CARTHAGENA, Dec. 15, 1856.

Dear Sir, After taking my leave of you, I shipped on board the ship Bee, capt. Huddell, belonging to the United States, bound to St. Domingo, and from thence back to Philadelphia. After we arrived in St. Domingo, and after lying there 5 months, the ship called Leander, capt. Lewis, came in and chartered the schooner for fifty days; unknown to us where bound to. We applied to our captain for a discharge. He replied he would not discharge us. We told him we would not go unless he would inform us where the schooner was going. The captain then had the ship Leander, and two boats came along side the Bee, with men armed with pistols and cutlasses; cut and slash fore and aft decks—threw us in a boat, and took us on board of the ship—kept us there till the ship got ready to sail—sent us on board of the schooner again, and went to the Spanish Main; and there was taken a sentence to hard labor in Carthagea for 8 years.

I would be very glad if you would receive my wages, from the twentieth of September to the twenty-seventh of March, 25 dollars a month. If I should ever return, I shall recover heavy damages for my sufferings. There are 10 fellow-sufferers with me, working every day at digging, with a long chain fastened to each. There were 57 sentenced; 10 hung. I remain,

WASHINGTON CITY, March 18.

Advices are received from N. Orleans as late as the 17th of February. From these and other sources of information, it appears that all was tranquil at New Orleans, and that a relaxation had taken place in the measures adopted for defending that place.

The following statements will exhibit the course pursued towards Burr at Nat. chez. [Published in yesterday's American.]

There is the best reason to believe that his object was to precipitate a trial, and of consequence to get an acquittal, after which he could not be tried again for the same offence. This would, indeed, have been a triumph. In this, however, he has been defeated; and when the necessary proof shall be collected he may hereafter be prosecuted and brought to justice.

In the mean time his escape proves, either that he was afraid to meet a full enquiry into his conduct, or that he still has objects in view which required his presence to further. Every effort on the part of General Wilkinson to take him had failed; and no one was able to say what had become of him, or whether he had fled.

The public will unquestionably be astonished at the presentment of the grand jury. It has, however, been the misfortune of the Mississippi territory to have been long divided by parties as well of a personal as political nature, and it is very probably, in some measure, to this circumstance that we owe this strange act. But let it be recollected that the measure was taken entirely on negative testimony; that the attorney of the district, confiding the court as not possessed of cognizance of the case, declined acting in the business. As it was from this quarter alone that evidence against Burr could be rationally expected, of course the jury must have been confined to ex parte evidence virtually exculpatory of him.

It is said that Burr's flotilla of fifteen boats had moved from their station off

Cole's river; but that some of them had been destroyed, and others considerably injured, by a high wind that sprung up.

NEW-ORLEANS, Feb. 15.

It does not appear that Aaron Burr was confined on board of one of the U. S. armed vessels, as was stated in the Orleans Gazette of yesterday. It was contemplated to arrest him, and the plan was intrusted to so many secret keepers, that Mr. Burr's spies learnt it, and he thought proper to be off.

CHARLESTON, March 5.

By the ship Middleton, Capt. SPENCER, in 35 days from Bourdeaux, we last evening received French papers to the 15th January.

From the slight perusal which we have been able to give our papers, we do not discover any thing of importance relating to the war.

From a Paris paper of the 31 January, we have translated the following important article:

"The measures which are prescribed by the Imperial Decree declaring the British Islands in a state of Blockade, are to be carried into execution in all their parts. Several American and Portuguese vessels, which had arrived in the port of Cherbourg, and afterwards were driven into England, were not permitted to return into port."

