

Late from Europe.

Yesterday arrived the ship Missouri, captain Kennedy, from Rochelle, and has fired us with Paris papers to the 23rd of March, from which we have made the following translations.

MILAN, March 17.

By several arrivals at Ancona, from Constantinople, we learn, that on the 12th of February, all the Russian merchant vessels in that port were seized, and that two frigates with troops for Corfu, in attempting to pass the Dardanelles, were also captured.

BRESLAW, March 9.

By several deserters that have escaped from Koxel, we learn, that a part of the garrison had joined the inhabitants in the determination to compel the government to capitulate immediately.

A military commission, appointed by his highness Prince Jerome has condemned to death ensign Wensurke of a Prussian regiment, for breaking his parole of honor in serving against France.

FRANKFORT, March 19.

By several letters from Vienna, we learn, that general Michelfoh, whose army is numerous, has received orders to send the greater part to encounter the army under General Beningsen. His orders are, to remain with the remainder to maintain his position at present, and to avoid all offensive operations.

The Turkish government has not relaxed in its preparations. As soon as the reinforcements, expected from Asia, shall arrive at Adrianople, the Grand Vizier, with all the generals will depart, and act on the offensive to drive the Russians out of Moldavia and Wallachia. The plan of operations has been fixed upon between the Grand Vizier, and General Sebastiani, the French Ambassador, who enjoys the fullest confidence of the Grand Seigneur and the Divan.

DENMARK, March 8.

Our court had notified to the Ambassador of his Britannic Majesty, that they have viewed with displeasure, an English Fleet in the Baltic.

ALTONA, March 12.

The Danish government has given orders to its subjects, to furnish the corps under Marshal Mortier, with every thing in their power.

Several persons of rank, have received orders to quit Peterburgh, in consequence of being accused of speaking too freely of the events of the war and laying the fault on the government.

WARSAW, March 6.

Prince of Benevento, minister of exterior relations, who has lately arrived from the imperial headquarters at Orléans, previous to his return transmitted a note to the foreign ambassadors, informing them, that they must return to Berlin with their suits.

HAGUE, March 18.

In virtue of a particular proclamation of his majesty the assembly of West Frise, who have never met since 1797, assembled on the 9th of this month at Aurich.

NEW-YORK, May 16

A letter received in town yesterday, dated at Trinidad de Cuba, the 20th April, mentions that the ship Army, Capt. Crow, from Jamaica, bound to New York, was captured by a French Privateer, and in endeavouring to gain that port was run ashore. They had landed about 30 puncheons of rum, when a British Frigate came in sight, which, after taking on the passengers and finding it impracticable to get the ship off, set fire to and left her. It is not stated what Frigate it was, but is conjectured to belong to the Jamaica Station, where it is supposed the passengers, of which the number was considerable, will be landed.

Highway Robbery.—On Thursday evening, about half past nine o'clock, as two young gentlemen, with two ladies, were on their way to Greenwich on a coach, they were stopped by two footpads, who dived upon them from Williams's nursery, with each a pistol in his hand, and demanded their money, with many threats in case of resistance. The gentlemen being unarmed, gave them a few dollars, telling them it was all they had about them.—The robbers then demanded their watches, which they refused, and after some little parley the demand was given up, and the coach was permitted to proceed.

It was to be feared that the fellows could not be distinctly perceived, but they appeared to be dressed in jackets and trowsers.

In consequence of a publication in the Mercantile Advertiser of the 23d of Feb. last, respecting the loss of 20 doubloons, by the master of the ship Monk, while an officer from his Majesty's sloop of war Bermuda, was on board; and certain depositions on the subject transmitted by the British consul general to Admiral Berkeley, it appears that the admiral ordered a court of enquiry to examine into the facts. The following is a copy of their report to the admiral.

COPY.

His Majesty's sloop Bermuda, March 30, 1807. Sir,

Agreeable to your order of this date we have examined with the strictest attention into the circumstance related in col. Barclay's letter to you. The paragraph in the Mercantile Advertiser of the 23d of Feb. 1807, with the affidavits made by the master's mate, and a passenger's servant on board the American ship Monk.

It appears to us that the statements in the above mentioned newspaper, are by affidavit proved to be an exaggerated falsehood, as no deak of the master's, or any other person was ever seen broken open, or searched, and so far from the Bermuda having immediately made all sail upon the return of capt. Allen to the Monk that more than half an hour had elapsed, by the boat returning with two men that had been carried on board the Bermuda on suspicion of their being British subjects.

