FRENCH GRAND ARMY.

4th Bulletin of the Grand Army.

4018 BULLETIN, Dec. 28. " Marshal Ney, charged with executing the movements by which he was to drive the Russian lieutenant general Lettow from Wreka, to outflank him; and, by these means, to cut off his communication with the Rumanians, has executed these movements with his accustomed ability and intrepidity. On the 23d, gen. Marchand's divisions moved to Koruzon. On the 24th, the enemy was purified to Kumbrook. On the 25th, the division came to an action, by which the enemy's rear suffered some loss. On the 26th the enemy having collected at Soldau Muxva, marshal Ney was determined to advance and attack him. The Prussians were in possession of Soldau with 6000 infantry, and about 1000 cavalry, and being defended by morasses and other obstacles, about the place, they thought themselves secure against any attack. All their difficulties, however, were surmounted by the 4th and 5th regiments. The enemy defended himself in all the breaches of the place, and was everywhere driven with fixed bayonets.—Gen. Lettow, observing the small number of the troops that had attacked him, wished to retrace the place. In the course of the night he made four successive attacks, without effect. He afterwards retired to Neidenburg. Six pieces of cannon, three colors, and a great number of prisoners, are the effects of this affair at Soldau. — Marshal Ney praises general Von der Wellt, who was wounded. He also makes particular mention of col. Brun of the 69th, whose behavior was highly encouraging.

" On the same day, the 5th marched to Lauterberg.

" During the action at Soldau, Gen. Marchand's division drove the enemy from Muxva, where it had a great action took place.

" Marshal Bessieres had already taken possession of Gersdorf, with the 12th corps of cavalry, on the 17th. The enemy feeling the importance of this position, in trying that the wing of the French army wished to cut the Prussians off from the Rumanians, made an attempt to retake the place; this gave rise to the engagement at Gersdorf.

" On the 21st at 8 o'clock, the enemy approached by various ways. Marshal Bessieres had placed on each of the companies of infantry he had upon the bridge, working the enemy up, each in great numbers, he ordered gen. Grouchy to advance with his division to meet them. The enemy had already made himself master of the village of Carmin, and which he had taken a position of infantry.

" Being informed that the Prussian army, the enemy's main body, was to be the Prussian main body, and that the Prussians had five hundred prisoners, the pieces of cannon, and two hundred and fifty pieces of baggage. Marshal Bessieres follows them, but circumstances upon gen. Grouchy, gen. Ronge, and his corps of the Staff gen. Bismarck, the chief of a squadron of the 9th dragons, distinguished himself. M. Laing, Captain of the 1st company of that regiment, is killed.

" M. Berran, aide de camp of Marshal Bessieres, is killed. In general only 1000 of the Prussian army were killed, and 2000 wounded. The Prussian army of the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, 32nd, 33rd, 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42nd, 43rd, 44th, 45th, 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th, 50th, 51st, 52nd, 53rd, 54th, 55th, 56th, 57th, 58th, 59th, 60th, 61st, 62nd, 63rd, 64th, 65th, 66th, 67th, 68th, 69th, 70th, 71st, 72nd, 73rd, 74th, 75th, 76th, 77th, 78th, 79th, 80th, 81st, 82nd, 83rd, 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th, 88th, 89th, 90th, 91st, 92nd, 93rd, 94th, 95th, 96th, 97th, 98th, 99th, 100th.

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