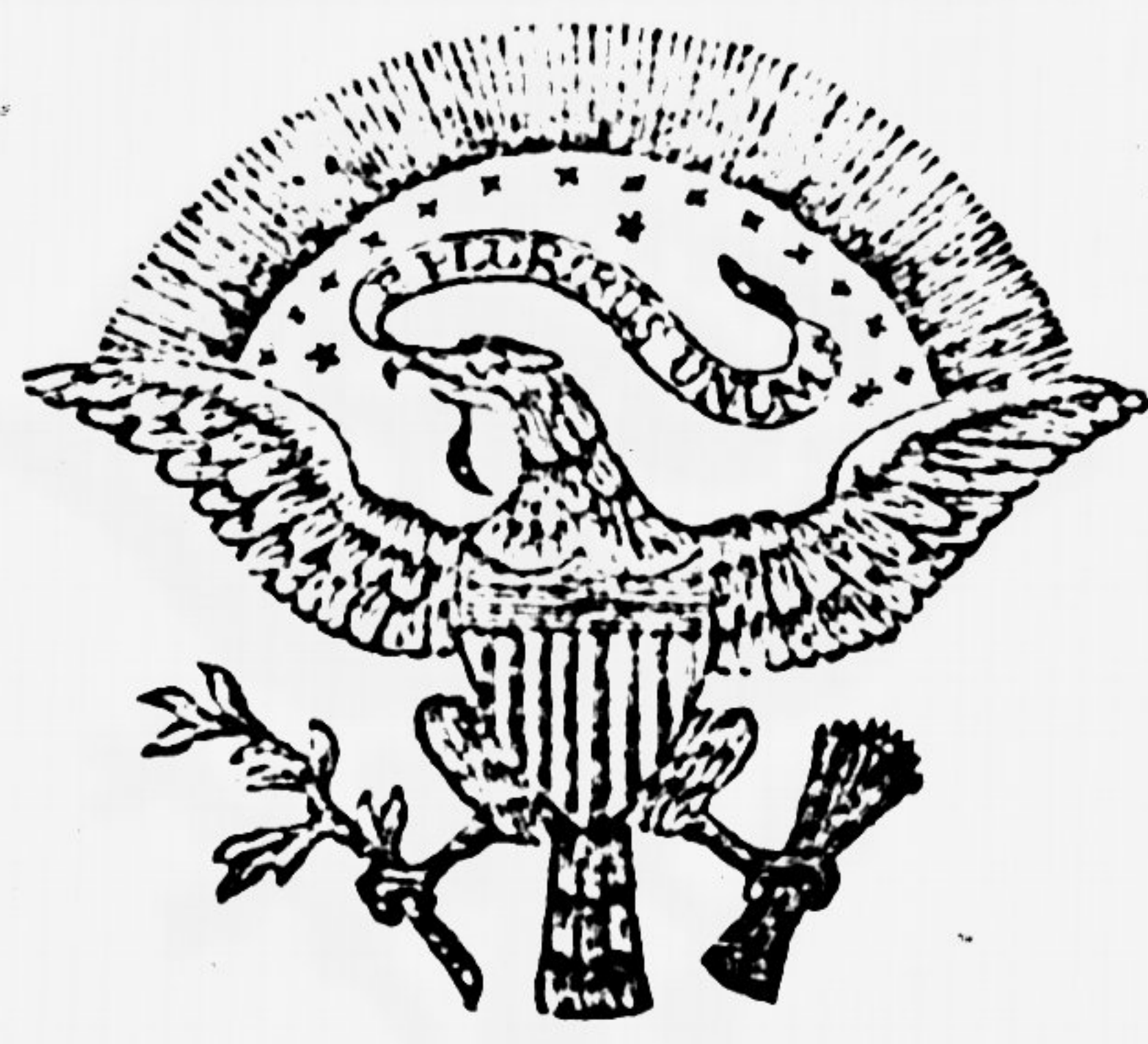

Howard, Hugh Hall, Francis Labreche, Hugh McNeal, John Shields, George Shannon, John Potts, John Baptiste Le Page, John B. AN ORDINANCE

To direct the paving of a part of Granby and Wilkes streets.

Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor & City Council of Baltimore, That the City Commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized and required, to lay out, open and extend Granby street, agreeably to an act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed January the third, one thousand eight hundred and seven, and to authorize and empower the City Commissioners of the City of Baltimore, to alter and extend the streets therein mentioned.

