SIR,  
I have just seen General Adair's ap-  
peal of the 4th of March, which is  
not unanswerable, and will be noticed  
in due season; In the mean time have  
the goodness to publish the enclosed  
extract from the Telegraph of this city.  
Let the reader understand that  
the general arrived here on the 14th  
of January; that Mr. Ralston's com-  
munication was made to Doctor Car-  
michael on the 12th of the same  
month, and that the distance between  
the two places is more than two hun-  
dred miles: combine to these stubborn  
facts the report of Doctor Claiborne,  
and it will puzzle the general to ex-  
plain away the real motives of his cir-  
cuitous route and unexpected visit to  
this city.  
When the delusions of the moment  
are dissipated, when passion has sub-  
sided, when reason and justice have re-  
sumed their empire, and all the docu-  
ments and facts I possess are exposed  
to the public—the citizens of my  
country will be taught how to res-  
pect the calumnies by which I am as-  
sailed, and to estimate my honour, my  
fidelity and my services to the state.  
In the mean time I brand with false-  
hood, whatever may be uttered to pre-  
judice my integrity, by col. Burr, his  
coadjutor, or their numerous and pow-  
erful associates. My conduct has al-  
ways defied enquiry—Let it be tested  
by fair investigation.

**GENERAL JAMES WILKINSON.**  
SIR,

In compliance to your request of  
yesterday, relative to the period of ge-  
neral John Adair's arrival and depart-  
ure from the city of Nashville, Ten-  
nessee, and the conversation that pas-  
sed between us, whilst there, I hasten  
to make the following statement, which  
I believe to be a correct one: Ge-  
neral John Adair and Col. Burr  
arrived at Nashville about the middle  
of December last, from Kentucky, I  
know not whether they came together,  
they lodged at the same house, and oc-  
cupied, I understood, one room.  
They left Nashville in a few days of  
each other, gen. Adair by land and  
Col. Burr by water. From a previous  
conversation with Adair, an impres-  
sion was made on my mind, that he  
had either returned to Kentucky, or  
had gone to visit the tract of country  
lately ceded to the United States by  
the Chickasaw Indians, on the waters  
of Duck river, having expressed a de-  
termination of making a purchase in  
that quarter, if the lands answered the  
description.  
He mentioned his intention of vi-  
siting New Orleans in the course of 3  
weeks from the time of his arrival in  
Nashville, and that he would be hap-  
py if I could be ready to accompany  
him. I heard no more of the general  
for a week, when I was informed by  
a gentleman from Natchez, that he  
had met him and his servant in the  
Chickasaw nation, travelling with  
great rapidity, in a direction to the  
Mississippi territory.—His business  
in this quarter I know not. I believe  
the above to be all that passed between  
us.

Personally appeared before me,  
the subscriber, one of the Justices of the  
Peace in and for the said county, Do-  
ctor John T. Carmichael, who on his so-  
lemn oath declares, that on the even-  
ing of the 11th of January inst. a Mr.  
Ralston and a Mr. Floyd, the son of  
capt. Floyd of Louisville, Kentucky,  
called at the house of this deponent,  
spent the evening and breakfasted with  
him the next day; that the conversa-  
tion during the evening and the morn-  
ing generally related to the various op-  
inions in circulation respecting col.  
Burr, and the situation of this coun-  
try; that after breakfast Mr. Ralston  
opened his business with this depon-  
ent, stating that he had descended the  
Mississippi as far as New Madrid  
in company with col. Burr, where he  
left him; that gen. Adair had gone to  
New-Orleans by a circuitous route,  
and that his intention was to commu-  
nicate with gen. Wilkinson, and return  
so as to meet them at my house about  
that time if possible; that it was an  
object with them to ascertain the ex-  
act situation of the fort at Baton  
Rouge, the state of the works, the  
number of men, its weak situation; and  
that Fort Adams was also a place of  
some consequence, they enquired  
what U. States troops were there, and  
who commanded them; where the  
Gun-Boats were, and who individual-  
ly commanded them; who was the  
commanding officer of the Marines.  
All these questions were answered by  
this deponent as far as he had been  
acquainted with them. The said Ral-  
ston and Floyd then proposed to this  
deponent to visit Baton Rouge, to as-  
certain the exact situation of that fort,  
but declined when the orders of col.  
Grand Pré were stated, and the diffi-  
culty attending such an enterprise.  
Mr. Ralston informed this deponent  
that col. Burr was to be on the 12th  
day of January inst. at Bayou Pierre,  
where he was to wait for his reinforc-  
ment, and to receive his information  
from his agents, who were circulated  
through the country at that time; that  
the first object of col. Burr was to take  
Baton Rouge, where he was to raise  
his standard, and to make his com-  
munication to the government of the  
United States, where he was to be  
joined by the men already engaged, to  
the amount of ten thousand if neces-  
sary; that the number of men at present  
with col. Burr did not exceed one

