Of the operation of the Imperial Russian Army, from the 14th December, to the 18th March, 1867.

Baron De Benningen having, after the battle of Pultusk, effected his junction with the troops under orders of Count Schadowitz, obtained a short time after the command in chief.

On the 12th January, (23d N. S.) the head quarters were at Bieschowitz. Ney and Bernadotte effected their junction, and continued their retreat in disorder, and our troops took many prisoners.

The 14th of January, (25th N. S.) the head quarters were at Liebstadt. Very bold actions took place in the neighborhood of Mohrenzen.

On the 17th of February, (18 March) major general Knorring attacked the enemy at Allenstein, beat them, killed a great number, took 50, and delivered 200 Russians.

The brave general Anrep was wounded on the head by a musket ball, as he was reconnoitering after the affair was over.

The army remained in the same position on the 4th (15th) of March. Murat advanced with 12 regiments of infantry and cavalry to Bieschowitz, whence he dislodged a detachment of one hundred Cossacks, who, nevertheless, in their retreat made 50 prisoners.
