#### FRENCH GRAND ARMY.

45th Bulletin of the Grand Army.

"GOLIMYN, Dec. 28. " Marshal Ney, charged with executing the managuvres by which he was to drive the Ruffian lieutement general Lettocq from Wreka, to outflank him-and, by thele means, to cut of hi con munication with the Rumans, has executed thete movements with his accustomed ability and intrepidity. On the 23d, gen. Marchaud's divisions moved to Guruzno. On the 24th, the enemy was purfued to Kunsbrook. On the 25th, the division came to an action, by which the enemy's rear fussered some loss. On the 26th the enemy having collected at Soldau Miawa, marthal Ney was determined to advance and attack him. The Pruffians were in petlession of Soldan with 6000 infantry, and about 1000 cavalry, and, being defended by moraffes and other obfineles about the place, they thought themfevies fecure against any attack. All those difficulties, however, were furmounted by the 40th and 78th regiments. The enersy defended himseif in all the ffreets of the place, and was every where driven with fixed bayonets,-Gen. Lefterey, obterving the imall number of the troops that had attacked him, withed to retake the place. In the course of the night he made four fuccessive attacks, without effect. He atterwards retired to Neidenburg. Six pieces of cannon, fome colors, and a great number of pritoi ers, are the effects of this affair at Soldan. -Marthal Ney praises general Von der Weldt, who was wounded. The alto makes particular mention of cel. Brunn er the ogth, whose behavior was highly encouraging.

The public have been favored, in yesterday's Gazette, with the second number of " The Tablet." We feel at all times d'sposed to do our duty; to combat error, and to controvert aught that is worthy of controverly: But we must confels, that to wage a war of words, to contend against a bubbling, drivelling production, crammed with fuffy quotations and party dogmas, is too much for our patience. The whole number goes to shew the necessity of war-measures, and attempts to ridicule Mr. Jesserson for preferring " the boe and the plough" to the "tomahawk and scalping knife" Such sentiments, if even conveyed by an elegant writer, would be despicable; but when uthered to the world with all the formality of dullness, they are also contemptible. Whenever " The Tablet" contains any thing worthy of ferious notice, it will not be neglected.

REMARKS, On Mr. Hali's string of Resolves concluded. In my former number I examined Mr. Hale's two first refolves, and shewed the fallacy of them. In this, I thall extract fuch parts of his remaining resolves as expose themselves most to jublic notice.

His third refulve is merely declamation about the old bug-bear of fortifications. His fourth resolve is an indecent invective against congress on the same subject. In his fifth resolve he speaks of " the public

" debt being materially reduced, and of the favor-

able prospects of its total extinction in a few years " by the buppy and successful operation, he lays, " of the funding system." But what funding fellow does he mean? It cortainly is not by the operation of any funding in the adminiftration of Washington and Adams. The public debt encreased in both those administrations; and as to John Adams, he left the treasury overflowing with debt, and the country overrun with internal taxes. It is by the economy and wife management of the pretent administration only that the happy effects of which Mr. Hale speaks has been produced, but it does not suit him to fay fo. O malignancy thou art a hateful

Mr. Hale concludes his resolves by proposing in consequence of this flourishing flate of the revenue, that congress should appropriate to each flate a fum equal to the impost revenus which each flate may produce, to be employed for the purpose of sortifications. This is what in common life is called " a take in" There is comething infidious in it which I fiall expose. when I come to remark on the resolve which

follows, to which this is an introduction.
