

THE Books of the Commissioners of the York Turnpike, both for Maryland and Pennsylvania, are now opened at Evans's. The Pennsylvania Commissioners have a large and correct map of that state, and so much of Maryland, as clearly to elucidate the course of the road, with all its relations, which I wish our citizens would view. It is proposed to extend the Turnpike from York-town to the foot of the Pennsylvania canal (about 15 miles above Columbia) which is the extreme point of the obstructions not obviated by the canal, and is 58 miles from Baltimore, and 91 miles from Philadelphia. This spot is chosen as the best depot, because the intermediate distance to Columbia is at all times dangerous and only passable when the water is high. Indeed so difficult is the navigation, I have been informed, that boats destined for Columbia, frequently unload at this place, and take in their return cargoes. There can therefore be little doubt but that the owners of the produce which descends the river will land here, and bring it to Baltimore rather than encounter the dangers of going to Columbia and thence proceed to Philadelphia, at least 18 miles further land carriage than there will be to Baltimore from a point above all impediments, and from which boats may at all seasons of the year without the least inconvenience or peril, ply backward and forward to the interior of the country. And should the produce stop at this place, of which there is no doubt, the difference of 33 miles land carriage will unquestionably decide the competition in favor of Baltimore, and make it the grand mart for the vast productions of a great part and perhaps the richest part of the United States. Those who have not particularly examined the map of this country, would do well at this time to cast their eyes over it. They will perceive that two thirds of the state of Pennsylvania lay west of the Susquehanna, most of which, with a great part of that on the east, is watered by it. Passing through Pennsylvania, this noble river runs into the fertile state of New-York, and branching over at least one half of that state, we find its sources on the borders of the lakes. The whole of this rich and vast expanse of territory seeks a market down the Susquehanna! what a scene of exhaustless wealth does it not open to Baltimore! This country abounds in wheat, corn, furs, timber, &c. which may with little trouble and expence, be brought into our city, and exchanged for imports. And thus, by a kind of action and reaction, while we are enriched by the influx of its products, we shall be benefited by the outlet which it affords for foreign merchandise.

The advantages will be incalculable. Secure but the exclusive trade of this river to Baltimore, and it will be no longer a doubt whether she possesses the most advantageous commercial site in the union. She will then be the unrivalled emporium of America. But those great natural advantages may be lost by supineness. Philadelphia and New York have long viewed our local superiority with jealousy. They have made and are still making great exertions to divert this trade from its legitimate channel, and by means of their great capital and superior public spirit, they will succeed, if the Baltimoreans do not make some efforts to secure to themselves this valuable gift of nature.

No sacrifice is required. No loss will be experienced. We know that the Reister's-town turnpike has already divided 10 per cent. and that this stock will be the best in the state. No argument can add force to the conviction which the map itself will operate. I therefore confidently hope not only the whole of the Maryland, but what now remains of the Pennsylvania stock, will be immediately subscribed for by our

*Sketch of the Scenery and Pantomime.*  
Scene first represents a view of the City of Orleans, and the outside of a Convent (the inside illuminated, which is reflected through the windows) where the piece opens with a **GRAND CHORUS AND PROCESSION** of Friars and Nuns, in celebration of the Annual custom of a Requiem, in the memory of the King's Sister, (the Empress Bellifante, supposed dead).

**GRAND TRIUMPHAL ENTRY OF THE KING OF FRANCE.**  
Attended by his Grand Cross, Grand Crozier Nobles, Banner-bearers, Choristers, General Officers, Nuns, Friars, Armour-bearers, Pages, Standards, Soldiers, &c.  
The **CONVENT GARDEN DEVELOPEMENT** Inside the King's Palace, where he is seated surrounded by the Nobles on the Throne of State. In this scene a complete pretence against the Wild Man of the Woods, and a Reward offered to the several Knights to take him dead or alive; they all refuse except Valentine, who, after making a vow to rescue the country from the Monster, or lose his own life in the attempt, takes a respectful leave of the King and the Princess Eglantine, with whom he falls violently in love.  
Scene 5th The Forest of Orleans. The Bear's Cave, where Orson has been snuffed is seen: she is heard growling for the absence of Orson, who is in search of prey for her; they after some time meet; he with food and the ready to devour it; they enter the cave to regale on some animals destroyed by him for that purpose, when Valentine arrives in search of Orson—Encounter between the Wild Man and Hugo (Valentine's attendant) which ends in the escape of the latter from the former. Valentine meets Orson, and is obliged at first, to save himself from his ferocious enemy by climbing the Trees of the Forest, and making his escape, from close pursuit, from branch to branch, they at last descend, and a furious battle ensues—Valentine nearly exhausted, opposes a polished field to Orson, in which he sees his own figure, and in consequence, remains for some time inactive, surprised and astonished at the effect produced—

at last he pulls up a tree by the roots, with which he renews the attack, during which, Valentine escapes many dreadful blows, and when on the point of being vanquished the Bear turns—Valentine steps forward to plunge his sword into her body, which totally disarms Orson, who throws from him the Weapons of Death, and supplicates for the preservation of her he supplicates his parent. After a variety of struggles on both sides, the Bear dies from old age, which determines Orson to attend Valentine to the presence of the King and Court.  
Act 2d commences with the outside of the Palace and Gates of Orleans.  
**A REGAL BANQUET.**  
Orson introduced—he is astonished at every thing he sees; after a variety of tricks, and no small degree of terror to the King's nephew, he is left to regret at pleasure, but on missing Valentine, he rushes out in pursuit of him; Valentine (on his way to the pavilion of Agramont) is attacked and nearly assassinated by Henry and Hawfrey, who are jealous of the princess Eglantine's attachment to him. The distress of Orson on this occasion is very great, as he feels the most lively interest for Valentine through all his pursuits.  
**The Encampment and Pavilion of the GREEN KNIGHT.**  
On one side a tree, on which several Knights in armor are seen hanging; a shield marked with magical characters, is suspended and guarded by a Saracen priest. The Green Knight enters, preceded by Saracen warriors; he offers Lady Florimonda his hand, which she rejects, and shows him these words on a scroll, "Florimonda will wed the Knight that frees her from Agramont." Eglantine enters disguised in Valentine's armor, and offers to fight the Green Knight, after which a battle ensues with swords—She is overcome, and he is about putting her to death, when Valentine arrives; a Furious Combat with Broad Swords takes place; and a second with battle-axes and shields. On the commencement of the third Orson enters, pulls down the magic shield, which has hitherto resisted human power, opposes it to the Green Knight—every weapon he makes use of against it, breaks and drops from his hands—He is then overcome; becomes the prisoner of his conqueror and is led off in triumph.

**The Castle of the Giant FERRAGUS.**  
Valentine and Orson enter.—The fiends who guard the gates, rush out, but are vanquished by the magic power of a Ring given by the enchanter Paoleto.  
The **MAGIC CHAMBER:** in the centre on a pillar a Golden head, and on one side of it stands the enormous Giant FERRAGUS, leaning on a mazy Club, which he raises on the entrance of Valentine and Orson; Paoleto (the enchanter) waves his wand; the Club changes to a heavy chain, encircling the arms of the Giant. Orson grasps him in his arms and overthrows him; Paoleto touches the Golden Oracle, which speaks and the Golden Head disappears. The Marriage of Orson to Florimonda is proposed to Paoleto, of which he approves.  
*Scene Last.*

**A Grand Procession,**  
Attended by banners, guards, trophies, &c. Triumphant Cars, which bear Valentine, Eglantine, Orson and Florimonda. The piece concludes with an appropriate  
*Finis and Chorus.*
