L. fall's division of light cavalry, and a division of dragoons, and gave orders to attack that co.ps of the enemy which had been cut off.

Battle of Deffen. Philadelphia, Feb. 24, 18-7. Dear Sir-It is scarce y necessary for me to Jay, that fixed the peace with France, I have not been off the continent of America; except in April, 1802, making a postage from Norfolk to Amboy. A confiderable time however, previcus to the prefident's message to congreis, accompanied by a copy of a decyphered letter, fiated to be a communication from Col. Barr to gen. Wilkinson, I had heard of ungenerous whiliers extremely empleatant to me, and afterwards received advices from my friends at Washington, that information had been given to the government from the westward, or New-Orleans, in which I was notified as concerned in the projects of Mr. Burr. This calumny ! immediately retu ed by prompt le ters of denial directed to leveral members et congrets and o ther gentlemen at Wattengton, and with this observation-that I had the jug of defiance flying at the main top, againfi the author of such falsebood and ail no evenies. But it was determined there should be no in stake made in leaving the good people of the United States to conjedure, who was meant by T. in the decyphered letter already mentioned; for when that letter was published, as you have feen, T. was explained in a marginal note which could not have been the cafe in the original letter, as every one who knows Mr. Burr, must kn w that he is ever too concile to give himfelf the trouble, in the body of a letter, of using the initial of a name and then explaining by a note. Hence I considéred this attention as another mark of the good disposition manifested to honor me, in the prefent day at the seat of govern ment, by fome good friend, and laughed, and invited others to laugh at it.

It is said here, and published in letters from Washington, but from whom I know not, that Mr. Burr has declared that he never wrote any Letter to Wilkinson in cypber. Hay it was previously flated to me by some very respectable gentlemen, that they did not believe Mr. D. could have written the letter in cypher attributed to him. And I must confess, though I did not doubt at the time, from the manner in which that letter came to Washington, and had publicity, that the language and flyle is not, such as I thould confider mon familiar to Mr.

FRANKFORT, January 31. The division of the army intended to besiege Colberg and Dantzie, is assembling at Stettin. Exclusive of the French troops, it will be composed of the contingents of the Grand Dukes of Darmitadt, Baden, and Wurtsburg: of the Duke of Naffau, the Grand Duke of Berg, the Princes of Hohenzollern, and Henburg. It is supposed that the contingent of the Prince Primate will

alfo join this army. By letters from the head quarters of his Majesty the Emperor and King, we learn that the light troops puth their advanced posts to a great diftance from the right bank of the Vikula. Their reports confirm he retreat of the Ruffians beyond Bialystock. We are assured, that the greatest distunion prevails between the Russians and Prussians. The King of Prussia insisted, it is said, that a part of the Russian army should advance on the fide of the Pregel, for the purpole of covering East Prussia; to which Marthal Kamensky would not consent. He chose the line of the Niemen, and left only detachments of Cossacks and some regiments of light cavalry on the left bank of that river.

The confederated Polish 2rmy will soon be organned. It is believed at Berlin, that Marshal Massena is intended to have the chief command of the Polish troops. This general palfed on the 25th through Bayrenth, and made a visit to the Governor General Legrand; he proceeded on his journey the same day by the way of Leiplic and Berlin.

LONDON, February 17.
