The Abbonus hisberto received (with the exception asly of our Correspondent's Communicuston's bave been of fo very defective a deseriprimes to afford no satisfactory idea of the actual Scate of Affairs at the Theatre of War. We are, therefore, happy to announce, that we have received from the same most valuable and intelligent Correspondent a variety of Documents, from which we are enabled to gratify the Public with the following authentic and interesting Narrative.]

The Russian army having failed in the attempt under Kaminskoy, to distodge the enemy upon the East Bank of the Viftula, had received orders to retreat to the Neimen; and Bennigsen having, at the head of some few corps succeeded in repulsing a considerable body of the enemy in the neighborhood of Pultisk, was obliged for want of support to fall back upon Rozan, Offrolenka, and along the line of the lest bank of the Narew ; but his position haying been rendered useless by the weather, he was obliged to make a considerable detour, to effect a junction with Buxhowden, who had retreated upon the right bank, but which he at length exected at Biala, near Johnnesburg, upon the Spirding Let.

It was in the course of this march, that Bennigsen received from the Emperor, the Commission of Commander in Chief of the Russian army, in succession to Kaminskoy.

Having effected this junction, he determined to advance towards the enemy, keeping in view the protection of Konigsberg i. with this intent he directed his march through Rein Rossel, Bischoptin, Iseilsberg, Gutstadt, and Leibstadt, having frequent skirmishes with detachments of the division under Bernadotte: at Mirengen, however, the advanced guard had to encounter the whole corps of Bernadotte, in which action, after a very short contest, they were repulsed, and the enemy remained masters of the field, from which they retreated on the following day, on the arrival of the main body of the Russians; and here Bennigsen established his headquarters.

During this movement on the part of the Russians, the Prussian General L'Ellocq, with 14,000 men, of which 4000 were Russians, had advanced from the neighborhood of Konigsberg along the shores of the Frieshe Haff, in the direction of Bromsberg, Elbing, and Marienwerder, and had actually compelled the enemy to raise the siege of Grandentz.

Gen. Essen had the command of 35,000 men on the Narew, and a Corps of Reserve of about 12,000 remained at a considerable-distance in the rear, under the command of Gen. Zadmoratzski. In this position the Allied Armies remained

on the 31st of January, their force amounting nearly as follows :-Bennigsen

\$0,000 L'Effocq 14,000 Essen 35,000 Zadmoratzski 12,000 141,000

These movements, on the part of the Allies, had compelled the enemy to concentrate himself in the neighborhood of Warsaw; and on the ift of February, the Russian General was informed, that the French army was in full against Joseph Kernochan, and John Sharp, march on the road to Konigsb.rg, and had actually reached Allenstein, on the River Alle, with the evident intention of interposing between the Allied Army and Konigsberg.

In this situation of things, it was no longer possible for Bennigsen to abide by his declared determination of avoiding a general action, and he accordingly approached the enemy on the 2d, in the direction of Jankova, a few miles to the westward of Allenstein, and on the left of the

Alle. From this position be was repulsed on the 3d, and pursued by the energy to Wolsdorff; from thence he was again driven on the 4th to Framsdorff, and on the 5th, to Lansberg; from whence he was, on the night of the 6th, after some hard fighting, again campelled to retreat and on the 7th, in the morning, having marched four successive nights, his rear guard continually fighting, he took up a position within a sew hundred yards of Prussian Eylau, on the Konigsberg side of that town, determined to await the enemy, and engage him in a general

BATTLE OF PRUSSIAN EYLAU.

The ground occupied by the Russian army, commanded the road along which the enemy must advance, as he approached from Landsberg. The woods, with which that country abounds, surrounded them at some diistance, except on the left, which rested upon the acctiwity of a woody range of fmall hills.

The army was drawn up in three lines : the brigades which composed the second and third remained in columns; the cavalry were principally on the wings of the front line; feveral squadrons were possed in the rear of the centre of the first line.

The whole front was defended by several pieces of crdaance, and confiderable reserves of artillory were attached to the second and third

The right of the army extended to the village of Schomodsten, through which a road passes to Konigsberg. The town of Prussian Eylau was nearly in the centre of the front, which, together with two small neighboring villages, was occupied by Russian corps. The extent of the position, from right to left, was about a mile, and nearly the fame in depth.

In front of the town of Erlau there is a ravine, which, though not of any depth, was yet of considerable advantage to the Russians, in consequence of the ascent from it to the Rusfian position. This ravine extended from the town to the extreme point of the left of Ruffan line. Thus the whole of the Ruffan front was placed upon a considerable eleva-

The Profian General L'Estocq was expected hodriy. He had been ordered to Offerode, from the neighborhood of Grandentz, when the ar my moved forward on the ift to Jankova; and was known that he had reached Zanter, a few miles distant, the night before the ac-

While thele operations were going on in the centre, the enemy had got round on the left, and began to thew himlest on different points. but without opening his fire, and the leveral Russian corps, both of cavalry and infantry, were observed to retrograte towards the centre.-About one o'clock he opened a well-directed fire from a battery on one of the dills in rear of the left, which contributed much to the disorder that continued to prevail there, and in a Thort time be appeared in great Arength on the creft of the hills, and in the woods upon the lest, while his cavalty again attempted to penetrate the centre, and again sailed with confiderable loss.

The enemy had already made fome progrefs from the left towards the rear, when about four o'clock, General L'Estocq appeared advancing in that directon, and finally compelled the enemy, after fullaining a fmart cannonade, to ... bandon the posts he had previously occupied.

Night put an end to the action, and General Beningsen soon afterwards resolved to sfall back upon Konigsberg, and in the course of. the night retreated by Malhaulen to Wittens burg, three German miles from the field of battle, and two from Konigsberg.

The following day, the 9th, theenemy puthed his advanced posts to Malhausen. The Russian army fell back close to Konigsberg, and took a position near the Fridland Gate. under the ramparts of the town,

The loss on both sides in this dreadful battle must undoubtedly have been great, but from the situation of the French troops it is not probable that they suffered in equal proportion with the Russians.

This battle, taking into consideration the numbers engaged, the skill and fury with which it was contested on both sides, may be considered as the must severe that has been fought. since the revolutionary war, and the first great check that Bonaparte has received since the commencement of his career in 1795, and the whole action might be seen in one view; the field of battle not extending above one square league; and the few prisopers that were taken on either side, prove the determination of both parties to conquer, or perish.

TRIAL OF AARON BURR. Circuit Court of the U. States for the fifth circult and District of Virginia.

WEDNESDAY, May 27. Debate on the order and species of syidence to be introduced on the motion to commit Azeron Burr for High Treason against the U.S.

(Concluded.) Mr. Wickham regretted that so much sime had been consumed ; but boped that the court would acquit them of any intention to waste it; when any illegal motion was introduced by the opposite council, helfelt it as a serious duty due to his client to refift it with firmness: that for his own part he should not forget that he was before the circult court of the United States, nor should he so far lose his respect for their discernment as to bring forward motions which he l-slieved to be illegal only to wafte the sime of the court; that he hoped none but legal evidence would be suffered to be introduced s none but competent witnesses to be heard; and that if this rule was not rigidly adhered to, whatwas to prevent the counsel on the other fide from producing any and every kind of evidence that they pleated?
