**FORGERY DETECTED.**  
[Some of our readers may remember, that about the beginning of the present year, we extracted from a Philadelphia paper, a curious account of certain writings found in a globe of marble, dug up at Aleppo, from which it was inferred, that the *Apocalypse* or *Revelations* was written by Cerinthus, and not by St. John. This account was given in a Philadelphia paper as a translation of an article from the *Marseilles Gazette*, of the 20th of Oct. 1866. A writer under the signature of Cephas, commented on this narrative in the *Palladium*; and expressed his fears that this story was transcribed from a French paper into some of ours, by some disciple of TOM PAINE, to discredit the validity of the *New Testament*. Some gentlemen who knew the circumspection of editors of periodical papers, at this time, in Roman Catholic countries, doubted if such a publication ever appeared in a French newspaper; among these were Dr. Waterhouse, who being a member of the *Marseilles* academy of sciences, &c. wrote to one of his correspondents in t. a. city, and enclosed the publication on that subject from our paper; on Friday he received via Philadelphia the following letter in answer to his queries.]

*Marseilles*, March 28.  
SIR,  
Immediately on the receipt of your letter of the 12th of January, I went to the printer and editor of the *Marseilles Gazette*, to enquire, agreeably to your wish, respecting the "Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Aleppo, to his friends in this city," said to be printed in the *Marseilles Gazette* of Oct. 20, 1866. On examining the number of that date, there was no to be found a single word of the matter!  
I was accompanied in my researches by M. ACHARD, the Director of our Public Library, and perpetual secretary to our Academy of Arts and Sciences. This is an old gentleman, endowed with much learning, especially in antiquities, and whose son is actually the printer and editor of the *Marseilles Gazette*. He assured me that he had no recollection of any such article, as appeared in the *Philadelphia* paper, and in the *New England Palladium*, purporting to be a translation from the *Gazette* of this city. We examined, with strict attention all the *Gazettes*, from the 1st of August until this day; and it is our opinion, as well as the opinion of many other gentlemen, that the piece which caused so much alarm in the *timorous consciences* of your country is an absolute LIE, and has been published in some other paper; but of which, we have no knowledge whatever.

The vessel which carries this, will sail off tomorrow, for I would have annexed a certificate of M. Achard, and one of the Magistracy of this city, to support what I have said. I hope, however, that the minds of your friends of the clergy will be satisfied with what is said above.

You are at liberty to use my letter as you think proper.

NEW-HAVEN, May 18.  
On Monday morning the mail stage which left this city about 9 o'clock, and had proceeded within about 4 miles of Guilford, the hook of the whiffletree, attached to the harness of one of the leading horses broke, which put the whole in disorder, when the driver in endeavoring to check them, was thrown from his seat, fell on his head, which dislocated his neck, and he expired in an instant. He had his post horn in his hand when taken up. The stage ran a few rods, when it upset—there were a number of passengers in it, but they received no injury.—The driver's name was Thomas Nelson, aged about 22 years.

WILMINGTON, (N. C.) May 12.  
The French schooner *Two Friends*, from Samana, (a port in the department of Santo Domingo) bound to Baltimore, with a cargo of Coffee Sugar and Mahogany, was on the 11th of April last, captured on the coast of South Carolina, by his Britannic Majesty's brig of war *Pelican*, carrying dispatches from Jamaica to the British commodore stationed at Hampton Roads. On the 17th the captain and crew of the captured vessel, as well as five passengers, were sent on shore near Wallington, (N. C.) after having been unmercifully plundered of all their money, plate and clothes, and left only what they had on their backs.  
Such a piece of injustice and cruelty, which would not be astonishing, although unlawful, from a privateer of Bermuda or Providence, may be considered as degrading to the *British flag*.

