The enemy appearing at the same time near Braunsber, against the corps of Lestocq, seemed seriously to design to advance, but the brave resistance of the Russians, and the skillful movements of General Lestocy prevented him and the position of both armies remained as before.

"By reports from Gen. Essen, of the 15th of feb. he had that day an engagement with the enemy near Ostrolenka; the issue of which, though not altogether such as he intended, made the enemy retreat to Pultusk, upon which the Russian corps advanced beyond Ostrolenka, and has already established a communication with the corps of Toist y, which makes the left wing of the Russian Grand Army."
