The following production is from a York (Pennsylvania) paper. We publish it in order to draw the attention of the citizens of Baltimore immediately to the subject on which it treats. When the inhabitants of a neighboring State are endeavoring to force benefits upon us, surely we ought to open our arms to receive them.

YORK AND MARYLAND Turnpike Road.

Contrary to the general expectations, a law has just passed, authorizing a turnpike road from the town of York to the Maryland line, where it will unite with a turnpike road to be made from that place to Baltimore.

But it is also a fund where the profits will always be increasing, as the population of the country increases, and I do not believe that there is a turnpike road in Pennsylvania, which will yield a better, or even to good a profit as would be produced by such a road from the canal to Baltimore.

As Baltimore is the nearest seaport that we either have or ever can have, we ought to consider it as our permanent market, not only when we are to sell our produce of every kind, but where we are to procure all articles necessary or useful, which our own soil or manufactures do not produce.

To all those advantages nothing can be opposed or even considered as the shadow of a drawback, except the payment of toll: a matter so trifling and insignificant, compared with the advantages, as scarcely to deserve any consideration. Yet even this produces a profit to the stockholder, and operates as a reward to the benefactor of the public.

But will the inhabitants of this borough and of other villages in this county, the flockeepers, the mechanics, the miller, view this subject with indifference, and perceive no benefit resulting from it to themselves? Certainly not. All classes of citizens depend ultimately on the farmer, and their prosperity depends on his. The increase of his wealth will increase his demand for their wares. Men's wants are limited by their means, and the more money the farmer makes, the more he expends or lays out for those articles of convenience and luxury, which his own farm can not supply.

I say nothing now of the certainty of securing to York and York county, the course of the commerce between Baltimore and all the counties on the waters of the Susquehanna; whenever the turnpike is extended to the Conewago canal, the whole trade of that river, must of necessity fall into this channel, and the immense produce of one fourth part of the State, will find its way to market thro' the town of York.

But the stockholder, besides partaking in common with others, the advantages and benefits already alluded to, will receive a certain profit on the money he subscribes on the stock he holds. If on experiment the tolls as fixed in the law itself are found to produce less than six percent they may be raised by the company until they produce that sum clear, and it can't be denied that turnpike stock is one of the safest investments that money can be put into.

Port of Baltimore. ENTERED.

Left there this John Adams and Adriatic, for Baltimore, in 2 or 3 days; Philip, Williams, for do. in a few days; March 28, the 45, long; 55-fpk brig Leopard, for Baltimore from Liverpool in light of Cape-Henry light house, was boarded by the British frigate Melampus, and detained 3 hours in a fair wind, and Prefred John Murray, with a protection.

Also, ship Globe, Bailey, 45 days from London—dry goods, &c. finds persons. March 24, lat 52, 30-fpk brig Hannah, of Gohalle, 10 days from Bolton, for Amsterdam. April 21, within 5 miles of Cape-Henry, was boarded by an officer from the British frigate Melampus, captain Hawk, who impressed Nicholas Workman, German, with a protection, who has failed out of this port for nine years; Thomas Malone, born in New-York, with a protection, and Charles Turner, born in Philadelphia, with a protection—all kidnapped within the territory of the United States. Captain B. had for many hands pressed from him, that he could not have navigated the ship had he not have received assistance from his passengers.
