

ZURICH, Feb. 10.

The delay of the Helvetic government to furnish the men who are to form the Swiss regiments for the French service, the officers of which the Emperor had begun to nominate, has given rise to some disagreeable communications, in which his majesty has expressed his dissatisfaction upon this subject to the Chief Magistrate, and to the Cantonal Regencies of Glarus, and to the Cantonal Regencies of Valais. The complaints of his Imperial Majesty were conveyed in a circular letter, addressed by general Vial, his envoy, dated Jan. 15, as follows:

"I have received, on the part of his majesty the emperor of the French and king of Italy, positive orders to declare to the Landammann, and the Cantonal Regencies, that his majesty in nominating the officers of the Swiss regiment, No. —, flattered himself that the Swiss, following the example of their ancestors, would attach themselves to the new service with eagerness and zeal; but his majesty's hopes have not been realized, this has arisen from the want of proper means, from intrigues, or disaffection, which have impeded the new levies, or caused them to be neglected. His majesty knows the Swiss, and is convinced that five sixths of them will enter into the service of France, and that consequently, difficulties, and probably premeditated obstacles, may have impeded the success of the formation of the regiments, by which it was his majesty's intention to render the connection between France and Switzerland still more intimate, to the advantage of the latter? In this state of affairs, the undersigned envoy is charged to declare, that if the 16,000 men, who, according to the convention, should form the regiments demanded, are not raised — the first of May, Switzerland will be considered as having renounced the advantages of the convention; and that France, though with regret, will look upon this alliance as broken.

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.

P. left at Amsterdam, the brig Isabella, Crane, of this port, and Juno, of Norfolk, and the ship Clyde, Alcorn, of New-York, all discharging; the Eleanor, Taylor, to sail the day after for Baltimore, and the ship Hardware, Lur, of New-York ballasting for Hull — The Hamlet, Harding, of this port for St. Ubes, sailed some time before capt. Potter.
