From a London Paper.

RUSSIAN ARVIES.

As the Cozacks form to confiderable a part of the Russian army, and particularly in the new raised militia, it cannot but be interesting to our readers, to learn the character and firength of this component part of an army and a nation on which the hopes of the Consederated Powers must now, in a considerable degree rest. The name of Cozacks in general, and applied to all those tribes, which follow the same irregular and almost option il method of warfare. The particular boules of the Cozacks are distinguithed from each o her, not by the different nations which compole them, but by the places they respectively inhabit. Thus the Don Cozacks take their name from the river Don: the Ouralian Cozacks from the uralian mounthins: the Cozzeks of the Ukraine form the name of the country; & the Zaporavian Cozacks from the cataracts of the Dneister, as the word Zaporavian, or more properly, Zaporogizi, figuifies in the Russan language, " people living beyond the catarasts." The two termer are chiefly the colonists of Great Ruffia, and the two latter are formed of Malo-Russians, these wear no beards. The Zaporavians thave even their heads, and leave only a small piece of hair upon the crown, long enough to reach the note, and pride themselves upon every thing that is opposite to civilization, and to the common feelings of man!! There was a time when no woman whatever was permitted to live in their fociety; and, though they began lately to have more intercourle with the fex, flill they retain ftrongly the marks of their former ferocity. They nray be called, with great propriety, a gang of detperate outlans, of robbers, and all forts of pubhe offenders, who are suffered to exist merely on account of the milchief they doto an enemy.

The Cozacks of the Ukrains and the Don Cozacks, are more advanced in civilization; the latter are seen sometimes with and sometimes without beards; bu thet rmer exist now merely in n.me, applied indictiminately to all the inhabitants. Excepting the Cozacks of the U. kraine, and the Zap ravians, the l'artars and Calmucks are so interspersed with all other Cozacles that they form the mutt conspicuous and prominent feature in them. The Calmuks seem to be the real descendants of the ancient -Sc, thians, who dwelt on the borders of the Don (l'anais.) --- Their features are broad and flat, with a pair of small, the y, piercingeyes. They are of small flature, very rebuit and active, and expert in the use of the box and arrow, which they fiel use. They are extremely skillfulin managing unruly horses, and are hired expressly for the purpose by horse contractors for the army, who have to chuse these at imals out of the wild fluds bred chiefly by the land proprietors in Little Russia. A Calmack rides maight into the midit of these migovernable creatures, and after the horse is singled out wrich is to be taken, he throws a loop round his neck, with such dexterity, that, though the distance is considerable, as the serocious animai will not suffer any one to approach near i im he seldom misses h's ann. No soone, does inloop fall upon the norse's neck, than the Calmuk fattens with amazing rap duy the oth r en i of the rope to the sadde he sits upon, if such a manier as to prevent an possibility on the horse a escaping. The unrul, savage, thus surprised; ftruggles nard, but the horse which the Calmuk rides, takes such a positi 1, by the direction of the rider, that the it ength of the captive is exuausted, and he at length, suifers himself to be led away, and is soon tamed The Taitars, who are line Calminks in th ir persons, are so in ermixed with them as to be seen every where together They devour raw, whatever animal food comes in their way, or, as they eat their spare horse careases, without any othe preparation of the Hesh than warming it under the saddle of the horse they ride upon. They have generally everal horses with them, so that their provisions, and the moans of travelling, proceed-with them without any incumbrance. Bo h these nations of trib's ore extremely numerous among the Don Cozacks, and alcogether to m chose terr ble aurriors, whose aspect alone is sufficient to dismay an enemy not accultomed to the sight of such hordes of

tain int. Hig nce from the enemy, which they

do son etimes in the manner that a Calmuk

takes a wil horse. As loon as a Cozach comes near enough to the object of his tearch, he throws a loop round his waith, faitens it to his saddle and ga lops of with the prisoner. In this way also they transjort their prisoners, and drag them through the river/ they have to crofs. All the outpolls are formed chiefly of the Cozacks. They are constantly upon the look out, and cut a conspicuous figure in skirmahes. Their delight in blood and love of booty form the main-ipring of all their actions, and the Cozack seidom hesitates to attack friend or foe if he fees the probability of plunder. They are armed with a long lance, a gun, a brace of pistols, and a fword, something in the thape of a Turkish sabre. Though in their military appear ance they preferve a certain degree of uniformity, still as their drels is according to their fancy or means, the scene, whenever they march in a body is truly grotefque and variegated. Their hoiles which are so diminutive and arparently weak that they feem more calculated to be carried than to carry, are a race altorether a aomalous, for whether ted luxuriously or sparingly, they maintain invariably the same niggardly appearance, and, like the Russian foldier, can exist almost upon nothing. The Cozacks are allowed to preferve their own government, and they in return Hipulate to furnish the Emperor at their own expence, with whatevernumber of men he may require, on the condition of being allowed to make booty !- Such is their thirst for war as the means of plunder, that when the number required is inconsiderable, to that they must cast lots who should go, a serious quarrel is generally the consequence of not bea ing included in the number. He that returns home without booty, or has not been in action, -is viewed by the women in despisable light; for the that their manners and mode of living all tend to make them a terror to the peaceful and the helpless, and the most destructive warriors that' can be let loose upon a civilised People, as death and defolation follow in their train, and every thing that is valuable they remove or defroy. They even think it charity to kill their comrades, when wounded past recovery, or likely to fall into the hands of the enemy.
