 Twelfth, At Fort Jay, West Point, Albany, Schenectady, and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of New York, Niagara and its dependencies excepted.  
 Thirteenth, At Fort Trumbull, Fort Wolcott and at any place or places where troops are or may be stationed, marched, or recruited within the State of Connecticut, Rhode Island and Vermont.

 A ration to consist of one pound and one quarter of the best, or three quarters of a pound of pork, eight ounces of bread or flour, one gill of rum, whiskey or brandy, and at the rate of two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar, four pounds of soap, and one pound and a half of candles to every hundred rations. The prices of the several component parts of the ration shall be specified, but the United States reserve the right of making such alterations in the price of the component parts of the ration as shall make the price of each part thereof bear a just proportion to the proposed price of the whole ration. The rations are to be furnished in such quantities, that there shall at all times, during the term of the proposed contract, be sufficient for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, Detroit and Chicago for six months in advance; and at each of the other posts on the western waters for at least three months in advance, of good and wholesome provisions, in the same full be required. It is also to be permitted to all and every of the commandants of fortified places or posts, to call for, at seasons when the same can be transported, or at any time in case of emergency, such supplies of like provisions in advance, as in the discretion of the commandant shall be deemed proper.  
 It is understood that the contractor is to be at the expense and risk of mixing the supplies to the troops, and that all losses sustained by the destruction of an enemy or by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid by the United States at the price of the articles captured or destroyed as aforesaid, on the deposition of two or more persons of creditable characters and the certificate of a commissioned officer, stating the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.  
 The privilege is understood to be referred to the United States of requiring that none of the supplies, which may be furnished under any of the proposed contracts, shall be used, until the supplies which have been or may be furnished under contracts now in force, have been consumed; and that a supply in advance may be required at any of the said posts on the Kansas, or Indian frontier, not exceeding six months.
