BOSTON, June 11.

Late from the Mediterranean.

A gentleman, who came passenger in the ship Thomas, arrived here yetlerday, from Marseilles, last from Malaga, states, that the American Consul at-the latter place, informed him of official accounts having been received, that Peace bad actually taken place between the Ottoman Porte and Russia and England; that this event was however not effected until after a severe and destructive battle between the English and Turkish sleets, in which the former were victorious, but through the loss of great & many killed and wounded, and the blowing up of one of its largest ships of war.

Late and Interesting Foreign News. The arrival at this port, yellerday, of the Sarah and Eliza, Holland, from Liverpool, has furnished us with some late and interesting articles of Foreign Intelligence. Our limits would not admit of copious selections-bet such as we have made, though greatly condenied from the original matter, will be found to contain the prominent points of news.

DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF LORDS.

London, April 27: The Lord Chancellor, in his Majesty's name, delivered the following Speech:

" My Lords and Gentlemen, "We have in command from his Majesty to inform you that his Majesty has thought fit to avail himself of the first moment which would admit of the interruption of the sitting of Parliament, without material inconvenience to the public business, to close the present Session: And that his Majesty has therefore been pleased to cause a Commission to be issued, under the Great Seal, for proroguing Parliament

We are further commanded to state to you, . that his Majelly is anxious to recur to the sense of his people, while the events which have recently taken place are yet freih in their recol-

" His Majesty seels, that in resorting to this measure, under the present circumstances, he at once demonstrates in the most unequivocal manner, his own conscientious persuation of the rectitude of those motives upon which he has afted; and affords to his people the bett opportunity of tellifying their determination to lupport him in every exercise of the pretogatives of his Crown, which is conformable to the facred obligations under which they are held, and conducive to the welfare of his kingdom, and to the fecurity of the Constitution.

" His Majesty directs us to express his entire conviction, that after to long a reign, marked by a fories of indulgences to his Roman Catholie Subjects, they, in common with every other clais of his pe ple, must feel assured of his attachment to the principles of a just and enlightened toleration; and of his anxious defire to protect equally, and pr mote impartially, the happinels of all descriptions of his subjects."

" Gentlemen of the House of Commons, " His Majesty has commanded us to thank you, in his Majesty's name, for the supplies which you have tur. illed for the public fervice.

" He has feen with great satisfaction, that you have been able to find the means of defray ing, in the present year, those large but necesfary expences, for which you have provided, without imposing upon his people the immedia: burden of additional taxes.

" His Majesty has observed with no less satisfaction the inquiries which you have instituted into subjects connected with public economy. And, he trusts, that the early attention of the. new Parliament, which he will forthwith direct to be called, will be applied to the profecution of these important objects."

" My Lords and Gentlemen, " His Majesty has directed us most earnestly to recommend to you, that you should cultivate, by all means in your power, a spirit of union, harmony, and good will amongst all classes and descriptions of his people.

"His Majesty trusts that the divisions naturally and unavoidably excited by the late unfortunate and uncalled for agitation of a question fo interesting to the feelings and opinions of his people, will speedily pals away; and that the prevailing sense and determination of all his subjects to exert their united efforts in the cause of their country, will enable his Majesty to conduct to an honorable and secure termination, the great contest in which he is en-

gaged." The Lord Chancellor then, in dis Majesty's name, and by virtue of the said Commission, ceclared the Parliament to be prorogued to Wednesday the 13th day of May next.

The Lords Commissioners withdrew from the House, and the Commons retired from the

There were circumstances in the manner of proroguing Parliament yesterday which we leel it to be our duty to lay before our readers. They unfortunately give too much sanction to the report which prevailed that the prorogation was owing to other causes than his Majesty's anxiety " to recur to the sense of his people, while the events which have recently taken place were yet fresh in their recollection."

For a confiderable time before the Speaker came to the House, the Deputy Usber of the Black Rod waited for him behind the bar. The Speaker came precisely five minutes past three o'clock and the Deputy Usher then retired to the outside of the door. Prayers being read as nsual, the Speaker immediately proceeded to count the House, but before he had counted four, the Deputy Usher knocked at the door & entered. The Speaker immediately took the Chair, the Black Rod, according to parliamentary ulage, dispensing with the necessity of the ulual numbers requisite to form a House. The Deputy Usher then in the usual form summoned the House to the House of Peers to hear the Commission for prorogation read. The Speaker, attended by most of the Members present, proceeded to the House of Peers. He returned in about 20 minutes, read the speech at the table, according to the usual custom, and retired.

Thus terminated in a manner peculiary abrupt and unexpected, after sitting 4 months and eight days, the first and only Session of the third Parliament of the United Kingdom of G Britain and Ireland.

APREL 28-We are enabled, from personal observation, to furnish our readers with the clue to all this management, to many of whom it would otherwise be unintelligible. The Finance Committee of the House of Commons. met yesterday and had prepared a Report to be submitted to the House. The Members of the Committee were in the House and one of them. Mr. Giles, in the absence of Mr. Bankes, the Chairman, was waiting below the bar to prefent the report. That confissent with the use ges of the house, could not be done until the Speaker had taken the Chair. While he was going throug the necessary ceremony of counting the House, to alcertain if 40 Members were present, the Usher of the Black Rod, who, - as we have flated, was in attendance at the door during the time of prayers, knocked, and being