hundred and fifty; but colonel Burr's  
arrangements were so made, that the  
men already engaged in Kentucky and  
Tennessee should join without shew,  
so that no possible alarm or suspicion  
on the part of the general government  
might take place before he had left  
the territory and taken possession of  
Baton Rouge. Mr. Ralston farther  
stated to this deponent, that it was  
not the intention of col. Burr to pro-  
mote and make a separation of the  
union, but to act against the Spanish  
government, and mentioned the in-  
tended expedition against Mexico.—  
When this deponent mentioned the  
name of capt. Shaw, Mr. Ralston ob-  
served, that if he was one of the Me-  
diterranean officers he was friendly to  
their measures—that it was well un-  
derstood that a large proportion of  
the officers of the army and Mediter-  
ranean officers were already engaged  
in their interests. Mr. Ralston ex-  
pressed great surprise at the conduct  
of gen. Wilkinson in arresting certain  
characters, Swartwout, Ogden, Boll-  
man and Alexander, and repeatedly  
asked this deponent what he thought  
of the conduct of general Wilkinson,  
and whether he believed he had de-  
serted the interests of the party, or was  
it only to cover his greater objects.  
This deponent further declares that  
Mr. Ralston and Floyd visited Fort  
Adams on the evening of the 12th of  
January instant, between sun-set and  
dark, and that he observed them to  
walk round the said Fort.

I certify that on or about the 25th  
January 1807, in conversation with  
General Adair (a prisoner of the U.  
States then in my charge) he observed  
that if he had been permitted to have  
remained 48 hours in New-Orleans,  
unmolested, it would not have been  
in the power of gen. Wilkinson to have  
arrested him, that he believed he had  
more friends in New-Orleans than the  
General, and if he had known or  
thought the General would have ar-  
rested him. He would have brought  
with him his equipage for his protec-  
tion. He further observed that as the  
General had arrested him without au-  
thority, that he would take *Indian Sa-  
tisfaction* from him, made use of ma-  
ny threats, and swore he would take  
the life of the General the first oppor-  
tunity.

down, with the declared purpose of going to  
Norfolk.  
WASHINGTON CITY, May 18.  
The President of the United States on Satur-  
day arrived in this city from Monticello.  
RICHMOND, May 15.  
Col. BURR returned to this city in last  
evening's stage.  
NORFOLK, May 13.  
The ship *Union*, captain Remington, arrived  
this day from Rotterdam, which place he left  
on the twenty eighth day of March. Captain R.  
brings no passengers, but he says, that it was re-  
ported, and very generally believed, that the  
Grand arm under Bonaparte had been defeat-  
ed with great loss, although the papers were  
then opposite the subject.  
Capt. R. says that an army of 60,000 men  
was collecting at the Hague in order to march  
and reinforce the Grand Army; on the day he  
left Rotterdam he saw the City Guards of that  
place cross the Brielle, on their way to the gen-  
eral rendezvous at the Hague.
