The following is Dr. Bollman's letter to the Grand Jury, a copy of which was I me days ago, handed by the court to the bar. It is understood to have been well received by the Grand Jury, but that they could not act upon it, because they had no further occasion for the Doctor's evidence. GENTLEMEN.

I FIND mylelf placed in a very unusul and prinful eituation. Besore I was sworn and sent up to you as a witness against col. Burr, a pa tent of pardon vas rendered to me in open courrby the atterney for the the U. S. It had not been solicited by me, and I could not think of tecciving it, because the accentance would Dave implied an acknowledgment of guilt, and would have led to inferences against cot. Burr which I could not have reconciled to my conscience. It was therefore as promptly rejected as it had been officiously offered, and appearing before your honorabe body without any mention having been made to you of the Sobject I considered the pardon as non exist-

It happens, however, that I continue to be preclaimed in court, by the counsel for the profecution, as a pardoued man, a proceeding at which my feelings fustly revolt, since no undividual can have a night voluntarity to affix to my name the opproblum of guitt, nor to expose me to the fulpicion of having, under, the influence of this deschable indemnity for pretended offences, lumified evidence which I would not otherwise have given.

In this situation, only one mode occurs to me of obtaining the interference of the court to rescus a e irom the disgrace of the pardon. Ali is to i form your honorable budy of the circumilance, and to flate at the same time, that I cannot otherwise than feel myfelt embarrassed as a witheles, and contrained in antivering your questions, while I continue in my prefent predicament.

Flattering myself that you will have been satisfied with the timber and frankness with which I have endeavoyed to reply to enquires in my brit examination, and venturing to appeal for the juitification of my seelings on this occasion, to your own, I hope that you will not confiler my conduct as improper. --- Nothing can be more remote from my intentions, than to with to foreen myfelf from further interrogotaries. My only object is to obtain through your interposition, a formal decisiton of the court. for the prefervation of my character, and trust you will deem it correct and becoming, that in the capacity of a witness, I thould protect it with more than common solicitude.

Duckworth added, " I declare to you now once more, in my own name, and on that of the ambassador, and I declare on my honor, that we desire peace." There is no manner of doubt, but both declarations were ausy-Jutely felse-both Arbuthnot [and Duckworth, knew of the engagement between Russia and England, to compel the Porte into Submission, and to seize on its possessions. At the moment these assertions were made at Constantinopie a British squadron was feizing upon Alexandria and a Russian army ravaging the Turkish provinces in Europe. Neither Russia nor England had been provoked, but they could not abstain from plunder.

An English paper, attached to the ministerial interest, places beyond all doubt this perfidious cenduct to the Turks; it does not pretend to offer any julification, but treats the tyranny as a matter of course-speaking of the expedition,
