It feems to be generally considered incumber. because it has been the pruc ice we presune, for junishers of newspapers to lay before their readers, off-hand, every rumor or report that gets afloat respecting events in Europe To keep in the fastism, we have followed the cultom? and yesterday inserted and to day insertalfo, a report brought from Amsterdam relative to the defeat of the I reach by the Russians. A report is, at belt, very little to be relied off; and a report with an authority is absolutely nug story. " The supercargo of the Hazard heard a report in Amfterdam," but be does not fumish us with any account of the author, or tell us whethet it was believed or not by the Holian lers.

This report avers that the engagement hetween the French and Ruszians took place from the "last of April to the 10th of May" This, again, is vague and unfatisfactory; for we are not told wheth it was one continued batte, or whether the e were leveral battles. Now if there had been a battle on the " laft of April," probability is, that the news would have reached London by the 16th of May, to which-date London papers have been received at N. York but they are silent on the subject.

We do not deny the probability of an engage. ment between the French and Russians early in May, but we deny the plausibility of the Amsterdam tumor. The last bulletis was dated April 24; and at that time the state of the roads was fuch as to preclude the probability of a battle immediately, though one was expected foon to occur. An article dated at Pultusk-on the 7th of April lays, even if the severe weather was over, the campaign could not open in lefs

Equally, it not more, false, is the rumor via Guadaloupe, of a great battle. A little calculation will shaw that captain Lamarque's news from France cannot be later than April 20-and the 72d bulietin is dated four days later. A French privateer captain may teasonably be indulged in a little gasconading in favor of his. countrymen; but he ought not to propagate lies.

On the 2d inst capt. Tukesbury, in lat. 34, 30, long. 75, spoke ship Iris, from Madeira, for Baltimore, out 40 days.

Capt. Lamarque, commander of the French Privateer Jenny, which arrived on Thursday, left Point Petre, Guadaloupe, on the 16th ult. informs, that on that day, a French advice-boat arrived there in 26 days from France, which brought out the Bulletins of the Grand army, as far as the 77th—that these Bulletins contained accounts of splendid victories obtained over the Russians; in consequence of which, great rejoicings took place at Point Petre.

Charleston paper.

We have nothing to add to the detail of the circumstances respecting the Chesapeake, given in our last. They were given in haste, but subsequent enquiry has confirmed them to be substantially correct in all their material parts.

The Leopard has returned into the Bay, and remains with the other ships; all the pilots have been landed at their requeil.


