So Federal City, it would be the 24th or 25th of April (putting all accidents out of the question) before gen. Wilkinson could have received his orders to come on: since that time until this he has had thirty days to reach Richmond. Cou'd a journey of 15 or 1600 miles be reasonably performed in thirty days; who can bear a journey of fifty miles per day for thirty days together? but, sir, gen. Wilkinson is not here; due means have been used to bring him here, his materiality is ascertained by his affidavit and the attorney does not choose to send up the indictment in his absence. But we admit it seems that we are not ready to make good our charge. In my opinion there is evidence enough to prove the treason independent of gen. Wilkinson. But it is important in every point of view that that gentleman should be here; it is important to his own reputation; it is important to the people of the U. S. that he should be here; and on the part of the grand jury. Sir, there is no calculating what inserences, unsavorable to the prosecution might be drawn from the mere circumstance of his absence. The attorney is therefore in my opinion very right not to hazard the justice and the fair trial of this case, by sending up the indictment in gen. Wilkinson's absence.

But it seems that Wilkinson's affidavit has been already decided on to have no relation to the charge of treason. To what gen. Wilkinson's assidavit tended while it was inomulated, or connected only with that of gen. Eaton, is no proof of what its tendency may be now in connexion with the great mass of additional testimony which we have collected. Sir, we say that this is the key stone which binds the great arch of evidence now in our possession.

As to sending up the indictment, it is out of the question. Truth and justice require that it should not now be sent up. But we hope, sir, that the motion to commit Aaron Burr will be received, because we think it a legal measure and a just and necessary measure of precaution.

. WEDNISDAY, May 27.

The proceedings on this day were extremely interesting; but are of too great a length to be detailed at present. Indeed that part of it which embraces the evdience given in, are for obvious reasons improper to be published at this stage of the prosecution.

Mr. Hay commenced with stating that all hope of an arrangement with ecl. B's counsel to secure his person, and to avoid the impropriety of a public examination, was at an end. Col. Burr would not consent to give bail on the charge of treason; and Mr. II. read a letter from his counsel to that effect. He should, therefore, proceed to an examination of the testimony. In doing this, he should observe a chronological order: take the conspiracy at its earliest crisis, and introduce the events

as they subsequenty arose.

An interesting discussion took place upon the propriety of this arrangement. Mr. Il's. counsel protested aginst it. They contended that there were two things to be proved: 1st. An overt act of a treasonable conspiracy: 2d. That col. B. was connected with it. If the first wanted proof, the last was nugatory. They contended, therefore, that the overt act ought first to be proved; before any other evidence was exhibited as to the intention or the The chief justice lest the order of

the evidence to the judgment of the attorney of the U.S.

Mr. Hay then offered gen. Wilkinson's affidavit to be read: when a long discussion was entered into on the principles of evidence.

The chief justice said that the most proper course was first to introduce the evicence as to the overt act, and,

that gen. Wilkinson's afficavit was not

at that time to be read. Mr. Hay then called Peter Taylor and Allbright, the first was Blanmerhansett's gardener, the other had worked on his island. Of their testimony it is for the present improper to make any statement. They were sucseeded by a letter partly in cypher and partly in German addressed to a person in New-Orleans; which Mh. John Brown Cormerly secretary to general Marshal on his embassy to Paris) and Mr. Huhner, a most respectable German merchant of this city, were sworn to interpret to the best of their abilities, mis interpretation to be presented

to the court to-morrow. Mr. Hay then brought forward an affidavit of one Dubas, a serieaut in the army of the U. S. This affidavit was represented by the prosecution to be of the greatest importance; but was objected to by Mr. B's counsel on the ground of informality; the affida-

vit appeared on its face to be taken before one Cena, who signed himself a magistrate of the town of Orleans. This signature was succeeded by gov. Claiborne's verification of the fact on one day after the date of the certificate. But there was no caption to the assidavit, as "N. Orleans Set." nor any mention made at the foot of it of the place where it was taken.

A long argument ensued upon its admissibility; and the court adjourned without giving any opinion. (To be continued.)

NEW-YORK, June 2.

