From the Salem Register.

The movements of Russia render the character
of the war uncertain. That the Russians had
retreated, yet the French had not obtained that
decisive victory which has finalized many of
their engagements. It is now to be seen whether
the Russians will continue to retreat, (and then
negotiations may be expected) or whether they will
again commit their fate to the decision
of a battle. Livonia, which lies in the route
of the Russians towards their Capital, is as
soon as discovered a depôt to reduce this country,
it sought the protection of Sweden. It soon after
came into the possession of the Swedes, and
was delivered to Sweden. But after the northern
war of the last century, in 1714, Sweden
ceded this country to Russia forever. But the
Swedes soon discovered what a sacrifice they
had made, and in 1744, attempted to recover
part of this country; but in 1743, Russia was
confirmed in its possession, and acquired a portion
of Finland, which it has been troubled, since
then, with the expense of defending. The
Swedes recovered Riga in 1743, but lost it again
in 1747, and have never recovered it since.
Russia has now 160,000 men in the field, and
is in full force, and is supported by a
large fleet, and a powerful army.

The English have been greatly
impressed by the success of the French
in this war, and have been induced to
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
