A progression so pleasing in its nature, and beneficial in its effects, which the institution has certainly accelerated, cannot fail of securing to it, a continuance of protection and patron-

A Library, formed with a due respect to Religion, and morals, which wes not exclude works of genius, and amusement, which contains the most esteemed writings of every country, and the best backs on the different arts, and in every branch of science and literature, to whose an pie stores, all persons may have access at a tritting expense, must rank amongst the most useful and hudable institutions in society.

To select a Library, in conformito with these principles, calls for the union of different talents and various information. It neust, however, be recollected, that athough with a limitted annual sum, all valuable books cannot at once, be introduced, yet, that in time and successively, all of the greatest value, or importance, which can be procured, may find

With such prospects, the Library Company of Billimore, was instituted, and under the influence of corresponding principles, it has beer uniformly and st. adily conducted down to the present hour. Believing it to be the wish of the members, to continue to society the advantages of the institution, will it not be considered indi pensable?
