WASHINGTON CITY, April 10.

Dirp, on Wednelday latt, in his 50th year, JOHN BECKLEY, Efquire, Clerk et tie Hotre of Representatives of the United States. He was born in Great Eritain; but, when only eleven years old, came, under the protection of his uncle, to this country, where he has continued to reside ever fince.

Our contest with Great Britain no sooner began to unfold itself, than yielding to the moth ardent impulse of patrictism, he took an active part in it, and assumed the discharge of duties full of responsibility and danger, and particularly those of the Mayoratty of Richmond, a place affigned him, notwithstanding his youth, by the confidence of his fellow citizens, and at a period when the British army was over-running the flate of Virginia.

Having been educated to the bar, he purfued that profession with reputation, so far as various public duties admitted, until the organization of the General Government, when he was chosen clerk of the House of Representatives, a place which he filled with rare, perhaps unprecedented diftinction, with the intermission of a term of two years, until his deceale. His articulation was diffinct, his elecution commanding, and his parliamentary knowledge accurate and extensive. But his highest distinction was his inflexible patriotilm, and adherence to republican principles. Through the period of his life he pursued an unbending course. Devoted to the cause of liberty, much of his happiness slowed from its triumphs; and the zeal which prompted him in the ardor of youth, to refift external tyranny, remained unabated during the more mature period of life, against internal
