**By late arrivals at N. York.**

LONDON, Feb. 27.  
The Resiance frigate, Captain ADAM, from  
the West Indies, is arrived at Portsmouth, hav-  
ing on board upwards of four millions of dollars,  
which the British and Spanish Governments.  
The Resiance sailed from Vera Cruz on the  
14th of January. She continued off that port  
ten days, during which time no intercourse was  
permitted between the vessel and the shore.  
Feb. 28.  
Letters received at Plymouth, dated in De-  
cember last, from our fleet in the Dardanelles,  
state the following interesting particulars of the  
state of affairs, at that period, in Turkey:—  
"The Canopus, 84, Rear Admiral Lewis, the  
Endymion, 44, and another frigate, are station-  
ed directly opposite the Grand Seigneur's  
Seraglio, or Palace. The Thunderer, 74, and  
Standard, 64, and two frigates, are anchored to  
command the passage of the Dardanelles. A few  
days before these letters came away, a Russian  
Frigate, from the Mediterranean, passed the  
Dardanelles, without molestation from the Turk-  
ish batteries. Bu. Sebaltian, the French in-  
triguing Ambassador from France to the Otto-  
man Porte, made a violent remonstrance at this  
frigate passing the Dardanelles; he could get no  
redress, as our Envoy, Mr. Arbuthnot, gave in  
a representation of the business, and placed it in  
its proper point of view, to the satisfaction of  
the Turkish Government.—There are 20 fail of  
the line and 15 frigates in the arsenal, but not  
above five of them half manned. Our ships are  
all in high order and discipline. The Turks  
treat our people with the greatest civility and at-  
tention. Recruits of all kinds are sent on  
board our men of war. Our gallant Admiral  
and his Officers, and the Captains and Officers  
of the other British men of war, frequently dine  
on shore with Mr. Arbuthnot.

Feb. 28—Price of Stocks at one o'clock—  
Consols 92 1/2—reduc'd 51 3/4.  
Yesterday morning the several gentlemen in-  
tending to offer the preference loan, waited upon  
the minister, for the purpose of having some  
preliminary conversation respecting the amount.  
The parties were informed, that the sum wan-  
ted immediately by way of loan was £4,000,000;  
£2,000,000 of which was for England, a charg-  
e upon the war taxes, with 10 per cent inter-  
est and sinking fund, conformably to Lord E.  
Pelet's new financial plan. 2,000,000 of supple-  
mentary loan, with the usual sinking fund,  
2,000,000 for the service of Ireland, to be raised  
in Eng and on the Irish 3 to 2 per cent. In  
addition to the above the ministers reserve to  
themselves the option of a vote of credit for  
three millions, to be raised on exchequer bills.  
DEAD-CALCATAS FROPHE.  
At the execution of Holway and Haggerty,  
the Murderers of Mr. Street, and Elizabeth  
Goldie, the murderer of R. Prince, on Monday,  
one of the most dread accidents experienced  
for a long time occurred, owing to  
the intense crowd which assembled to witness  
the execution, in which the prefect became a  
great martyr. Humanity induces me to relate the  
fatal consequences, but I can only say that  
24 men and 3 women were trampled upon and  
killed, and 13 men and two women were  
wounded, some of them having the death torn  
from their legs, arms, &c.—Fatal 42, in St.  
Bartholomew's Hospital.

Just at the moment that the unhappy captives  
were about to be launched into the sea, a gen-  
eral rush amongst the crowd took place, the  
Dukes' Doors, where the criminal there stood  
on the platform. A most dread scene then  
took place. The approaches to the place were  
completely blocked up with carts, lined with  
spectators, and when some of the crowd began  
to move away the pressure became dreadful.  
Some fell, and others falling over them they  
were trampled to death. Several took posses-  
ion of the crowd, they became desperate, and the  
officers only succeeded in one case in detaching  
the people from the hostile tops, and in the win-  
dows, who saw their crime, waved their hands  
kerchiefs, and made signals to them to stand  
quiet, but to no purpose. All was confusion  
and uproar, the men fighting their way, and the  
women streaming in the most piteous manner.

A large military force is to be sent out to  
South America, to be called the "Army of  
South America." Gen. Whiteclock, who is ap-  
pointed to command it, was to sail immediately  
from England in the Thine frigate.

GUN BOATS.—Those who clamor for a Navy,  
and yet are hostile to the system of defence by  
Gun-Boats, would seem to be a set of mere con-  
zeners.

It is not in the power of the United States to  
raise and equip a navy to protect commerce for  
several centuries; but it is in her power to  
equip a fleet of gun-boats almost immediately,  
which would repel, at least, the greater infants  
offered her. And yet the very persons who ac-  
cuse the administration for leaving our ports  
and harbors in a defenceless state, exclaim a-  
gainst the system, which is the only rational  
one that can be adopted in our present situa-  
tion. Can such men be the friends of this  
country?

The following extracts are from a British  
source, and therefore will not be stigmatized as  
jacobinical evidence of the utility of Gun-Boats.

Extracts from Walby's Journal of the Campaign  
in Egypt, under the command of Sir Ralph  
Abercromby—in 1801.  
Page 84. By affording a harbor for our gun-  
boats, the lake was of the greatest service; these  
boats exclusive of other advantages, were  
not small security to our left flank. It is rather  
unaccountable that the French, so long masters  
of this country, did not keep a strong force of  
gun-boats on this station, which would have  
annoyed us materially on our landing, or in  
any future movements.  
Battle of 21st March—106 Gun-boats on  
the right, under command of captain Mait-  
land of the royal navy, were of the most effec-  
tual service, and did very great execution among  
the French troops posted behind the sand-hills.  
Their right was protected by a number  
of Gun-boats, &c.  
209. Several large Turkish gun-boats came in  
on the 10th and the Capoutan Pacha went to  
Rofetta to collect as many more as he could.  
These Gun-boats are very large, they have two  
masts, a main-mast, and stout mizen, and are  
square rigged. They carry a heavy 24 pounder at  
the bow, and a 12 pounder on each quarter.
