NEW-YORK, May 211

We have received New Orleans papers to the 20th April, by the ship Vigilant; and Cork papers to the 9th of the same month, (containing London dates to the 3d) by the brig Olprey: but they are wholly barren of intelligence.

Captain Weeks, of the ship Washington, has favored the editor of the MERCANTILE AD-VERTISER with a file of Paris papers to the 2d of April, and Rochelle to the 5th, both inclusive; from which the following articles are copied.

Translated for the Mercantile Advertiser. PRUSSIA.

Berlin, 18th March. The Emperor Napoleon is expected here evezy moment. It is believed that his majesty, after a short stay in this city, well let off for Dresden, where great preparations are making for his reception.

A French commissary, convicted of divers frauds, has been condemned to death, and shot in the garden of the menagerie.

AUSTRIA.

Vienna, March 21. The court gazette of to-day contains an article which leaves not the smallest doubt of a clese union having been sormed between England and Russia, against the independence of the Porte. This article says that the squadron of Admiral Louis stationed off the itle of Tenedos, has been reinforced by four 3 deckers and feveral frigates and corvettes; that on the 21st February they attempted to force the palfage of the Dardan lles, which is defended by feven forts; that the action was very warm and little favourable to the small number of vesfels which the Turks had to oppose against them. Even in the midft of the action the English began to "geociate, and proposed accommodations, which were still going on at the departure of the courier. It is believed that the Porte will not susser itself to be intimidated.

Letters from Hungary fay that the Russians have renounced their enterprize against the isle of Lefina in Dalmatia. The Ruttian Iquadron under admiral Siniavin, cruifing in the Ionian seas, has been reinforced by three ships of the line, and nine other imaller vellels of war.

GERMANY.

Frankfort, Murch 25. The fortresses of Moldavia and Waliachia are about to be repaired and supplied with every article requisite for maintaining a long liege, in case it should be necessary. WIRTEMPERG.

Excepting some intignificant skirmishes of advanced posts, nothing new has taken place between the two armies. From the frequent and successive journies of General Bertraid, his majesty's zid de camp, to Koningsberg and Memel, it is presumed all h pes of negociations for peace are not vanished. The minister, prince Benevento, who had gone to the French imperial head quarters, has returned to Warfaw. The Turkith and Perlian legations were still at that city at the departure of the ccurier; but would foon remove to Berlin, the diplomatic body having already let off for that

LONDON, APRIL 3. On Monday evening as his Majesty was leavnig the Queen's Palace for Windsor, the carriage as utual, went very flow till it got upon Constitution Hill. As the carriage was passing near to the kitchen of the Palace, a young man, genteely dreffed, attempted to force open one of the blinds of his majelty's carriage, to put in a paper -Sayers the Police Officer was in attendance near the spot, and immediately, seized the young man; and on examining him he discovered that he was a foreigner; that he was not conscious that he was doing wrong, and was unacquainted with the courle to prefent a petition to his majesty. Sayers, in consequence, did not keep him in custody; but took his petition, and told him he would deliver it to the King, and appointed him to attend yesterday, between 12 and 1 o'clock, at the Queen's Pa-

lace, for an answer. Sayers took the Petition to the Secretary of State's Office, and he was directed by Mr. Read to bring the man to the Office, when he came for an answer. Yesterday the young man attended at the Palace, agreeably to the appointment of Sayers, for an answer to the petition, and Sayers, took him before Mr. Read, who fent him to the Alien Office, where, we understand, he was ordered to find sureties, not to be guilty, of fimilar conduct, or he should be sent out of the country. He is a native of Germany, and the petition was written in the German language.

We have heard it from so many quarters that it is impossible for us to doubt the fact, that Mr. Canning was negociating to form a part of Lord Grenvill's government, and that it was on the point of being carried into effect, even after the Catholic Bill was brought forward. The Transport board has in confequence intimated to the usual contractors for providing transports, that it will soon be at liberty to treat for an unlimited number for three months service, and that the contract will not be limited to copper-bottomed ships., It is certainly the opinion of many diffinguithed military men, that while the enemy was kept so fully occupied by the vigorous movements of the Rulians in Poland, and so much pressed by our brave ally as to be obliged to march to the grand army every soldier that could be removed from France; -this country might have taken the opportunity to deftroy all the works at Boulogne, and annibilate the cock boat flotilla there-an enterprize which would have produced incalculable benefit in depressing the arrogant views of the common enemy, and railing the confidence, and exciting the energies of other powers to affert their independence. We hope that whatever the preject may be, ministers will keep it a profound fecret till the blow be struck.
