THE LATEST

FROM THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE.

SALEM, June 5 -On Wednesday last the Hopewell, capt. Rea. arrived here from . Hamburgh, which place she left on the 17th April. The last news received there respecting the war was similar to what we have had here—that Massena had made a movement which it was expected would immediately bring on another general battle. As to peace, though there, had all winter been some talk of it, yet it was an event that in Hamhurgh was not expected to take place.

With respect to the events of war which had taken place between the French and Russians, it was difficult to judge of the truth from the Hamburgh papers, as they are issed under the inspection of a French intendant of public and official flatements, there is Vgenerally a distrust, from the supposed policy of each party to conceal its own disasters, and exaggerate those of its enemy: private information is therefore often more relied on. From persons who had been at the theatre of war, and from the communications of the French officers themselves, it was well known, that though the French had maintained their military reputation in all the battles they had fought, yet that Bonaparte had at length met with an enemy that required the full exercise of all his genius and energy, and had received such a check as he had never before experienced. Persons who had visited both the French and Russian armies, allowed that the former were vafily superior to the latter in military science and enperience; but yet Benningsen had managed his means with such skill and judgment as greatly to harrass & straiten the French, and to make them suffer severely from the rigours of the climate and want of provisions, as well as from his arms. The dreadful accounts we have had of the battle of ! Eylau appear to have been no fictions; the dest ruction of human life in that awful scene has hardly been equalled in modern warfare. Benmingten's statement of the French loss in this affair leems not to have been far from the truth; for French officers who were in the battle acknowledged that they had between 30 & 40,000 killed and wounded : the Russian loss they state to be equally great, and it was confidently said that there were not less than 30,000 wounded Russians in Koningsberg: the conclusion was, that neither side could boall of having gained any distinguished advantage over the other in the action, though it was acknowledged that the Russians laved Konigsberg by it. The account we have had of the dettruction of Bonaparte's guards was true : Augereau being wounded, and his men discouraged by repeated repulles, Bonaparte ordered his guards to the sharge; they obeyed, and were all cut to pieces, faving about sixteen men, the Russians giving n, quarter. After the battle, no less than 15,000 dead horses were counted upon the field. A French officer, in a letter to a friend, lays, that two more such battles would annihilate the French army. It was evident that the imprelsion of Bonaparte's invincibility was in some degree effaced, and the hopes of those strengthened who wished to see bounds set to his tri-

The greatest exertions were making on both sides to repair their loises by recruits. Vast numbers were pouring in to the French grand army, from all parts of Germany, as well as from France, thousands of wretched creatures being obliged to enlift, to get bread; and even many of the Pruilian priloners had entered among the recruits. The shock, from the next meeting of the two armies was expected to be even more terrible than that of the former.

It seems the good generalship of Benningsen had not preferved him from the jealouly of the other officers of the Rullan army, who think themselves dishonored by having a foreigner pl ced over them. The emperor Alexander had arrifed at Revel, on his way to the army, with a view probably of composing the difficul-

There are now no French troops in Hamburgh; the place is garrifoned by the Dutch; the river is blockaded by the British, and its trade has ceased.
