The Rhode Island regiment of blacks mounted one night, at a time when the British kept up an incessant cannonade of round, grape and cannister shot: Two blacks were placed as centinels together, upon the same spot; one sat down, the other lay on his beily, to observe the motion of the enemy, and to give timely notice, if they should attempt to sally. - When the relief came, the corporal found both in the same position he had left them : On demanding of the one sitting, why hedid not rise, he answered laconically, " I believe massa, Ise wounded, and I guess Cuffee dead; hant pok dis good while." On examination, Cullee was really dead; 3 canister shot having entered his head; and pour Sambo had the bones of his leg & arm both terribly shattered. On carrying them within the lines, the surgeons found it necessary to amputate Sambo's leg: when the poor fellow was informed of it, he, with a truly heroic spirit, replied, " Well, come, massa take um ost, say no more about um." Having borne that with the patience of an Epistetus, he was informed it was absolutely necessary to take off his arm: Although under the most excruciating pains, when the surgeons began to condole with him on his peculiar misfortune, he exclaimed, " Neber mind, massa, take um off-tank God, I got noder leg, noder arm left for um et." Had he been a Roman aistead of an African, how would ke have been celebrated!

> IN ASSEMBLY, MARCH 9, 18:7. AN ACT,

To prevent Friends in Insurance on Lottery Tick-

Be it exacted by the people of the State of New-York represented in the Senate and Assembly, That it shall be lawful for any person, being the owner of a Lottery Ticket in any Lottery authorifed within this state, to have infurance once made on such Ticket; and all infurances or agreements, or Contracts in the nature, or to the effect, or by way of Infurance, or wagering, or betting on the number of any Lottery Ticket in any Lotery, or any share or part thereof, shall be and hereby is declared to be unlawful; Insurance, Wagering or Betting, thall, on conviction, be punished by Fine and Imprisonment, in the Bridewell or other common gaol of the County, or by either of them, in the differction of the Court before whom the conviction thall be had; and the Courts of General Sessi ns of the Peace shall have cognizance of the offence above declared; and mereover, the Justices of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol delivery and Selsions of the Peace, thall at the same time when they charge the Grand Jurors to enquire of ossences agranit the act to prevent Private Lotteries, alto charge them to enquire of offences against this act.

A very interesting discertation upon the dispersion of the light of lamps, by means of shades, by count Rumford, was lately real at the nati-- tional institute of France, in illustration of the principle of a new lamp which he has invented. He controverts the idea that semi-trusparent shades will soften the light of Argand lamps, or cause any loss of light andrecommend, that shades of roughened glass be more generally adopted, as they prevent the huriful execs of direct light upon the eye, better than any other shades. With respect to this glass, he observes, that it is by no means opaque, for in the operation of roughtening, its surface acquires an uninterrupted collection of asperities, the ugh which the light passes as easily as through clear glass. The G: Imall surfaces disperse the cylendrical pencils or rays, transforming them into cones; and the lots of light is by no means so confiderable, as when shades are used of crape or gauze. He recommends that the thades in general thould be made larger than they usually are, as the larger their size, the less luminous they appear when looked at. He also adds, if the windows of houses in courts and alleys were glazed with roughened glass they would admir much more light than is obtained through clear panes; as in the latter cate, the rays fall on the glass at so fauall an angle of incidence, that they are mostly thrown off by reflection, initead of entering the room.-The account of his new lamp, the object of which is to save light in the illumination of large rooms, is too complex to be described in

It appears that they were each to bring two loads to the mouth of Cash river, thirty miles below Fort Massac, there to be pin on braid an Orleans flat, and fent down the river, two of the witnesses declared that they understood the lead was for the public. The testimony was considered too vague for a profecution; but as the owner of the boats was deeply involved in debt, and executions to a confiderable amount were in the sheriff's hands, the theriff immediately levied on the property, and the crew abandoned the

Mr. Burr reached Fredericksburg on the afternoon of the 25th inft. in charge of a party under the command of Mr. Perkins. In consequence of instructions received at that place, the party were to return to Richmond, and were expected to leave Fredericksburg in the mail stage that night; in which case they would reach Richmond on the 26th inst.

We have received no authentic information of the particular circumflances attending the arrest of col. Burr. It is, however, rumoured that he was apprehended by a plain countryman, who had not even heard of Governor Williams's proclamation, and who, with a numher of his neighbors, undertook to escort him to the feat of government.
