Be it enacted, by the general assembly of Mary-Lint, That from and after the first of May next, no free negro thall felt any corn, wheat or tobacco, unless, at the time of its or her ib felling the fiel article or articles, he or file shall be posfilled of a certificate, under the hand and feil of te jullice of the peace of fail count, that he or