**IMPORTANT**  
To masters of vessels trading to Virginia.  
An act directing the method of proceeding in courts of equity against absent debtors, and other absent defendants, and for settling the proceedings on attachments against absent debtors.  
[From the above act, the following sections are extracted, and merit the attention of masters of vessels.]  
No. 1. No master of a ship or any other vessel shall transport or carry any person whatsoever out of this commonwealth, unless such person shall first have published for six weeks successively in the *Virginia Gazette*, his, or her resolution to depart therefrom, under the penalty of answering or paying every debt and duty such person at his or her departure but for this commonwealth may owe, or stand bound for, or the commonwealth or to any citizen thereof, by judgment, bond, bill, covenant, account, or by any other way or mean whatsoever, to be re-

covered against such master by action of debt, in any court of record within this commonwealth.  
"XVI. Every master of every ship or other vessel offending herein, shall be liable to be sued at any time for any debt due or owing from the person so transported. And whenever any such action or suit shall be brought against him, the court wherein the same shall be depending, may rule the defendant to give a special bail, and the clerk shall endorse on the writ, that appearance bail is required: Provided, the plaintiff shall make affidavit before a magistrate of the cause of action, which shall be transmitted to the clerk of the court."

On Thursday the 21st ult. the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, met in Philadelphia. The session was opened by an appropriate sermon by the Rev. Dr. Miller, of New-York. The Rev. Mr. Alexander, of Philadelphia, was chosen Moderator, and the Rev. Mr. Cathcart, of Yorktown, Penn. was appointed clerk of the assembly.

The lieutenant governor of Nova Scotia has prorogued the General Assembly of that province until the 12th day of September; and has appointed the 12th day of June to be observed as a day of public fasting and humiliation.

Captain Lovett, of the ship *Connecticut*, from Surinam, informs us that the English ship *Duke of Kent*, Ricketts, arrived there on the 3d of May, in 30 days from Rio de la Plata, with intelligence that since the reduction of Montevideo, ten sail of American vessels in harbour (amongst them the *American Eagle*, of New-York) were condemned for having Spanish property on board.

Capt. Lovett, of the ship *Connecticut*, who arrived last evening in 22 days from Surinam, fav red the editor of this *Gazette* with the following paragraph. Though we have already given the capture of Montevideo, there are other circumstances connected with it not heretofore known.

"The English ship *Duke of Kent*, Capt. Ricketts, arrived at Surinam the 3d of May, in 30 days from the river of Plate and brings intelligence of the English having captured Montevideo, on the 1st of April, after a most severe conflict. The greatest difficulty was in landing the troops, and when this was effected, they met with most desperate resistance from the Spaniards, who had barred each every avenue with a mine, and submitted only to the inevitable perforce of the English, who, it seems, were joined by General Buzarsford, who had escaped from the Spaniards.  
"The *Duke of Kent* was the first vessel, that failed from England after the news of the capture of Buenos-Ayres, and, finding it retaken, proceeded to the West Indies for a market. Left at Montevideo 8th of English ships, and to fail of Americans, the latter condemned for having Spanish property on board. The ship *American Eagle*, King, of N. York, was one of the number."

These, with the other theatres of Paris, amount to 1,388; and, supposing that the 166 theatres have 20 persons each, they amount to the trifling number of 3,368 theatrical artists.  
From the above list we may form some idea whence proceeds the gay and lively disposition of the French nation. There is no doubt but the stage has a very material effect in the improvement of all ranks in their address and manner; there is no place where better lessons could be received than from a pure moral stage. The stage is a school, where we often see what has been represented in real life, and what is daily going on, particularly as to intrigue and deception, and where very good lessons are given to avoid or execute.

To the American Editors of Newspapers.  
The culture of fruit trees being an important object in every part of the United States, and in many of the old towns the scarcity of timber and fuel pointing to the necessity of rearing forest trees, I have observed with regret in every part of the country a great error in regard to the raising of trees of every kind—that is, in permitting the grass to grow near the body of young trees. Even the hardiest forest trees will not thrive well, unless the earth round them, at least two or three feet, is kept loose and free from grass or weeds. For want of attention to this important circumstance, innumerable trees decay and die; and the growth of those which do not die is so slow, that the labor of the planter is nearly lost—as in that state it will require four times the number of years to rear them to maturity, that would be required if properly cultivated.  
In planting trees, it is essential to their quick growth, that the holes be much larger than the extent of the roots and that some rich earth be put into the holes. And let it be remembered, that the growth of trees may be increased by proper manure and culture, as much as other plants; and persons may ascertain this fact, by due attention to some trees, & neglect of others.  
As the loss to the farmers is immense, in consequence of the error above mentioned, it is hoped that every printer may give the hints

to his readers.
