down to the 21st of April. These papers contain the 67th and 68th bulletins, dated at Osterode, the 25th and 29th of March. They co tain an account of several skirmishes-We shall give them here-

We have given below an abstract from Bonaparte's message to the senate—it shews the state of his pulse, which seems to best in the most pacific manner. Russian doses have had a wonderful effect in restoring the reason of

A London paper of the 17th April, observes, " government this morning received dispatches from America, which confirm the account of the rejection of the treaty with this country, ly the President and Senate of the United

his imperial majesty. We hope for a perfect

London, April 17-Letters from Wallachia state, that the Turkish garrison of Rajova Braila surrendered to the Russian troops, after a siege of 8 days and a terrible bombardment; and that Giurgewo had been taken by the Russian general by assault, at the head of 24,000 men. The garrison was entirely cut to pieces, for the Russians had ex rers orders to give no quarters.

BONAPARTE'S MESSAGE.

"Though at present (says this message) we ask for new secrifices from our people, in order that we may obtain a greater extent of force, it is not that we should abuse this power for the purpose of prolonging the war. Our policy is invariable. We offered peace to Eng and before the fourth coalition had shewn itself; the same peace we offer to England still. The principal envoy which England employed in those negociations has made the most public declarations, and in the most unequivocal terms, that the peace would have been both honorable and advantageous to England; thus he has made the justice of our cause appear evident. We are ready to conclude a peace with Russia upon the same conditions as were signed by her negociator, but which were r jected in consequence of the arts and intrigues of the English We are ready to restore the eight millions of the inhabitants which we have conquered, their tranquility, and to restore to the king of Prussia his capi-

" But though so many traits of moderation, aiready so often renewed, have not been able to prevail over the deceptions to which England, inflamed as it is by its passions, has had r course, that power cannot see the possibility of prace but in our annihilation; nothing, therefore, remains for us but to bear the calsmities of war, and to throw the shame and odium of it upon that nation, which continues to purchase its monopoly with the blood of the contin at. We shall, in the resources of our oun mind, in the courage, devot on, and the power of our people, find certain means to render all the efforts of that condition, formed of hatred and injustice, muil and void, and to turn tiem to the disgrace of their authors .- Frenchmen! we brave all dangers for the glory and tranquility of our children."

On the 5th instant the prince arch-chancellor repaired to the s nate, and after the orators of the council of State were in roduced, the abovementioned ordered their report to be made as follows, by the senator M. Lacepede: " Gentlemen senators-You have put his

explained in the address of his excellency the archi-chancellor, in the report of the minister of war, and in the a drefs of the counsellors of State, the craters of the government. Those documents have been investigated and discussed in va iou: fittings, with all the attention die to the importance of your determination. "That nothing fhould be not to chance when

the greatest interests of the country are concerned, the period which will neecstarily call the conscripts of :508 to join their standards, will scarcely run to fix months However, these young soldiers are not to pals beyond the limits of the empire; but they are to be gradually introduced into their new appointment, and to be ma 'e acquainted with the military science in the faseit and most agreeable manner. They are to be configned to the instruction of the most celebrated warriors, chosen by the senate out of its own body. Thus they will maintain the tranquility of the French provinces, and defend its coafts and from iers against all attacks of the enemy. They will cover France with formidable camps, and lessen the call for fathers of families, whose generous dispositions may have led them to range themfelves under the banners of the national guard They will replace a number of old soldiers in the disserent departments, who may again long to replace themsolves under the command of their emperor. They will contribute to the formation of a military force, which, at present, extended over almost the whole surface of Europe promise the most decisive advantages. And lastly, by connecting the best military means, they will conquer that peace, which is still ofsered to our enemies ; which is even this moment offered by a conqueror, whose astonishing victories have not in the least diminished his moderation. This is his object, and such will be the effects of the senatus consul:um submitted to your deliberations .- Your committee having observed with pleasure, from the papers laid before them, that the levy of 80,000 new conscripts will not require any frest lacrifices, their decision was unanimous. Senators, they have charged me to transmit to you their acceptance of the senatus consultum, which had been previously submitted to your considera-
