OUR boat came up last evening from the ship George, captain Taylor, in TWENTY-FIVE DAYS from GREENOCK. We haften to enrich the columns of the Newvork Gazette with Extracts from London, papers to 17th ult, inclusive-for which we are indebted to eapt. Taylor.

Lendon, March 9. From the London Gazette Extra idinary,

Sunday, March 8. " A dispatch, dated St. Petersburgh, 1-th Feb. of which the following is an extract, was this day received from the marquis of Douglas and Clydesdale, his majeity's Ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary at the court of St. Petersburg, by Lord Viscount Howic, his majetly's principal secretary of state for foreign affairs -

" I have the pleafure of enclosing, for your fordship's information, two papers, giving an account of a figural victory gained by the Russians over the French.

ST. PETERSBURGH, Feb. 15. On the 8th of this month, the Russian army gained a splendid victory over the Frenchat Eylau. The French army, on this occasion, consitted of mure than 120,000 men; the Russians, of Gen. Benningsen's division, and of that which was formerly commanded by Gen. Buxhovden. The battle began on the 7th of February, at three o'clock in the afternoon, and continued till six o'clock on the evening of the 8th. Bonaparte renewed the attack eight dif-

ferent times, and was often repulled. It is faid that a great part of the French army (chiefly chosen troops) were fairly cut down by the Russians; and that, on the Russian side, four Generals were killed. It is remarked, that in case Bonaparte's design had succeeded, it would have been conclutive of the campaign: he knew that general Benningsen's division was stationed at Mohrin, and general Essen's at Wisoke Malewick; and as they were consequently at a great distance from each other, he threw himself with his whole force between these two divisions, in a right line with Konigsberg, in order to separate them, or cut them off from each other, and fall with more effect upon the weaker part, but the fuccess of this plan was prevented by general Benninglen's operations and rapid move-

Towards the conclusion of the battle, there was a want of cartridges on both sides : and therefore recourse was had to the bayonet, which caused great carnage.

French. As I ful posed you might be very aneals reliefting my fate. I latten to fatisfy you by the prefent letter. Nothing difagratable has occurred to me, though I have been a whole day in the midit of a thower of bulls and hillets. I know not how it was pollible to come out of such a seene of desolation airve; but after all, thank Ged, I have not received a feratch, and therefore am much mire tortunate than most of the brave officers of our regiment, who have fallen. Thate who are not killed, are almost all wounded. This battle has been more

futul than that of Austerlitz. "Our army ha performed prodigies of valous Tho' we have loft a number of men, it is generally agreed, that it is an aftonishing circumitance not, to have lest more; and this is looked upon as an effect of the excellent discipline which prevailed in the army during the heat of the action, and in the midit of fuch a fire as never was

" During the last three days, the question who were the victors, has been frequently asked among us. This may appear fingular; but inveality, I cannot say which of the armies fought with the moll courage and firmness, or which did the most mischief to the other; however, this is certain, that we have lost a great number of men. But as we have not lept possession of the field of battle, and of cou se, have not yet been able to verify the result of the action, there is room to hope that a great part of the men who have hitherto been absent on the calling of the rolls, have not perithed. It is lel's painful to acknowledge, that the enemy has made a number

" In spite of our losses, this memorable day has done great honor to our arms. Every corps, every officer, every pritate mand tringuished himsels. Our retreat after the bat le. 1. no proof that we have been beaten. We did not go to take a military polition, but mereix to find an opportunity to come to an engagement with the enemy at a time when we hoped he would not be in a situation to resist the mais of the forces brought to all against birs. If we had conquered, or er operations would have immedia ely followed; but otherwile it was our duty to retreut, which we are doing at this moment; and this only proves, that our enterprize has not had all the success which it promited.

" As for the rest, I cannot say our situation is the most brilliant. The enemy has the advantage over us, of making war 600 miles from his own country, and living at the expence of the vanquished.
