And be it enasted, That before any constable fliall be entitled to receive the allowance granted by the fourth section of the act, entitled, An act to prevent the tumultuous meetings and other ; irregularities of negroes and other flaves, he shall produce a ceatificate from at least two retpectable citizens of his hundred, of his industry and fidelity in the discharge of his duty under this act and the act above recited.

And, for a further encouragement to take up runaways, Be it enaffed, That in lieu of two hundred pounds of tobacco, allowed by the act, entitled, An act relating to servants and slaves, any person seizing and taking up such runaways, Malkhave and receive fix dollars.

The extra sheet issued from the office of the American yesterday, contained the 58th Bulletia at full length—the substance of the 56th and 57th were given by way of introduction. Theis Bulletins were received at Philadelphia by the arrival (at Marcus Hook) of the brig Lydia, captain Webb, in 40 days from Bordeaux. They furnish the events of the Continental War down to the 10th of February. The extra sheet will be furnished to our country subscribers, but we deem it a duty to give the 56th and 57th Bulletins entire; accordingly they appear in this morning's paper. The 55th Bulletin is wanting to complete the feries. The chief of its contents, however are, we presume, contained in the account of the affair between Bernadotts and the Russians, in yesterday's American, under the head of Loeban.

#### Fifty-Sixth Bulletin.

ARENSDORF, Feb. 5. After the battle of Mohringen, where it had been beaten and put to rout, the advanced guard ot the Russian army retired to Leibstadt. But ron the following morning, many Russian divifions joined it, and they were in full march to carry the theatre of war to the horders of the Viffula. The corps of general Effen, which had arrived from the lower parts of Moldavia. and where it had been intended to ad against the Turks, and feveral regiments which were in Ruffig and had been for tome time collecting from the extremities of the vast empire, had joined the main army. The emperor gave orders to the prince de Ponte Corvo, (Bernadotte) to retire, and to havor the offentive operations of the elemy, by drawing him towards the Villula. He ordered at the fame time, the breaking up of the vinter quarters.

Marthal Souit tent General Goyot with his light cavalry to take possession of Guitair, where he took a great part of the baggage of the enemy, and made prisoners 1600 Ramans. Guitadt was the centre of the enemy's depot. But at the moment when marihal Soult attacked the budge of Bergfield with the division of Leval and Legrand, the enemy perceiving the importance of that pefrion, and that it protected the retreat of his left flank, detended the bridge with 12 of his best battalions. The cannonade began at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The 4th regiment of the line and the 24th of the light infantry, had the honor of first attacking the enemy. They luftained their former reputation. There two regiments alone and one battalion of the 28th in referve, were fushicient to dislodge the enemy; they passed the bridge with charged bayonets, forced their way among the 12 Rufsian battalion, took four pieces of cannon, and covered the field of battle with killed & wounded. The 46th and 55th regiments which formed the second brigade were behind, impatient to diftinguish themselves, but the enemy already in distorder, abandoned all his excellent situations; the happy prelage of the events of the

following day. At the same time Marshal Ney took possession of a wood, where the enemy had posted his right; the division of St. Hiliare took possesfion of the village in the centre; and the Grand Duke of Berg, with a division of dragoons placed by squadrons in the centre, passed the wood and cleared the plain. In these two partial attacks the enemy was repulled, and loft

about 100 prisoners. At night both armies remained in fight of each

The weather is superb for the season; the Inow is three-feet cleep, and the thermometer is

at 2 or 3 degrees of cold. At day break on the 4th, Gen. Lasalie entered the plain with his hustars.—A line of costacs and cavalry of the enemy opposed him. The Grand Duke of Berg formed his cavalry into a line and marched to reconneitre the enemy. The cannonade began-but we foon found that the enemy had profitted by the darkness of the night, and retreated, and had lest our rear guard on the right, the left, and the centre. It was attacked and retreated tighting for fix leagues. The enemy's cavalry were routed feveral times, but the obttacles of an uneven and mountainous country, retarded the ellorts of the cavalry. At the close of the day the French advance guard went to its quarters at Deppen. The Emperor slept at Schieet. The 5th, at day light, the whole French army was in motion.

At Deppen, the Emperor received information
