This, if duly considered, takes away the idea of a tax, and all that is inconvenient or disagreeable in a turnpike gate. No farmer who is sensible of the want of hands, or who knows the use of a good team on his farm but must allow the road that will enable him to carry to town, with four horres, twenty barrels of flour instead of ten barrels, which he now carries, soon pays for itself in the saving of labor, and then the profits will go to those who have subscribed for stock; but the whole is so managed that the stockholder begins to receive his share of the profits in six or twelve months.-Thus, you that are stockholders will receive at the office of the Company in town, or in some other part of the county, what you have Paid into the company's stock, or at the toll gates, in a very short time, and you do not pay merely to feed a poor toll-man, or to enrich your neighbors, but to enrich yourselves, your families and your children.

If you were under the disagreeable necessity of paying a toll to others, still it would be a eaving of money to you, in having better roads; but there are few of you, gentlemen, who cannot lay down his dollar towards one share, or his five dollars towards his five shares. It will be entirely your own fault if you do not-The poll is open for everyy man-More than 25 shares cannot be taken by one person the first day, nor more than 50 the second; so that you will probably have a chance of taking shares either on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday. But the prudent farmer will rather bebeforehand with five and present himself as soon as the broks are open. Such as do, will have reason to Clank their foresight, and such as dis not, will never have a right to grumble at others. A FARMER.

FROM THE BERKSHIRE REPORTER.

The fellowing is extrasted from a letter written by Heirry Ingersoll, (son of Mr. Jonathan Ingerfoll, of Stockbridge) to his brother-in-law, the late Thomas Allen, e.g. of this town, dated at " Carthagena, October 26, 1806," received from Newyork.

OF DEAR BRUTHER. A I embrace a very uncertain opportunity of informing my friends of my unhappy fituation. I lest Newsork under premising circumstances, in good spirits, and with an idea of foon re urning to enjoy with my friends the reward of prudence and industry-but, alas I vain hope! behold me now doomed to groam in a foreign country, under the galling chains of flavery, for a term of TEN years, deprived of liberty, and all I hold dear in lite,

" I shall give you a particular account of the expedition in which I was engaged, as well as what happened to myself Francis de Miranda, (born in this country) with the athitance of a few friends in the United States, ntted out the Leander, capt. Lewis, with the intention of revolutionizing some of the Spanish previnces in South America. Col. Smith, of Newyork, was Miranda's principal agent in engaging men to go on the extedition, who kept the destination of it a lecret, but affured them it was fair and honorable, and likewise authorited by the United States. There was a company of dragoons engaged under the idea of guarding the mail from the City of Washington to New-Orleans. A number of officers engaged who were to take command of their companies, e.c. at their detined fort ;- four prin ers, besides myselt, were likewise engaged—the while amounted to about two hundred.

" We failed from New York the 2d Feb (1806) in the Leander of 16 guns, and arrived at Jacquemel the 17th, where we lay until the 27th March, during which time 2 schooners were chartered for the expedition, viz. the Bee and Bacchus-the former of which I was put on board, together with 2 of my fellow printers, as well as 15 of the dragoons and 4 officers.-On board the Bacchus, the other 2 printers, besides a number of officers and men, were ordered-The reason of this was, to make room on board the thip for a number of chicers, who came from Portau Prince-among whom was George W. Kirkland, who came in the capacity of Col. of infantry. During the time we remained in Jacmel, I grew very fulfracious of the deligns of Milanda, and wilhed to leave him and his expedition and return to America, but was not allowed to.

" We sailed from Jacinel the 27th of March. Nothing material occurred until the 27th of April, when we arrived off Cavallo, on the Spanish Main, where it was intended to make a landing near that place; but two guarda coast ers appearing in fight, we stood on for them till near night, when not being able to find out their force, we flood off from land that night—the next day we came to an action, when the schr. Bee and Bacchus, were taken. Captain Huddle, of the Bee, was killed. The Leander cowardly deserted us, and made her escape. We were taken into Porto Cavallo, there put in irons and confined in a most loathsome prison, with scarce sufficient air to breathe. In a few weeks our trial took place—the result of which was that TEN were condemned to be hanged and behead. ed at Porto Cavallo, viz. Miles L. Hall, late of Lenox, Francis Farquharton, Charles Johnson, J. Ferris, Gullavus Adoldhus Burgadd, Thomas Billorp. Daniel D. Kemper, James B. Gardner, Thomas Donahu, and Paul T. George. Their sentence was dated the 12th July, and read to them the 20th—the execution took space the 21st in the presence of all the priloners. At the same time titteen were condemned to ten years flavery in the Cattle of Omoa, among whom I am classed-thirteen for the same term to Posto Rico, and nineteen for eight years to Boco Chica. Shortly after our trial we were ordered from Porto Cavallo to Carthagena, where we now remain, waiting an opportunity

to be sent to cur respessive places. Such has been the fate of Miranda's expedition, as far as I know, which I think could not have sailed from N. York without the knowledge of the government of the U. States.
