

commodore, with an officers acting as capt. under him, namely, Capt. Gordon, whose rank is a matter of command. After an elapse of 15 minutes, the Leopard pouring it into the Chesapeake, two powder horns were obtained from below by captain Gordon himself, and given to Lieut. Allen, who fired a gun with a coal of fire or a logger head from the galley—no matches being yet ready. Fifteen minutes is a long time for a ship to receive the fire of an adversary of superior force, without being in a capacity to return a gun—and no man can be deemed a coward who can stand 15 minutes in the open gangway of a ship, exposed to as heavy a fire as can be conceived. A court of enquiry, which will be held on the spot, will determine where the blame ought to attach. It is therefore cruel that the character of a man, who once stood to high, should be blasted, until judgment is given against him.

Mr. Pechin.
Sir—Please to insert the following extract from a celebrated work on Military Tactics, lately published, and oblige, &c.
A FIELD OFFICER.
Of the Instruction of Officers.
"All officers must be instructed in every individual circumstance required of a recruit or a soldier, and accustomed to give words of command with energy and precision, which is so very essential to the just performance of all military discipline. Every officer, on joining a regiment, must be examined by the commanding officer or some fit person, and if found deficient in the knowledge required, he must be ordered to be exercised until he is master of the duties which his station demands, before he is permitted to take any command."
"Squad's of officers should be formed and exercised by a field officer. They must be marched and wheeled in all directions, to the front and rear, oblique, and to each flank, but especially in line, at various distances, and shown how to preserve positions on the line, and at true wheeling distance, how to ascertain perpendiculars, and the squareness of wheels. They must change direction in file, cover in column, and be accustomed to perform every manoeuvre, in the proper length of pace and cadence, &c. The complete instruction of an officer necessarily enlarges with his situation, until it at last takes in the whole circle of military science, and therefore requires his unremitting exertions."

El Dorado.—The following account of this town is extracted from "the Dictionary of Modern History."
"El Dorado is a kind of very fine down, coming from Denmark, Norway, and Ireland. It is the produce of a species of wild cat, called the Eider. To collect this down, the inhabitants at the risk of their lives, by means of cords, let themselves down the steep precipices, where these birds have their nests."
"The down is made up in balls, about the size of a fist, and weighing from 3 to 4 pounds. It is so fine and soft, that if a ball is opened, the down is carefully held over red hot coals, to warm it, it will completely fill a bed for two people."
Extract of a letter from an American capt. to a gentleman in this city, dated
"CANTON, March 6, 1817."
"There has been a very disagreeable fracas taken place here, a few days since, owing to the improper conduct of some of the crews belonging to the English East India Company's ships, who were up at Canton on liberty, by getting in to riot with the Chinamen which continued for three or four days, some lives have been lost on both sides, a mandarin chop boat hauled up on the shore, and the chop house abreast of the factories was burnt to the ground, the consequence has been strict orders are issued that no sailors shall come to Canton, only barely enough to man a small boat."
"Yesterday all Chops (boats) of every description were stopped from the companies ships, and some of the security merchants, were put in chains. A very heavy demand has been made by the government, and only three days allowed the company's servants to consider it. What the end will be we cannot judge, but the opinion is that of its being serious. Thank God the American seamen (although a good many of them were in Canton at the time of the disturbance) not one of them has had any thing to do with it. A very favourable circumstance to the Americans!"

The Pilot who took down the ship Victrola, reports, that at eleven o'clock last Monday, they passed the British fleet at the Capes, consisting of two 74's, one 50 and a frigate; were boarded by an officer from the Leopard, who behaved with extreme politeness; inquired respecting the state of the public mind at Baltimore, and was anxious to obtain newspapers, which were given to him. He said that it never was their intention to outrun outward bound vessels. The officer requested the favor of being permitted to put the pilot on board of any vessels which he might desire to take up, offering him accommodation for 2 or 3 days on board the Leopard.
