**BURR.**

Natchez, Feb. 10, 1807.—On Monday the 2d inst. an adjourned session of the supreme court of the Mississippi territory, was held in the town of Washington, to which Aaron Burr was recognized to appear, and answer such bill of indictment as might then and there be exhibited against him. Colonel Burr appeared on the day mentioned in his recognizance, attended by his counsel William B. Shields and Lyman Harding, Esqrs. Agreeable to a venire facias, issued by the hon. Thomas Rodney and Peter B. Bruin, a jury of seventy-two freeholders appeared in court, and on the day following twenty-three of their number were selected by the court as a grand inquest. The hon. Thomas Rodney then delivered to them a comprehensive and impressive charge, and the court was adjourned till ten o'clock the succeeding day—at which time Mr. Poindexter, the attorney-general, moved the court to discharge the grand jury. He stated that after examining the depositions submitted to him by the court, he did not discover any testimony which brought the offences charged against colonel Burr, within the jurisdiction of the courts of the Mississippi territory; that the supreme court of the Mississippi territory was not a court of original jurisdiction, either criminal or civil, and could take cognizance only of points reserved at the trial in the respective circuit courts where all criminal prosecutions must originate according to the statutes of the territory. He further observed, that in order to secure the public safety, the territorial judges ought immediately to convey the accused to a tribunal competent to try and punish him, (if guilty of the charges alleged against him) which they might legally do, and thereby effectually prevent the contemplated military expedition against Mexico, and maintain inviolate the laws and constitution of the United States.—He therefore hoped that inasmuch as the attorney prosecuting for the United States had no bills for the consideration of the grand jury, that they would be discharged.

Colonel Burr made several observations against the motion, and remarked, that if the attorney general had no business for the grand jury, he had, and that therefore they ought not to be dismissed. On this motion the court was divided. Judge Bruin declared himself opposed to discharging the grand jury, unless colonel Burr was also instantly discharged from his recognizance. The attorney-general then withdrew, and the grand jury were directed to retire to their room, who in the course of the day returned with sundry presentments, which are given at large in this day's Messenger. We deem it unnecessary to remark that these presentments were not founded on any bill exhibited to the grand jury, and that being negative, they met no further attention than a mere perusal.

On Wednesday evening, the grand jury were discharged, and colonel Burr demanded a release from his recognizance—this the court refused. He did not appear in court on Tuesday morning, it was reduced to a certainty, that he had made his escape.

We understand that his excellency gov. Williams, intended to seize on the person of col. Burr, the moment he was discharged by the judicial authority.

At a supreme court held for the Mississippi territory at the town of Washington, on Tuesday the 3d February 1807.

The grand jury of the Mississippi territory, on a due investigation of the evidence brought before them are of opinion that Aaron Burr has not been guilty of any crime or misdemeanor against the laws of the United States, or of this territory, or given any just occasion for alarm or inquietude to the good people of this territory.

The grand jury present as a grievance the late military expedition, unnecessarily as they conceive, fitted out against the person and property of said Aaron Burr, where no resistance had been made to the ordinary civil authority.

The grand jury also present as a grievance, destructive of personal liberty, the late military arrests, made without warrant, and as they conceive, without other lawful authority; and that they do seriously regret that so much cause should be given to the enemies of our glorious constitution, to rejoice at such measures being adopted in a neighbouring territory, as if sanctioned by the executive of our country, must sap the vitals of our political existence, and crumble this glorious fabric in the dust.

