A letter from Dantsic, of the 4th, says : Twenty thousand men, mostly Poles, are, lying round the place. General Kalkreuth has arrived with a reinforcement of 2000 Cossacks, and has taken command of the place. We are taking the most efficient means of defence. - The suburbs are already destroyed, so that socopeople are without house or home. A very first military police is established in the interior. No allemblages are permitted in the fireels or any of she public places.

The French armies are in motion in every adarter. The Italian army has commenced its march for Turkey, through Bosnia. It is liated to be loe, cooltrong. It was formerly under th: command of Massena, but since he has been called into Poland, it is supposed that Augereau will be appointed in his p'ace.

There appears to be some soundation so rumour, which was circulated in the course o yellerday evening, and which this mornin maintained its credit upon the Exchange, namely, that Hamburgh and dependencies had been evacuated by the French. The evacuation was unavoidable, from the moment the blockade of Stralsund was raised.

House of Commons, April 23. Mr. Lushington wished to put a question to Ministers respecting a very alarming report which had pervaded the city during the day, of a dreadful dillurbance having broken out in Madras. The rumour had been very pre/alent, and he wished to learn whether Ministers had heard of it.

Lord CASTLEREAGH replied, that certainly is Majesty's Ministers had heard of some isturbance in the remote territories of Madras. but they were not aware of any thing of that description in or near the leat of Government. Extract from the 69th Bulleting

"The health of the Emperor continues excellent; it is even remarked that it appears better than formerly. Some days his Majetty makes excursions to the diffance of forty miles on horse back. At Waisaw it was lall week thelieved, that the Emperor had arrived there about ten o'clock at night. The whole town was immediately and voluntarily illuminated.'

Sir A. Paget is appointed Amballador to Turkey. There is fill, therefore, an expectation of negotiating with that power.

Dispatches to April 20, have been received from.our iquadron off Rochefort.—The French Beet of fix sail of the line has gone into the inner harbour, and been entirely dilmanuled. The crews were landed.

Letters received yesterday from Memel, state that the Emperor of Rusia arrived there on-the 2d inst.

Great nicety and good sense will be required to re-establith our relations with Rulls on the triendly footing they were.

The murder of the Pacha of Belgrade, with all the Janularies, their wives, and children, by the Servians, while leaving the province under Servian escort, will, it is feared, be followed by that of the Turks in all Servia.

DEAL, April 23. The French privateers begin to be very troublesome: two were over close in by Hythe the evening before last. 5 British vessels have just been carried into Calais.

EUROPE.

London papers to the 28th of April, inchfive, came to hand on Wednelday, by the arrival of the ship Sarah and Eliza, from Liverpool. The Exench have evacuated Swedish Pomerenia; but this may have been a measure of policy rather than necessity, as Bonaparte is anxious to concentrate his forces. The Swedes, however, were close at their heels, hastening their retrogade pace, and annoying them confiderably. The Swedes have become more saive in the war than heretofore. - I'me Emperor of Russa, and King of Prussa, were at Memel, where a French medenger had been fent. There were reports of a negotiation, and of an armittice. If we believe the English papers opposed to the late Ministry, there is not a good understanding between the British and Russans, occasioned by the neglect of that mi-

The English are preparing a Grand Naval Armament for the Baltic, which is also to conver troops to skill against the French in Po-

French influence appears to have triumphed in the Turkith capital. The British have, nowever, appointed a new Envoy to the Grand Sig-

The new Ministry in Great Britain appear as delirous as thole who preceded them, to continue on good terms with the United States.

Parliament was about to be diffolved-and the bustle for a new election had commenced.

PARIS, April 19.1 Seventieth Bulletin of the Grand Army.

FINCKENSTEIN, 9th April. A party of 400 Prussians, who had embarked at Koningsberg, has debarked on the penin sula opposite Pilau, and advanced towards the village of Carlsberg. M. Maingueinaud, aidde-camp to Marshal Lefebvie, proceeded for that point with some men. He has so ably manoruvred as to carry off the 400 Prussians, amongst whom were 120 cavalry.

Several Russian regiments have entered the city of Dantzick by water. The garrison has made several sorties. The Polish legion of the North & Prince Michel Radzivil who commands it have distinguished themselves. They have made about 40 of the Russians prisoners. The siege is continued with vigor. The artillery for it has begun to arrive.

There is nothing new at the different points of the army.

The Emperor is returned from an incursion he has made to Marienwerder, and to the tete de pont on the Vistula. He has reviewed the 12th regiment of light infantry and the gendarmes d'ordonnance.
