THE object of this bill is to obtain a decree for the sale of parts of sundry tracts of Land in Baltimore county, of which the said Abraham Butler died seized, to wit: Parts of Butler's Farm, Addition to William, Goodwill, William Reagurveyed, and Addition to William, heretofore conveyed to said Abraham Butler from Richard Hooker, by deed dated 1st April, 1797, and from Amos Butler, senr. by deed dated 6th October, 1804, also for the sale of the said Abraham Butler's equitable estate, in three tracts of land in said county called, Butler's Discovery, Cold Tuesday, and Fellowship, for the purpose of paying the debts of the said Butler.

The bill states that the said Absalom Butler departed this life some time about the year 1805, intestate, seized of the several tracts of land abovementioned, which have descended to his children and heirs at law above named. That letters of administration on his personal estate were granted to Susanna, his widow, and Abraham Cole, defendants, above named; who have finally settled their accounts and distributed the assets. That large balances are still due and unpaid to the creditors of said Absalom Butler; and that to discharge the same it is necessary to sell the said real estate of the said Butler as abovementioned.

It is further stated that Hannah Baxter, and Greenbury Baxter, her husband, defendants in this bill, reside out of the state in some place unknown to the complainants.  
It is thereupon on motion of the complainants, ordered that the said complainants cause a copy of this order to be inserted in the American three Tuesdays or Fridays, before the 25th day of July next, to the end that the said Baxter and wife may appear in the court, and shew cause, on or before the 24th day of November next, if any cause they have, why the decree in the premises shall not pass as prayed.

THE object of this bill is to obtain a decree  
to set aside a conveyance bearing date 2d day  
of February, 1862, from Elizabeth Hugg, (now  
Elizabeth Wood,) one of the defendants, to the  
said Eleanor, Eliza, Ann, John and Jacob  
Hugg, for a house and lot situate on Bond-  
street, Fell's Point, and city of Baltimore;  
and further for a sale of the said house, lot and  
premises to satisfy and pay to the said com-  
plainants, certain sums of money which they  
have become answerable for and have paid, as  
securities for said Elizabeth in her administration  
bond.