We have examined into the character of Mr. Hollows, and it appears from the testimony of his capt. and all the gun-room officers in the Bermuda, from more than twelve months to be that of a truly honest and honorable person, and that no doubloons have been seen in his possession, or indeed on board the Bermuda since the 20th of February last.

We herewith inclose the affidavits of capt. Byam and Mr. Hollows on the subject, on

which we cannot but place every faith, and certainly must have weight in exonerating Mr. Hollows (who appears to be the person complained of as being the only person left on board the Monk during the absence of Mr. Allen.) from this most infamous and cruel charge. In our opinion it does most fully exonerate and acquit him, well knowing the high consideration that is attached to the sacred nature of an oath by every Englishman.

As it is not denied that the trunk was open both prior and subsequent to the search made by the officer of the Bermuda, the loss complained of might as well have happened from the persons in the cabin of the Monk as in the way stated in the newspaper, and in the affidavits of the master, mate, and servant of the Monk. The charge is highly derogatory to the general character given of that officer.

It is unfortunate that this subject cannot be brought before a court of justice, where a cross examination of the witnesses would throw such light on the subject as we doubt not would remove every suspicion injurious to the character of Mr. Hollows.

PHILADELPHIA, May 16.

Yesterday arrived the ship Missouri, capt. Kennedy, 45 days from Rochelle. Left there, brig Daniel and Frederick, 45 days, to sail in 3 days for this port, and the ship Gen. Washington, Weeks, of this port, in about 12 days for New-York.—The British ship of war Audacious, with four other ships of the line, a frigate, two brigs and a cutter, have for some time past been off Rochelle, where they blockaded five French ships of the line and two frigates.

St. Martine, Isle-de-Rhe, March 22, 1807. I was boarded on my passage from Bilboa, within sight of the Isle-de-Rhe, by a British ship of the line, belonging to the squadron which is now before you. The Lieut. after examining my papers, wrote the following on the back of my Sea Letter: "I hereby warn Thomas Williams, master of the schr. Eleanor, not to proceed to any other port except the Isle-de-Rhe."

Ending Note, List of his Majesty's ship Mrs. March 17, 1807.

"I asked him the reason, that it is not for you to know," said he, "only take care and go to no other port, if you do, you will be a vital prize;" he then said he intended to examine my hand—I told him I had not any thing on board but ballast—he took my word for it, and after repeating, if I went to any other port, I should be a lawful prize, got in his boat and went on board, I lay by some time, before they made a signal for me to proceed.

"I do not know what he meant by the above, for if I should be a lawful prize from Bilboa or any other port in France, why not to the Isle-de-Rhe? However, I presume he either had not instructions to take vessels from one enemy's port to another in ballast, or else I was not worth taking.

A communication signed by Gen. Wilson has been received, and shall appear as soon as convenient.

The schr. Jones Eddy, capt. William Herald, 28 days from Trinidad for Portsmouth, with rum and molasses, belonging to Messrs. Fly and Walton of that town, went ashore on Plum Island, about half a mile to the southward of the point, at 2 o'clock on Thursday se'night. The captain attempted to enter the harbour, but struck on the south breakers drifted over, and drove ashore on the beach. Mr. Richardson, who keeps the house established on the island, immediately repaired to the beach, and by his exertions capt. Herald with two or three of his people, were saved from a watery grave. The boat in which capt. Herald and his men left the schr. upon reaching the hotel in the island, every exertion was made by capt. Richardson and his family to render him comfortable. A number of gentlemen from New-York, port seeing the distress of the vessel, haltened to the beach with carriages, clothes, &c. and afforded every possible assistance to the shipwrecked strangers. The rescue of these seamen, adds another link to the people saved through the benevolence of gentlemen in establishing a turnpike to that island, and placing those whose integrity and exertions may be relied on, to watch over the safety of the adventuring mariners. The cargo of the schr. is wholly saved which would have been impossible had the turnpike not been established. The vessel may again be launched without much damage.

Newburyport pap.

It allows the nobility to become members of the first and second classes of merchants, it draws the anxious wish of the Emperor to bring closer the ties between these two descriptions of his subjects. Wholesale merchants may even aspire to the first offices of

the state, and are to have the privilege of appearing at court. Measures are also to be taken to preserve and perpetuate the names of the most eminent merchants, and transmit them with distinction to posterity.
