TURKEY.
Constantinople, February 13.
The Sublime Porte has transmitted to the ministers of foreign powers the following note on the departure of the English minister:
"Although the faithful relations which have incessantly existed between the Sublime Porte and the court of England could not have given rise to any coolness between them; and though the Sublime Porte, justly offended at the strange propositions which the English minister made a few days ago in a conference; it has contented itself in replying that "it was actually at war with Russia and at peace with England;" at the moment when we could flatter ourselves that after the most mature reflections the English envoy would desist from pretensions so derogatory to the dignity of nations and the honor of powers; that envoy has, on the contrary, renewed them in a note to which is demanded a written answer; and afterwards, without announcing his departure, and without any known cause, he embarked suddenly with his suite and some of the merchants of his nation in an English frigate which was in port, and which, cutting her cables, failed at midnight. It was only in a note he left, to be given after his departure to the Sublime Porte, that he declares as the principal cause of his discontent, the refusal of a passport for a courier which he wished to send to the Dardanelles. As he had not received on that occasion a negative answer, this supposed refusal could not have been the motive for his departure; and it is well known that neither he nor any other English subject have had cause to complain of any act by which their safety could be endangered.
Though this conduct would have sufficiently authorized the Sublime Porte to act in a manner suitable to the provocation of the English envoy, it has not however thought proper to depart from those principles of equity by which it has been constantly animated; and in the firm persuasion that the court of England is, on its part, incapable of conducting itself in a manner contrary to the rules of justice, has given to the care of Hubsch, Danish charge d'affaires, and attorney for the said British minister, all the effects and moveables belonging to him and to the persons in his suite; and besides, his highness, in granting his beneficent protection to the families and to the English individuals who remain in the country, has given precise orders that they may be in safety throughout the whole Ottoman empire. He has also ordered to the officers of the regency to cause the vessels and properties of the English subjects to be respected, and to leave them as they are until further orders.
The Sublime Porte has caused the present official note to be drawn up as a new proof of the moderation and justice which have always directed its conduct, and has caused it to be transmitted to all the ministers of friendly powers, that they may communicate the same to their respective courts.

SWEDISH POMERANIA.
Greifswald, 17th March.
During the first days of this month the Swedes have made several attempts to drive the French from their lines. On the 14th their attack produced a very warm engagement. The Swedes were forced to retire in great disorder.

POLAND.
Warsaw, 19th March.
Our armies are in motion in spite of the rigour of the season. Marshal Massena will no doubt begin here by a coup d'etat. We are therefore in expectation of a battle soon, which may be general. The headquarters of the grand army, it is thought, will be established at Puzositz.
Letters from Vienna announce that the aid-camp of the king of Prussia, M. de Goetzen, still continued in that capital, where he has frequent conferences with the ministers, particularly with Count de Stadion, chief of the department of foreign affairs. On his part the Russian ambassador at Vienna continues to receive frequent couriers from the Russian headquarters in Poland.

A FEW considerations on the letter of WILLIAM LOVE, commander of his Britannic Majesty's sloop of war DRIVER, including some REMARKS on the observations which he claims as drawn forth from several quarters.

The wide dissimilarity of principles which exists between Republicans and Federalists, the philanthropy of the former and the avarice of the latter, forbid all kind of concourse in opinion between them, even on subjects which might be reasonably supposed well calculated to unite contending parties, like those of Jerusalem when besieged by Titus, for the honor of the nation, and the welfare of the citizens. The letter of Love, the commander of a British sloop of war, calculated as it is to rouse the indignation of every patriot, has only served to give a higher tone to the spirit of opposition; and instead of pointing their vengeance at the offending officer of a foreign power, the federal writers have commenced a merciless attack upon the executive magistrate of their own country, and the administration of the government at large. Had they alone appeared on this occasion the accusers of our government and the revilers of its present officers, they might have proceeded to discharge the venom of their spleen without interruption, until Time, which a little book tells us "cuts down both great and small," had manifested that their folly is only exceeded by their malevolence; because, as Mr. Gibbon very justly observes, "Every animal employs the note, or cry, or howl, which is peculiar to its species," and it would be absurd to expect any thing from federalists but abuse of Mr. Jefferson and his policy: But when Mr. Cheesman, the able Editor of the *American Citizen*, furnishes a commentary for opposition to "con by rote" and "cast into the teeth" of Republicans, no man favorable to the ascendant of free principles can view his conduct, and the use that has been made of his strictures, without deep concern.

In the discharge of his duty, captain Kabetzen, informed Love of the tenor of the president's proclamation of May 3d, 1866; demanded that the DRIVER sloop of war should depart from the harbor of Charleston within twenty-four hours; and in the language of humanity expressed his regret if a refusal on the part of Love should compel the shedding of blood. This letter was dated on the 2d of May; Love did not answer it until the day following. He had taken time for reflection. In this country he knew there were men enough who had ridiculed the president's proclamation, who had repre-