]Further extracts from Irish papers.] Admiralty Office, April 12. Captain Donnelly of his Majesty's ship Ardent, arrived this morning with dispatches from Rear Admiral Sterling, commanding a squadron of kis Majest;'s thips in the Rio de

la Plata, of which the following is a copy: Diadem, of M. nte Viedo, Feb 8. . Sin-I have peculiar fatlifaction in congratulating my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty on the capture of Monte Viedo, as well from the impertance of the conquell, as from the honor which has thereby been acquired by

his Majesty's arms. Immediately on the arrival of Brigadier General Sir Samuel Auchmuty, at Maldonado, it was determined to invelt this place, and having assembled our force off the illand of Flores, ? descent was effested on the ibth ult. near Car reta Point, which is about seven miles to the eastward of the town. The enemy had assem-Hed in considerable numbers, and with several pieces of artillery seemed determined to oppose our progress.

The navigation of the Rio de la Plata with the strong breezes which we have experienced for several weeks, rendered the landing of our troops, and affilling their operations, very difficult, but the place cholen was happily adapted to allow the covering vellels, under the direction of Captain Hardyman, to approach so close as to command the beach, and notwithflanding the weather threatened and was unfavorable, the foldlers all got on fliere without a fingle accident of any kind, and were in possession of the heights before 6 o'clock, with such things as the general wanted.

On the 19th the aimy moved forwards, and as an a'tempt to harrafs tha rear was expected I directed boats to proceed close along thore to look out for and bring off any wounded men, whitst the vessels were placed to prevent the enemy from giving annovance, and I had the happinels to hear that ail the sufferers were bro't off in despite ef well directed efforts to destroy them. In the evening I approached, with thefleet, off Chio Bay, near which the aimy encamped, within 2 miles of the city.

I had landed about 800 feamen and royal marines, under the command of Captain Donnelly, to ad with the troops; and as I faw no advantage could refult from any effect of thips a. gainst a strong fortress, well desended on all paints, and which, from the th dlownels of the water, corld not be approached wichin a distance to allow fliot to be of any ule. I dispulled of the squadron so as to prevent any escape from the harbor, as well as to impede a communication between Colonna and Buenos Ayres, and confined my whole attention to give every petable affiftance in forwarding the fiege, by landing guns from the line & battle ships, with ammunition, flores, provisions and every thing r. quired by the commander of the forces

The distance which the ships lay from the store, with the almost conflant high winds and swell we had, and the great way every thing was to be dragged by the feamen, up a heavy fandy read, made the duty excexvely laborious. The squadron had almost daily 1400 men on shore, and this sh p was ofte i lest with only 30 men on board

The defence made by the enemy protracted the fiege longer than was expected, and reduced our flock of powder so low, that the King's thips, with all the transports, and what a fleet of merchatmen had for sale, could not have fu:nished a further consumption for more than 2 days, when a practicable breach was fortunatery made, and on the 31st infl. early in the morning, the town and citadel were molt gallantly carried by florm.

In a conversation of the general on the preceding day, I had made fuch a disposition of the smaller vessels and armed boats, as appeared most likely to answer a desired purpose, and so toon as Fort Saint Philip was in possession of the British troops, Lieut. Wm. Milne with the armed launches, took p ffession of the island of Rattones, mounting ten guns, garriloned by seventy men, which surrendered without any resillance, sithough it is well adapted for desence, and might have given considerable annoyance. A very fine frigate, mounting 28 guns, was fet fire to by her crew, and blown up with an awful explosion; as also three gun boats, but the other vessels in the harbour were saved by the exertions of our people.

It has been much the custom to speak lightly of the relistance to be expected from the Spaniards in this country; and with confidence of the dacility which has been given to naval operations, by a prior knowledge of the river; but the battles lately fought prove the former opinion to be erroneous, and experience evinces that all the information hitherto acquired had not prevented the most formidable difficulties.

The conduct of the cap ains, officets, leamen and royal marines of the thips and veffels, which I kept with me for this service, has met with my entire approbation.

(This Gazetto then gives a lift of the prizes taken at Monte Viedo-they amount to 57 -Among them are 3 fluips from 28 to 30 guns each-tour from 16 to 10 guns each-the reit are Indiamen and merchantmen.)
