

From the Richmond Enquirer. COMMUNICATION.

The cause and manner of the late change of administration in England furnish some curious commentaries on her boasted constitution.

It seems that a single individual, of very contemptible talents, is enabled to excommunicate four millions of human beings from the highest civil, military and naval departments—because they happen to differ from him in certain articles of religious faith.

This influence does not, however, stop here. He is only entitled to put his veto upon such a measure by arresting the bill AFTER it has passed both houses of Parliament; but to prevent its introduction or discussion before Parliament.

And not even here does this influence cease. If the majority of the Commons are too independent in themselves or too much attached to their former patrons, to desert them for his majesty, he has a new expedient for recovering his influence.

The proceedings connected with the Roman Catholic bill, seem not to have been sufficiently understood. In the year 1793, the Irish Parliament passed the Irish Catholic bill, by which the Catholics of Ireland were enabled to hold certain commissions in the Army, on taking a particular oath.

Still the Catholics of England could not hold any commissions; and the Irish Catholics, who could hold them in their own Island, were liable to penalties, if called to England to perform their military duties.

Some of the London prints state, that his majesty was informed, when the measure was first proposed to him, that it was simply intended to put the Catholics of England upon the same footing with those of Ireland.

thing in this country appears more ridiculous in the eye of reason and of justice, than to shackle the liberty of conscience, by any kind of political disability to any order of men.

His sage majesty however at last discovered his mistake: and his ministry were the first victims of his resentment.

The Author of War in Disguise has published a pamphlet in England, under the title of "Dangers of the Country." It is divided into two parts; the first being written, soon after the ruin of the Prussian Army was certainly known in England, and when it was supposed that she would be again left alone in the war.

The First expatiates on the Dangers to be apprehended by England, if she should be conquered by France.—Of course, the author begins with the proposition that she may be conquered by that formidable power.—Among these consequences, he enumerates, 1st. The usurpation or destruction of the throne, 2d. Overthrow of the constitution, 3d. Subversion of liberty and laws, 4th. Destruction of the funds, and ruin of property in general, 5th. Dreadful extent and effects of the contributions that would be enacted, 6th. The vigorous and merciless Government that would ensue, 7th. The subversion of religious liberties, 8th. Dreadful corruption of morals.

The Second Part expatiates on the Means by which these Dangers may be averted. These are principally military vigor, patience, unanimity and reformation. In speaking on the first point, the author draws the outline of a plan, which is similar to the one proposed by Mr. Jefferson during the Congress of 1805—6. Every man, of a certain age, who was able, was to bear arms: The limitation of age to be from 17 to 45: The men to be divided into three classes; the first, composed of men between 17 and 25; the second, of men between 25 and 35; the third, of men between 35 and 45. Under the head of reformation, the author particularly recommends the abolition of the Slave Trade, which he "firmly believes to be more essential to the salvation of the country, than her volunteers, her navy or her army."

Robert Emmet.—Mr. Emmet the Irish advocate, who has by the brilliancy of his professional talents acquired a degree of practice and fame unexampled for years past, at the courts of New York, is a brother to another of equal eminence who formerly flourished in Ireland, and to Robert Emmet, the modern Curran, illustrious for nobility of mind and misfortune. He bid fair to arrive at and share the celebrity of his brother. But, alas! in the bloom of youth and vigor he fell a victim to the arbitrary hold of power. He was executed in Dublin, on a charge of high treason, it having been alleged that he was concerned in the insurrection of the 23d July, 1807. On his trial he made no defence; but after verdict had been pronounced, on the clerk's putting the question in the usual form, "what have you to say, why judgment, execution, &c. should not take place according to law?" He took occasion to deliver one of the most eloquent and impressive harangues that our language can boast. It has been justly said, "it was a voice which spoke from the grave; and seemed assimilating to the energy and inspiration of eternal truth."

WAR REPORT. Extract of a letter from Petersburg, (Geo.) dated April 21, received at Savannah. "A gentleman with whom I conversed yesterday, and who is directly from St. Louis (Louisiana,) which place he left on the 29th ult. informed me that the Spaniards had actually declared War, and had commenced hostilities on the river, and that every preparation was making to meet them."

Our chief purpose is to inform you, that some time ago, in consequence of an order the quarantine was reduced to a few days; but unfortunately, (soon after, an American vessel arrived at Alicante from Barnstable, on board of which were found two sailors, with the highest symptoms of the yellow fever. In consequence, a severe order was issued from the king himself, that all vessels coming from the United States should perform a strict quarantine of forty days. At first it was reported, and believed generally, that the cargoes could not be landed, or the captain permitted to visit the lazaretto; but upon further information, we were assured, that the cargoes might be discharged, and the masters be privileged as before."

At Dominique, April 1, ship Julia-Ann, 44 days from Nantucket, waiting a market; ship Mendon, of Boston, from River Plate, for Havana, with stores, brought in by an English privateer, and expected to be condemned. The brig Brunswick, from Charleston, for Bordeaux, was spoken April 17, in lat. 32, long 83. The ship Julius Caesar, Hall, from Liverpool, bound to Charleston, was spoken in lat. 31, 53, long 75, out 47 days. At Leghorn, February 27, ship Sally-Ann, Glover, Boston, at quarantine; ship Commerce, Tirrell, of Weymouth, from Boston, ditto; Hetty, Day, taken by the French.
