COMMUNICATION. The enuse and manner of the late change of administration in England furnish some curious commentaries on her boasted constitution.

It seems that a single individual, of very contemptible talents, is enabled "to excommunicate four millions of human beings" from the highest civil, military and naval departments-because they happen to differ from him in certain articles of religious faith. This

man is called a king.

This influence does not, however, stop here. He is only entitled to put his Veto upon such a measure by arresting the bill AFTER it has passed both bouses of Parliament; but to prevent its introduction or discussion before Parliament. Such is the miserable constitution of the House of Commons, the only boasted depository of English freedom? A minister sirst purchases a majority of votes in this body by means of rotted beroughs or bribing rotten members; and then the influence of his majesty over his ministry completely subjects this majority to his influence. his ministery should be disposed to object to his measures, he may possibly controul them by threat of the loss of their places; and if they appear compleatly unmanageable, he may proceed to carry his threats into execution. they therefore retain their places, they completely sacrifice their principles to the king; if they retain their principles, they sacrifice their places. In the first case, his majesty controuls the majority of the Commons: in the sccond, he displaces the old ministry, that he may appoint a new one more obsequious to his wishes, and equally ready with the first to employ all the influence of the offices of the crown to purchase a majority for his majesty.

And not even here does this influence cease. If the majority of the Commons are too independent in themselves or too much attached to their former patrons, to desert them for his majesty, he has a new expedient for recovering his influence. He may dissolve his parliament; in other words, he may turn every representative out of office, who has been appointed by the people to take care of their intersts. Then come the writs for a new Parliament, which is to be more obsequious than the old one. Then come the same arts into play, which secured a majority for the old ministry; the same corruption over the liege lords of the Boroughs; the same corruption of the electors in those burroughs, where the liege lords are too honest to be bribed, or too weak to controul the election; the same corrupt purchase of the members' votes, after they have been daily returned.

The proceedings connected with the Roman Catholic bill, seem not to have been sufficiently understood.

In the year 1793, the Irish Parliament passed the Irish Catholic bill, by which the Catholics of Ireland were enabled to hold certain commissions in the Army, on taking a particular oath. There were other high commissions however from which they were still excluded; as commander in chief of the army, master general of the ordnance, and general on the staff.

Still the Catholics of England could not hold any commissions; and the Irish Catholics, who could hold them in their own Island, were liable to penalties, if called to England to perform

their military duties.

Some of the London prints state, that his majesty was, informed, when the measure was first proposed to him, that it was simply intended to put the Catholics of England upon the same footing with those of Ireland. The poor ignorsnt Monarch was completely deluded; or perhaps did not at all understand the subject.

When the bill was brought into Par liament, it was then sent to embrace a wider.compass: not only to extend the provisions of the act of '93 to England, but to destroy all the disabilities recognized by that act: In other words to abolish the Test generally as to the army or navy, and as far as it respected the esthelics. It was even predicted by its opponents, that of would ultimately embrace all the civil offices; of course, that a Catholic mught at last be privi-Icaged to hold the highest situations of the law; the lord Chancellor and keep ere of the kings conscience. And this

thing in this country appears more rediculous in the eye of reason and of justice, than to shackle the liberty of conscience, by any kind of political disabibility to any order of men.

The Author of War in Disguise h published a pamphlet in England, zunder the title of "Dangers of the Country." It is divided into two parts; th: first heing written, soon after the ruin of the Prussian Army was certainly known in England, and when it was supposed that she would be again left alone in the war.

The First expatiates on the Dangers to be apprehended by England, if she should be conquered by France.—Of course, the author begins with the proposition that she may he conquered by that formidable power. - Among these consequences, he enumerates, ist. The usurpation or destruction of the throne, 2d. Overthrow of the constitution. 3. Subversion of liberty and laws. 4th Destruction of the funds, and ruin of property in general. 5th. Dreadful extent and effects of the contributions that would be enacted. 6th. The vigorous and merciless Government that would ensue. 7th. The subversion of religious liberties. 8th. Dreadful corruption of morals.

The Second Part expatiates on the Means by which these Dangers may be averted. These are principally military vigor, patience, unanimity and reformation. In speaking on the first point, the author draws the outline of a plan, which is similar to the one proposed by Mr. Jefferson during the Congress of 1805 --- 6. Every man, of a certain age, who was able, was to bear arms: The limitation of age to be from 17 to 45: The men to be divided into three classes; the first, composed of men between 17 and 25; the second, of men between 25 and 35; the third, of men between 35 and 45. Under the head of refermation, the author particularly recommends the abolition of the Slave Trade, which he "firmly believes to be more essential to the salvation of the country, than her volunteers, her navy or her army." This last is a stroke of political superstition, which is untrue in itself, and unworthy of the author's discernment.

Robert Emmet. - Mr. Emmet the Irish advocate, who has, by the brilliancy of his professional talents acquired a degree of practice and tame unexampled for years paft, at the courts of New York, is a brother to another of equal emmence who firmerly flourished in Ireland, and to Robert Emmet, the modern Curtur, illustrious for nobility of mind and misfortune. He bid fair to arrive at and share the celebrity of his brother. But, alas in the bloom of youth and vigor he fell a victim to the arbitrary hold of power. He was executed in Dublin, on a charge of high treason, it having been alledged that he was concerned in the infurrection of the 23d July, 18c7. On his trial he made nn defence ; but after verdict had been pronounced, on the clerk's putting the question in the usual form, "what have you to fay, why judgment, execution, &c. should not take place according to law." He took occasion to deliver one of the most eloquent and impressive harangues that our language can boalt. It has been justiy faid, "it was a voice which spoke " from the grave; and seemed assimilating to the energy and inspiration of eternal truth."-He concludes in the following manner:-

" My lords, you seem impatient for the sacrifice. The blood for which you thirst, is not congealed by the artificial terrors which furround your victim; it circulates warmly and unruffled through the channels which God erested for noble purposes, but which you are bent to d stroy for purposes so grievous, that they cry to heaven-be yet parient! I have but a few more words to fay-I am going to my cold and silent grave; my lamp of light is nearly extinguished; my race is run; the grave opens to receive me, and I sink into its bosom. I have but one request to ask at my departure from this world; it is the charity of its silence. Let no man write my comaph; for as no man who knows my motives, dare now vindicate them, let not prejudice or ignorance asperse them. Let them and me repose in obscurity; and my tomb remain uninscribed, until other times and other men can do justice to my character. When my country takes her place among the nations of the earth, then, and not till then, let my epitaph be written. I have done!" . Public Advertiser.
