Communications.

From the great scarcity of wood which has prevailed for three days past in the city, and the high price exacted for the same, the Mayor has taken measures to remedy the evil; by which means the citizens of Baltimore may in some degree be relieved, as a quantity of wood has been procured in the country, which was employed to convey the same to town, and which will be ready for sale and delivery in small quantities, the early part of this day at 8 o'clock, in the vicinity of the Market office, at a price not exceeding 80 cents per cord.

A letter is said to have been received, by a gentleman in this city, from his friend in Bordeaux or Paris, dated about the 20th January, giving an account of a severe action of 24 hours, after that of December 24th, between the French and Russians. At the close of this long struggle, which was extremely sharp and bloody, the Emperor of France is said to have thrown a body of 100,000 men into the Russian rear, by a wonderful and untold march. This maneuver produced a total rout of the Russians, who had 20,000 men killed, taken, & wounded.

ILLNESS OF BONAPARTE.

The London Standard Review of Jan. 23 says: "Through an authentic channel, we have received advice that Bonaparte's health has been so much impaired by the fatigue and anxiety to which he has of late been exposed, as to impair his military capacity, and the most serious apprehensions for his safety."

He has for some time laboured under a drooping complaint, and has been under the advice of his physicians, to discontinue the use of opium. He also drinks excessive quantities of coffee, which, it is supposed, has become a practice which is supposed to have contributed to that languor and debility which occasionally oppress him in such a degree, as to render him incapable of any ordinary exertion.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Washington.

"It appears extraordinary, that some of the public prints, which they do not excite, reflect on the character and conduct of Gen. Wilkinson, should not give publicity to such things as are in his favour. That his late conduct has saved New Orleans and perhaps prevented a repetition of the Union cannot be doubted. He is charged with a treasonable correspondence with G. V. Moore, to whom he presented a memorial in 1812, or 1813, for which memorial he received the unanimous thanks of Kentucky in full convention, (proceedings of that convention I have now in my possession) that is, he charged in 1812, with an address to a treatable man, for which he received the thanks of his country, in 1812. He is charged with having received money from the Spaniards. Mr. Daniel Clark, a delegate from New Orleans, affirms that it is false to his own knowledge, for that he saw no information on this subject. He asked the intendant General of New Orleans, who attended him on his tour, that Gen. Wilkinson received money from the Spaniards, a government; but to satisfy you fully that the intendant, I will furnish the secret service money book to your inspection, he did so, and Mr. C. says he examined it with care, and declares that there was no charge therefor money paid Gen. W. or that in any way whatever could be construed as for his use."

On the 16th of April last, the republicans of this, and the adjacent towns, convened to commemorate the anniversary of the Battle of Bennington; and appointed a committee to draft addresses to Major General Stark, who commanded the patriots on that memorable day. The committee have palately communicated to us their addresses with the outwre received from general Stark—which we presume will be very acceptable to our readers.

Epitome of the World, Bennington, Aug. 16, 1866.

Dear Sir,

By directions of a numerous and respectable body of republican citizens, of this and the adjoining towns, convened for the purpose of commemorating the glorious battle fought on the 16th of August 1777, commonly called the Bennington battle, the undersigned in their behalf are instructed to inform you of the grateful feelings they entertain for your person—that they duly appreciate the eminent and important services you have rendered your country, and more especially the people of this vicinity on this auspicious day.

They ever have and still consider the brilliant success on that day achieved by the wisdom of your plans, and the promptness of their execution, to have been a fatal check to the success of General Burgoyne, and which shortly after produced the surrender of his whole army to the American troops.

The few officers and soldiers yet living, who were immediately under your command, still hail you as their fortunate and brave general—while those who were then children, or unborn, hail you as the patriot of your country, and acknowledge the blessings they enjoy from the prosperity of your arms.

The citizens composing this meeting are highly gratified when they learn through the chan-

nel of the newspapers, that you still retain a devotion and still love for your country—while many of your compatriots in their opinions, have apostatized and forgotten the important object of the American revolution.

You have their fervent prayers that your days may be prolonged—not doubting (when they shall end)—that posterity will hold you in honorable remembrance.

We send you, venerable general, our warmest affection and wishes.

GENTLEMEN,

I have received your affectionate address of the 16th of April, and while it revives the remembrance of painful and difficult times, it also brings to my recollection a numerous and respected band of faithful friends in the State of Vermont, and particularly in Bennington and its vicinity. The battle of the 16th of August, 1777, which terminated in favour of the Vermonters, and is honorable for the troops who were engaged in it, was more the effect of prompt execution, than of any previous plan. When I consider that three detachments of militia—

one from the town of Bennington, one from the town of Ferrisburgh, one from the town of Waterbury, and one from the town of Vergennes, and the other to attack an encampment of the British, and in a short time put in the enemy's hands, it is more proper to be ascribed to a superior power than to any human calculation.

I felt, the bravery of the troops, but felt to their commander, who had hardly time to mount the hill before they were engaged with victory.

To the officers of the 10th of August, who were my comrades in this perilous time, I pay you a tribute of affection, and in the words of the poet, "I shall not be forgotten, as long as I live, and as long as I breathe, and as long as I have a friend."

I have ever lamented that even one of my compatriots in arms, did not have forgotten the principles of the revolution, but more art and labor have been applied to equip their arms and military training in a militia. I have ever fondly hope, that the 16th of August, will be a day to be remembered in the hearts of the upright and generous.

To your parents and of which, you have no other than—That you may enjoy a republican and loyal government; that you may be favored with wisdom to appreciate the blessings of the American Union, and that you may find the means that are necessary to render you a useful citizen, and as well as a patriot, to our American people—the soldier's property, and the land and every honorable service.