NEW YORK, March 18.  
A Jamaica paper of the 14th ult. says, we learn that a reinforcement of 300 men, consisting of seamen and marines, will proceed immediately from Kingston for Curacao; and that Capt. Brisbane, of the Arcturua, goes there as Governor.  
The same paper states, that his honor the Lieutenant Gov'r has received by the Pickier, information that his Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex may soon be expected in this island in the capacity of Governor.  
Yesterday afternoon our new Mayor, Col. Willett, was sworn into office.  
The House of Assembly have passed the bill suspending the execution of David Williams, convicted of the murder of Ira Lane, for ten years, on the ground of insanity at the time of committing the felony. They have also passed in committee a bill suspending the execution of Steven Arnold, convicted of the murder of Betsey Van Amburg, for 3 years—and that in the mean time he be transferred to the State Prison for safe keeping.  
Deaths in this city during the last week: Men 14, Women 8, Boys 13, Girls 11—Total 46.  
On Sunday evening an appropriate and elegant Sermon was delivered in the New Dutch Church, by the Rev. Dr. Abel; and a collection of Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars taken up, for the benefit of "the Society for the relief of poor Widows with small Children."  
We understand the Governor of Barbice has issued an order, prohibiting the exportation of coffee from that island.

The following letter, with its enclosures was forwarded to the Editor of the MERCANTILE ADVERTISER, from Mr. JOHN KING, a merchant of respectable ability at Jaquemel, by the English schr. Alert, capt. Dill, which sailed from thence for St. Thomas on the 6th Feb.

To the Editor of the Mercantile Advertiser.  
Sir,  
I have the pleasure to inclose you a letter from ROBERT SAUNDERS, (a) and sundry papers from a number of Americans connected with the expedition of General Miranda, now detained as slaves by the Spanish government at Carthage-na, which I received from the Main a few days ago by captain (b) who generously tried to put in their possession one hundred dollars, but was prevented by the extreme jealousy of the Spaniards, who will not allow any person to speak to or render them any assistance. The papers are as follow:  
1. A copy of their memorial to Congress (c).  
2. A copy of a paper found loose, without date or direction, in the hand writing of Lippincott, stating the names and sentence of a number of his companions. (d).  
3. A list of letters 18 in number. (e).  
4. An original paper from the scamen of the schooner Bee. (f).  
5. An original paper addressed to Capt. (g).  
Copies of all which, with Saunders's letter, I have taken, and shall transmit duplicates in the due course. As the letters were put in the ceiling of the vessel that brought them, 8 or 10 were destroyed by the rats; to whom directed, or from whom, I could not ascertain.  
Should the trade to this island be opened by the American government, a few cargoes of lumber would bring a monstrous price, for the houses here are all in want of some repair.—Shingles would be an excellent article. White pine boards will bring 7 or 8 dollars per 100, and perhaps more.  
Pork 30 dollars, flour 20, and beef 24, on the rise, and scarce.  
Dry goods will always command a good market—By dry goods I mean German linens; nothing else seems to answer these people.  
Claret 48 to 54 per hhd. scarce.  
Herrings 6 dollars, a quantity at market.  
Codfish if nice and white, 9 to 10 dolls. per 100 lbs. American weight. The weight should always be marked on the cask.  
There is no flour at market; not a barrel can be bought. The small quantity at present here is in possession of government for the use of the army.  
Coffee, the staple of this place, can now be bought for cash at 9-50 to 10 dolls. per 100, French weight.—A vast quantity is at market, and one tenth of the late crop not in. I am, with respect your obedient servant,

(a) ROBERT SAUNDERS was for many years foreman in the office of the Mercantile Advertiser, an active and intelligent man of a respectable family in Maryland. He was seduced from his duty and his interest by the specious misrepresentations of the persons who conducted the business of Miranda preparatory to his expedition, and was captured in the schooner Bee. His fate is well known.—The letter alluded to, which develops some hitherto mysterious circumstances connected with that expedition, may appear hereafter.  
(b) The name of this benevolent captain is not given to the editor. The intelligent reader will at once perceive the good policy of the concealment.  
(c) For reasons which must be obvious the publication of this "plain unvarnished" Memorial is deferred.  
(d) A correct abstract of this paper was published about two weeks ago in the American as it was received from the Spanish Government at Caraccas.
