

### TRIAL OF COL. BURR.

**From Richmond, Tuesday, June 9.**  
The grand jury met between two and three. After the names were called over, Mr. May rose and addressed the court. He mentioned that he had received no information from Gen. Wilkinson, accepting a small paragraph in the Norfolk Ledger, stating the arrival of a vessel at Norfolk in 24 days from New Orleans, with the intelligence that Gen. Wilkinson was in that city at the departure of the vessel. He therefore hoped that the court would please to adjourn the grand jury a few days longer.  
Mr. Luther Martin read a paragraph from a Norfolk paper a day later in its date, which stated the arrival of a vessel at Norfolk in 27 days from New Orleans, and that Gen. Wilkinson was in that city on the 15th ult.  
Col. Burr informed the court he was perfectly willing that the grand jury should be adjourned, but not longer than two days.  
The grand jury were accordingly adjourned until Tuesday morning, at 11 o'clock.

**TURKEY: CONSTANTINOPLE, March 4.**  
The negotiation between Mr. Arbutnot and the ministers of the Porte being broken off, Admiral Duckworth, with six ships of the line and four frigates, has made several movements, and came to anchor off the island of *Exochordos*; and took in provisions and water. The Turkish fleet, of between 15 and 20 sail, under the Grand Admiral, has gone in quest of the English. We expect soon to hear of a naval engagement.  
Gen. De Richlieu, with a considerable body of Russians, is on the march on the borders of the Black Sea. The reports of the Russians having passed the *Danube* is not confirmed. They have defeated a body of *Beffarian* Tartars, and sent their leaders to *Petersburg*.  
Mr. Charles Arbutnot, the minister of England, appeared at a conference which had been assigned by the Porte, and declared at it as follows:  
(See declaration in a late American.)

Each of these proposals was answered in a most energetic manner by the Reis effendi: that the French ambassador was so far from having threatened the Sublime Porte, that since his arrival, his government had been engaged in a war with Prussia; besides which, the great inferiority of the maritime forces of France was such, as could not lead to any suspicion, that that power intended, in the slightest degree, to injure the Porte; that it was of her own accord, and with judicial proofs in hand of the crimes of the two Hospodars, that the Sublime Porte had determined to depose them; that the French ambassador had only learnt the deposition of the princes, at the same time as the other inhabitants at Constantinople; that the English minister had dispensed with reminding him that having made known, whilst these proceedings were going on, the interest which the powerful king of Great Britain took with regard to the two Hospodars, the Porte had shrunk from the proposal of being, at the same time, at war with Russia and England, that in consequence, Sultan Selim, and all his ministers, putting up with the greatest affront which could be offered to an independent power, re-established the Hospodars, who but a few days since they had declared rebels; that the Sultan Selim, by a sublime effort, had placed himself above the feelings which have the most influence over men, in order to purchase the peace and happiness of his subjects at the price of the most painful sacrifices of his heart; that he had received the Hospodars in his palace, and given anew the investiture of Wallachia and Moldavia to princes justly recalled as criminal; that instead of the peace and tranquility he had hoped for he had obtained only war; that his provinces had been invaded, and that, in the most insulting manifestoes, the Russian general had taken the liberty to state as motives for war, their critical observations on the administrations of his people; that thus attacked by Russia he had been forced to repel arms by arms, but he had then flattered himself that a generous prince, that a nation so enlightened as Great Britain, would appreciate these sacrifices; that after having testified to the Sublime Porte its satisfaction at the re-establishment of the Hospodars; that before 2 months were elapsed, the minister of the same power would not have declared that this compliance had been too tardy; that thus the minister of England had manifested, in a short time, different opinions, and opposite intentions; that it is a mere mockery to cite, as a proof of French influence, the facility with which every thing has been done that England wished for, that Sultan Selim cannot but appeal to the magnanimity, of the sovereign of G. Britain; that, constrained to repel force by force, the Sublime Porte hopes, with the assistance of the Almighty, that she shall triumph over the most unjust of aggressions; and that if at length she must sink she will perish in defending her capital; and that the English nation, more than any other, will experience irreparable damage from the disasters of the Ottoman empire; that this empire exists by the will of the great and merciful God and that if such be the divine will, from the very despair in which the Sultan Selim has been reduced, will result the necessary energy for the defence of the state.

It is said, that several times during this speech, the Reis Effendi could not contain his emotion, and that it was going out from this conference, that the English minister got on board the *Endymion* frigate, ordered the cable to be cut, and recommended the English, whom he left at Constantinople to the care of the Danish minister, and given to the intervention of the French ambassador. We are persuaded, that the letter would be far from initiating the conduct adopted by

the English at the time of the expedition into Egypt, and would consent to recommend the merchants of his nation to the Sublime Porte: a step which in fact took place.

The resolution of the emperor Selim, & his position under those circumstances are worthy of attention. Every great and generous mind put up vows for the success of his case. A levy of 200,000 men has just been ordered throughout this empire.

Passwan Oglous dead. The Servians have concluded peace with the Porte. The Pacha of Widdden and Ismael, and the army of Rudschuck, are on the point of entering Wallachia.

The English goods, throughout the states of the grand seignior, have just been laid under sequestration.

**LONDON, April 15.**  
Part of the Channel fleet is arrived at Torbay.  
Major Tucker received a letter from Gen. Beresford, dated November 10, stating that he and his officers were well treated by the Spaniards. This is the most recent communication from the British prisoners of war in South America.

120 of the seamen, who were on board the Dutch frigate lately wrecked, entered into the British service. They were Prussians, Swedes, Danes and Hamburgers, impressed by the Dutch.

Captain Brisbane, of the British Navy, has been knighted.

The French have collected a contribution of 20 millions of livres from the town of Stettin. A club of bachelors has lately been instituted in a town in South Wales, where each member binds himself under penalty of a considerable forfeiture, to marry in the course of one year.

A Noble Lord lost, last week, at a low gambling house, at the Well-end of the town, 8000l. One of the winners now sports an elegant barouche, purchased by the spoils.

The Prince of Wales is allowed to take now half a pint of wine by his Physicians. His general diet is barley water, and his food is simply small soup, fish, and fowl. He has abstained from butcher's meat and poultry for several months.

**NASSAU, (N. P.) May 28.**  
The brig Telemachus, Jones, (belonging to Mr. John B. Jauffret and Mr. E. Valdor, of Baltimore) sailed from Trinidad, Cuba, on the 15th inst. for Baltimore, and got ashore on the 15th on Carryford's Reef, (Florida) where soon after the vessel was taken in with some wreckers from this port, who after taking out a small part of her cargo, confining principally of sugar, she was got off without having received any perceptible injury. The brig arrived here on Tuesday.

The sloop Caroline, Baxter, failed on Monday for Boston, to touch at Eleuthera, for fruit—and the sloop Hannah, Howard, for Norfolk, also for fruit.

The brig Rattlesnake, Foster, failed yesterday for Boston.
