends shall also be made straight; and that the upper edge of the kerbstones in front of each street, shall be of equal thickness as nearly as may be convenient.

**XVII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the said city commissioners are hereby authorized and directed, with the approbation of the Mayor, to draw on the register of the city for the tax for paving, amending or repairing the footways, when the same may be collected, and for the further sum required for procuring the

kerbstones, and to discharge the duties required by this ordinance.

**XVIII. And be it enacted and ordained,** That whenever the city commissioners be applied to for the extension of any of the foot pavements in any of the streets, lanes or alleys within the city, and it shall appear to them that the same cannot be done without widening said street in the centre of any part thereof, that the said commissioners be, and they are hereby empowered and directed to take up said street pavement and reduce said street as much as may appear necessary, to be not to injure the adjoining property on both streets, and to repave the same; *Provided* nevertheless, that the owners of property that be liable for their proportionate part opposite to their property.

**XX. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners be hereby empowered and directed to contract with any person or persons, a surveyor or surveyors, for the purpose of making a correct general survey of the city of Baltimore under their direction, and to ascertain the boundaries or squares, and the lines of the city, and to fix marks and devise thereon, and they shall cause a correct plat or plan, with proper explanations of the same to be made, together with a survey, and the commissioners aforesaid, are hereby directed, to cause to be made fair duplicate copies of the said plat, and certificates of the said survey of the city, containing the location thereof; and such other locations and information as they think necessary, and they shall sign their names to each plat and certificate, and return one to each register of the city, to be by him kept, as the true location of said city, and the other to be lodged in the office of the city commissioners for their use, and if any person shall apprehend himself aggrieved by the determination of the commissioners in the premises, such person may appeal in like manner as is provided in the 6th section of this ordinance; and the city commissioners are hereby authorized and empowered to draw on the register of the city for a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars, to enable them to carry the provisions of this section into effect.

**XXI. And be it enacted and ordained,** That the city commissioners shall be authorized and empowered in conjunction, and with the approbation of the mayor, to employ on the beat lines, any persons as they may think proper, as they may think fit, and good negroes, as they may think fit, to attend to the cleaning of the city, the annual appropriation allowed for that service; and the said commissioners, with the approbation of the mayor, shall prescribe such rules, regulations and laws of duty for the said work, as in time to time as may appear to them, to be most conducive to the utility of the city, and the said commissioners shall intend their conduct and the duties they are directed to perform, to be consistent with the law; and they shall receive their wages and emolument from the city, and they are hereby directed to return to the mayor's office, the annual appropriation allowed for that service.