II. And let it enacted and ordained, That when Granby street shall be laid out, opened and extended, agreeably to the provisions of the act of Assembly above mentioned, the City Commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized and directed, to grade, place kerbstones, and pave all that part of Granby street from the north side of Prince-street to Wilkes street, and all that part of Wilkes street from the west side of Granby street to the east side of Eden street.

III. And let it enacted and ordained, That the City Commissioners be, and they are hereby required to issue their warrant to the City Collector, (who is hereby required to collect the tax for paving the same) agreeably to the provisions of an ordinance, entitled "an ordinance to appoint City Commissioners, and prescribing their duties."

IV. And let it enacted and ordained, That the City Commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized, as the work progresses, to draw on the register of the City in anticipation of the funds arising from the paving tax, for such sum or sums of money as may be found necessary to complete the paving before mentioned.

AN ORDINANCE

Authorizing James Biays to build a wharf on the south side of Allifanna street, in the city of Baltimore.

And let it enacted and ordained by the Mayor & City Council of Baltimore, That permission be, and the same is hereby granted unto James Biays his heirs and assigns, to fill up and erect a wharf in front of his property and fourth of Allifanna street, in the eighth ward of the city to be contained within the following distances and subject to the following proviso. Beginning on the fourth side of Allifanna street, at the distance of fifty-four feet east, from the fourth east corner of Wallington and Allifanna streets, and extending thence easterly on Allifanna street one hundred feet, and from that front to be extended with equal width fourward and parallel with Wallington street, sixty-six feet, provided, that the said James Biays, his heirs or assigns, shall on the progress of the said work, fill up with the surface of said wharf all that part of Allifanna street situated in front of said wharf.

AN ORDINANCE

Respecting the election of the Mayor and the City Council of Baltimore.

I. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That in case of any vacancies happening in the first branch of the city council, or electors of the mayor and members of the second branch of the city council, the mayor is hereby authorized and directed, upon either of such vacancies happening, immediately to issue his warrant to the judges of the election in the ward where such vacancies shall happen, authorizing and directing them, or a majority of them, to hold an election in said ward, for a member of the first branch of the city council, or an election of the mayor and second branch of the city council, for said ward, as the case may be, to fill up such vacancies; and the said judges shall give three days public notice previous to said election of the time and place in said ward of holding such election.

II. And let it enacted and ordained, That the election for the several wards shall be held at such place in each ward as the judges in their discretion shall deem convenient for the purpose of holding the same, and the judges and clerks shall have and receive for their services, in lieu of all other expenses attending said elections and exclusive of the sum they may receive from the county, two dollars each, which the register of the city is hereby authorized to pay.

III. And let it enacted and ordained, That the judges of elections shall within three days after each election make return thereof and deposit their polls with the register of the city, to be by him safe kept with the records of his office, whose duty it shall be to attend the first branch of the city council, and the electors of the mayor and second branch of the city council with the said returns and polls if required, and the same again to receive and deposit in his office; and the register neglecting to comply with the duties herein directed, shall forfeit and pay the sum of twenty dollars, for each and every such neglect.

AN ORDINANCE

To prohibit the landing of fire wood on part of Light-Street wharf.

WHEREAS the objects contemplated by the general assembly of Maryland in providing for the establishment of Tobacco inspection houses, at the head of the Basin, are greatly impeded by the landing of fire wood on part of Light-Street wharf, in front of said tobacco inspection houses, and the persons carrying tobacco to, and taking it from the said inspection houses, are frequently subjected to considerable and improper delays, for remedy whereof, the proprietor of said inspection houses hath petitioned the mayor and city council of Baltimore, to enact some effectual provision; therefore,

And let it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That from and after the first day of July next, no fire wood shall be landed upon that part of Light-Street wharf, in front of said inspection houses, beginning for the said part at the south side of Pratt Street, and extending thence southwardly to said wharf, to the distance of one hundred and five feet, and every person or persons carrying fire wood shall forfeit and pay one dollar, for each and every cord of fire wood landed contrary to the provisions of this ordinance.
