The publisher has used these tables for several voyages to every part of India, and always found the distance corrected by them fully to agree with those computed by MacLaurin, Dunthorn, or any method with which he compared them. They are also generally used by the officers in the English East-India Company's service, to whom the author had the sole privilege of teaching them. When navigators now unacquainted with the lunar method, have experienced its superiority to the dead reckoning, which at best, is but an uncertainty, they will approach the land after any passage, with a confidence and certainty known only to practitioners in the science.
Should the publication of these tables contribute to diffuse a more general knowledge of this subject among my sea-faring brethren, I shall be proud of having had the honor of introducing to so useful an improvement into the United States.
