

PHILADELPHIA, April 27.
We perceive in one of our Paris papers, under the head of Hague, March 7, a deplorable representation of the effects of the gale in the Texel of the 18th February, which it terms was followed by one nearly as destructive on the 26th of the same month.

The sittings of the Grand Sanhedrim at Paris, were finished on the 9th of March, and a copy of their proceedings has been transmitted to the Emperor.

Extract of a letter from an officer of the Navy to his brother in New York.
"Nantes, March 23, 1807."
"On the 9th inst. a duel was fought between my commander Lieut. Jones and our much esteemed friend Lieut. James T. Leonard. They exchanged three shots without effect; but unfortunately on the fourth round Lieut. L. received a very serious injury from his antagonist's ball entering the lumbar region and wounding his kidneys. I am now very happy, however, to inform you, that the wound which at first was deemed mortal, has since put on favourable appearances, and I great hopes are entertained for his safety."

A French (or Dutch) forty-four gun frigate, has been cast away on one of the Orkney Islands and lost. The crew had landed and fortified themselves. The Scotch volunteers were embarking to attack them.

Lately an American sailor conducted himself with great decency and civility to a respectable woman in Whapping, London, claiming her as his wife, saying he was married to him at New-York; but it was clearly demonstrated to him, that the lady was never 5 miles out of London, when he swore that she was the ghost of his wife and therefore must have perished; however she was placed under the protection of her friends, and the man sent on board his ship under the control of his captain.

LATEST FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.
From Antise p.
Yesterday afternoon arrived at this port, in the excellent passage of 30 days from Antwerp, the fine ship Ocean, capt. Gidon. By this vessel we have received Paris Papers to the 24th March, and had progressed in our translations of their contents when we received the news of the victory, concerning our allies four days later. We shall give a preliminary notice of these, reserving our own translations for the next number of the Philadelphia Gazette.

Capt. Gidon left the city of Antwerp on the 26th March, previous to which repeated rumors had been received from the scene of war. These rumors, though intended to represent France victorious, were evidently false in detail; and the current opinion at Antwerp was, that the Russians not only had kept the ground, but had obtained a considerable advantage over the enemy. This rumor, it will be observed, coincides with the several accounts received at New-York from Bonaire.

On the 16th Feb. the French took possession of the small town of Naugarten. In this affair they lost 300 men killed and 22 wounded. The Russians lost their camp, 100 men killed and 130 taken prisoners.

It was reported that the Turks had gained a partial advantage over the Russians.
