NEW-YORK, June 1.
By the ship Rover, captain Taylor, the edi-
tors of the New-York Gazette have received a
file of Dublin papers to the 22d of April,
which (with the irregular papers by the Durt-
mouth) completes our dates from London,
down to the 21st of April.
These papers contain the 67th and 68th
bulletins, dated at Osterode, the 25th and
29th of March. They contain an account of
several skirmishes—We shall give them here-
after.
We have given below an abstract from Bon-
naparte's message to the senate—it shews the
state of his pulse, which seems to beat in the
most pacific manner. Russian doses have had
a wonderful effect in restoring the reason of
his imperial majesty. We hope for a perfect
cure.
A London paper of the 17th April, observes,
"government this morning received dispatches
from America, which confirm the account of
the rejection of the treaty with this country,
by the President and Senate of the United
States."
London, April 17-
Letters from Wallachia state, that the
Turkish garrison of Rajova Braila surrendered
to the Russian troops, after a siege of 8 days
and a terrible bombardment; and that George-
wo had been taken by the Russian general by
assault, at the head of 24,000 men. The garri-
son was entirely cut to pieces, for the Russians
had exp. res orders to give no quarters.
BONAPARTE'S MESSAGE.
"Though at present (says this message) we
ask for new sacrifices from our people, in order
that we may obtain a greater extent of force,
it is not that we should abuse this power for
the purpose of prolonging the war. Our
policy is invariable. We offered peace to
England and before the fourth coalition had shewn
itself; the same peace we offer to England
still. The principal envoy which England
employed in those negotiations has made the
most public declarations, and in the most un-
equivocal terms, that the peace would have been
both honorable and advantageous to England;
thus he has made the justice of our cause
appear evident. We are ready to conclude a
peace with Russia upon the same conditions as
were signed by her negotiator, but which were
rejected in consequence of the arts and
intrigues of the English. We are ready to
restore the eight millions of the inhabitants
which we have conquered, their tranquility,
and to restore to the king of Prussia his capi-
tal."
"But though so many traits of moderation,
already so often renewed, have not been able
to prevail over the deceptions to which Eng-
land, inflated as it is by its passions, has had
recourse, that power cannot see the possibi-
lity of peace but in our annihilation; nothing,
therefore, remains for us but to bear the cala-
mities of war, and to throw the shame and
odium of it upon that nation, which continues
to purchase its insupportable blood of the
continent. We shall, in the resources of our
own mind, in the courage, devotion, and
power of our people, find certain means to ren-
der all the efforts of that coalition, formed of
hatred and injustice, null and void, and to turn
them to the disgrace of their authors.—Fren-
chmen! we brave all dangers for the glory and
tranquility of our children!"
On the 5th inst. the prince arch-chancellor
reported to the senate, and after the orators of
the council of State were in reduced, the above-
mentioned ordered their report to be made as
follows, by the senator M. Lazpede:
"Gentlemen senators—You have put his
majesty's message into the hands of your spe-
cial committee, dated Osterode, March 20.
You have likewise laid before your commit-
tee the project of the senate's consensus, ad-
ded to his majesty's message, together with
other documents therewith belonging.
"The motives of his majesty's message are
explained in the address of his excellency the
arch-chancellor, in the report of the minister of
war, and in the address of the councillors of
State, the orators of the government. Those
documents have been investigated and discussed
in various sittings, with all the attention due
to the importance of your determination.
"That nothing should be in chance when
the great interests of the country are concern-
ed, the period which will necessarily call the
confederates of 1588 to join their standards, will
scarcely run to six months. However, these
young soldiers are not to pass beyond the limits
of the empire; but they are to be gradually in-
troduced into their new appointment, and to be
made acquainted with the military science in
the safest and most agreeable manner. They
are to be configured to the instruction of the most
celebrated warriors, chosen by the senate out of
its own body. Thus they will maintain the
tranquility of the French provinces, and defend
its coasts and frontiers against all attacks of the
enemy. They will cover France with formidable
camps, and lend the call for fathers of fam-
ilies, whose generous dispositions may have
led them to range themselves under the banners
of the national guard. They will replace a
number of old soldiers in the different depart-
ments, who may again long to replace them-
selves under the command of their em-
peror. They will contribute to the forma-
tion of a military force, which, at present, ex-
tended over almost the whole surface of Europe
promise the most decisive advantages. And
lastly, by connecting the best military means,
they will conquer that peace, which is still of-
fered to our enemies; which is even this mo-
ment offered by a conqueror, whose astonishing
victories have not in the least diminished his
moderation. This is his object, and such will
be the effects of the senate's consensus submit-
ted to your deliberations.—Your committee hav-
ing observed with pleasure, from the pa-
pers laid before them, that the levy of 80,000
new conscripts will not require any fresh sacri-
fices, their decision was unanimous. Senators,
they have charged me to transmit to you their
acceptance of the senate's consensus, which had
been previously submitted to your considera-
tion.
They have also to lay before you a sketch of
an address to his majesty the emperor and king,
together with a decree for raising the conscripts,
in answer to his majesty's message of the 20th
of March, 1867, as a specimen of the bravery,
fidelity, and the devotion of all the French to
his majesty's person."
In consequence of this report, the senate, in
that sitting, adopted the project of the senate's
consensus, together with the address presented
by the committee.
