They are also generally used by the officers in the English East-India Company's service, to whom the author had the noble privilege of teaching them. When mariners now unacquainted with the lunar method, have experienced its superiority to the dead reckoning, which at best, is but an uncertainty, they will approach the land after any passage, with a confidence and certainty known only to practitioners in the science.
